### KING PROMISES ACTION MARITIME

Points Out Liberal Government Passed Ordersin-Council Appointing Duncan Commission and Instructing Probe of Tariff on Roads

RECOMMENDATIONS by the Royal Commission now investigating claims of the Maritime Provinces with respect to Confederation and also by the Board of Railway Commissioners concerning the freight rates structure as it affected the eastern provinces would be given proper effect by Parliament if the Liberals were returned to power, was the definite pledge made by Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Leader of the Opposition and former Premier of Canada, during the course of an address in the Imperial Theatre, last evening, before a crowded and deeply interested audience. interested audience.

He asserted that it was a Liberal administration that passed the order-in-council appointing the Duncan Commission and ordering the investigation into the freight rate situation, and he felt this was evidence of the Liberal party's desire to assist in removing any causes militating against the Atlantic provinces.

MEIGHEN'S POLICY.

Mr. Meighen, while in the Maritime Provinces, continued Mr. King, had preached a protection policy consistently applied to all parts of the country. This was his cry in 1921, and this was his cry today. Mr. King charged that Mr. Meighen had changed his policy somewhat while campaigning in the Middle West. The present premier had not applied his policy, preached in the east, as enthusiastically as he did in the Middle West. Mr. Meighen repeated the cry today, as he did in 1921, that this country was going behind, conditions were serious, factories were being depleted, business was suffering depression and everything practically speaking was in a state of confusion.

LIBERAL POLICY.

The Liberals, Mr. King said, drew the attention of the people to the state of the country, as did Mr. Meighen. But the speaker said, the policy drawn up at that time by the Liberal administration was one which meant for the prosperity of the country as soon as those policies could be applied. It took time to carry out such policies, but before the completion of the first session of Parliament the people of the Dominion of Canada saw that the policies advocated by the Liberal government had increased the revenue of the country, reduced the expenditures and lowered taxafion.

DEFENDS 1921 PROGRAM.

Dealing with the financial aspect the speaker said that the country was better off today as a direct result of the present year's budget. He declared that when the Liberals came into power the national debt of the country

The eighty-first annual gathering of the United Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces opened here today with sessions of the Institute. 

### SAINT JOHN VOCATIONAL SCHOOL

This modern school aims to give every boy and girl who enrolls a Sound General Education, together with adequate Vocational Guidance and Train-

It is open to students from any part of New Brunswick. The following is an outline of the four courses to start after Labor Day 1926. Each course is of three years' duration except course No. 1, which is

NO. 1. JUNIOR OR PRE VOCA-TIONAL COURSE

Students for this must have passed through grade 6 and be not less than 13 years of age. This course prepares pupils for writing High School entrance, or entering directly upon Vocational courses.

NO. 2. INDUSTRIAL HIGH SCHOOL COURSE

A three years' course for boys of High School entrance standing; designed to train boys for the trade of their choice, or to enter engineering college. Half of the time will be spent in shop work, including Electrical, Motor mechanics, Machine shop, Print shop, Draughting and Woodworking

NO. 4. HIGH SCHOOL OF COMMERCE COURSE This course is designed for boys and girls who plan to enter business. In addition to the broad general education, the following practical subjects are included Shorthand, typewriting, bookkeeping, commercial geography, business correspondence, history of commerce, office practice, salesmanship, economics, banking, law, commercial art, French and Spanish.

NO. 3. PRACTICAL ARTS

(Home Economics) COURSE

This course is for girls, and is a happy combination of cultural and utility subjects. It prepares them for scientific management of the home, or prepares the girl for entrance to the nursing profession.

In addition to the above High School courses, special intensive day courses in practical subjects only, of one and two years' duration will be offered persons over 16 years of age, who can profit by the instruction. Evening classes for adults will open the first week of October.

The number of applications for school permits increases at the office of the Board of School Trustees. Up to noon today there were about 628 applications, an excess of 20 over the number at the same time last year. This will probably mean that more little children are to make their advent into school life next month. In the next two days the full number will be received.

FREE SCHOOL BOOKS.

The two and a half tons of free school books the school headquarters' staff is about to distribute includes 17,000 separate pieces. They are books of the cheaper classification and do not include the large geography, etc. The free books belong to grades up to Standard 5. The gift includes all scholars, regardless of the ability of the parents to buy. This year's disthibution is much larger than that of the first year, 1925. Saint John naturally enjoys the largest portion of this gift each issue by reason of its larger number of scholars.
