DANIELS SEEKS MORE MONEY FOR AIR RAID

Wants Congress to Appropriate \$45,000,000 for Naval Aeronautica

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
Washington, July 11.—Congress is asked by Sec. Daniels to appropriate \$45,000,000 for naval aeronautics in addition to the amounts carried in this year's appropriation bill. The navy is working out a considerable air pro-gramme of its own, aside from the great \$625,000,000 military aircraft project of the defense council. "The value of aircraft has been abun-




Soldiers' Pay or For Compulsory Service in Other Fields at Same Rates

Ottawa, July 10-Today's discussion on the details of the conscription bill in committee hinged mainly upon the things which the government has failed to do, and which at present it still shows no inclination to do toward laying a fair basis for manhood conscription. Liberals who have sincerely supported the bill on second reading, joined with those who opposed conscription in an endeavor to secure from the government some earnest of an intention to bring about an equality of sacrifice and service.

The dominion-wide demand for the conscription of wealth, Sir Thomas White intimated at the opening of the session, is having the effect of frightening people from depositing their savings in the banks. The minister reassured these fearful ones and incidentally the banks, by declaring on behalf of the gov-ernment that it was not the purpose of the government by any form of taxation to discourage savings. He qualified his statement, however, by declaring that this did not preclude the possibility of an income tax upon such incomes as might fairly be expected to contribute toward the cost of the war.

The entire debate of the day centres round that part of the bill dealing with exemptions. The chief critic of the day was Hon. Frank Oliver. The pilot of the bill, Hon. Arthur Meighen, had some difficulty in explaining the somewhat vague provisions laid down in the bill as to exemptions, and invariably fell back on the statement that upon the tribunals would devolve the task of working out the details, and deciding upon what man should go and what should stay at home.

As the bill stood, Mr. Oliver declared, without contradiction, one clause provided for the conscription, and another for the exemption of every man in the dominion between the ages specified. Under its provisions there was no class of citizens who could not be exempted if the various tribunals saw fit. The solicitor-general was pressed to specify for the guidance of the tribunals the in-

Berne, Switzerland, July 10-According to Berlin newspapers, the German chancellor, Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, said to the members of the Reichstag: "I repeat that the formula of peace without annexations is unacceptable to us. We cannot declare our terms of peace. We must fight and conquer."




