ILLNESS HAD MADE HIM GIVE UP HIS CAREER

Many Buildings in N. B. Monuments to His Skill

RETIRED LAST MAY

Graduated From Old Grammar School and Then Took Up Profession

SAINT JOHN today lost one of its leading citizens when word was received here by Hon. J. P. D. Tilley, K. C., of the death of F. Neil Brodie, which occurred this morning at his summer residence at Brown's Flats. He had been in failing health for the last three years and was forced to give up work last November. He went to a North Carolina resort and was told that he was suffering from an advanced case of tuberculosis. He returned to Saint John and spent some time in the Saint John County Hospital. Last June he went to Brown's Flats, where he converted a cottage into a sanatorium, and where he was lovingly cared for by Mrs. Brodie and his brother, William. Only three weeks ago when visited by a friend from the city, he expressed confidence that he would recover, but the family, in view of his condition, could not entertain that hope.

SOME OF HIS WORK

Some of the buildings designed by Mr. Brodie were the nurses' home in Saint John, the Saint John County Hospital, the King George, St. Peter's, St. Patrick's and St. Thomas' schools, Moncton City Hospital, Fredericton High School, Campbellton High School and the Saint John Vocational School. He also designed the handsome stone residence at South Bay known as the Baker residence. Mr. Brodie was a graduate of the Saint John Grammar School about 1880. He went to the United States for a while and gained much experience in architectural offices. On his return he was associated with the late G. Ernest Fairweather and R. C. John Duns. He also was at one time with H. H. Mott. In January, 1901, he opened his own office. On May 1 of this year he was forced to sever his connection with his profession because of ill health and the business was taken over by H. S. Brenna who had been with Mr. Brodie for several years. Mr. Brodie had been president of Saint John Real Estate Company since its inception 20 years ago.

CAPTAIN OF STR.

MARGARET GIVES EVIDENCE TODAY

Apparently this was "a transmitted request". Inspector Lemaue supported recommendations of W. C. Acker, Collector of Customs, at Halifax, made yesterday, in regard to control of smuggling by land. He declared that if he had the force mentioned by Mr. Acker yesterday to police the coast line, he could stop smuggling.

The case of the schooner D. C. Mulholland was referred to. The inspector said that he felt they had enough evidence to allow seizure of this ship. "It is an entirely of your opinion," interjected Mr. Calder.

The inspector explained that a legal seizure was allowed as to the identity of the vessel, and the case was lost.

SERGEANT BLAKENEY.

Sergeant J. P. Blakeney, of the R. C. M. P., was the next witness. He and one other man were employed in customs work.

The sergeant gave evidence in regard to the Franco-Canadian Import Company. Rabinovitch, of this company, was illegally trafficking in liquor, using a large motor truck to transport the goods, he said; the company was doing a legitimate business part of the time.

By means of the information derived from an informant, the company was considered a good case against Rabinovitch, and prosecution was planned. The case was submitted to counsel, who said it was a good case. He had laid an information against Rabinovitch and obtained a summons, but when he came to serve the summons he could not find Rabinovitch. He had been informed that Rabinovitch had gone to Ottawa, and then came instructions from Ottawa to proceed no further with the case. It was still open.

Mr. Calder asked who was associated with Rabinovitch in this company.

The witness replied that J. P. Mitchell, of Halifax, was associated with Rabinovitch.

BAIL ARRANGED

Walter Bell, sent up for trial on a charge of stealing, was today released on bail. Application was made to Judge J. A. Barry by Burton L. Gierow, counsel for Bell. Bell entered into his own surety for \$1,000 and his father, William T. Bell, for \$500, and William Wall for a like amount.

SPECIAL STREET RAILWAY PASS FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

BRITISH IMMIGRANTS

An English preacher in Toronto has once more put forward the British side of Empire settlement, but not altogether happily. Superficially, the emigration problem stands as follows:

These are the two sides and both are reasonable arguments. The older countries have greater resources and more advanced machinery for dealing with unemployment. A proportion of unemployed which would be disastrous to Canada can be cared for in Great Britain. But, on the other hand, if Great Britain sends to Canada, say, half a million agriculturalists whose activities would provide work for, say, a quarter of a million city workers...

Canada is altogether right in declining to take unnecessary chances of immigrants becoming a liability to the country. No country will throw itself open as an asylum for another's hulk, maim and blind. It is unfortunate that the preacher should say of the Bishop of London's statement that England could ship a million of her best.

That gives the impression that England only wishes to dispose of her riff-raff, and to those who would not know what to do with work if they got it Canada has nothing to offer. Certainly there is no role for such in Canada.

MARGUERITE WITHOUT PLAITS It is feared that advertisement rather than devotion to art is at the back of a German prima donna's desire to sing the part of Marguerite in Faust displaying her own bobbed hair rather than wearing the conventional faxen plaits called for by the role. The Theban plan art has gained momentum by the development of scenic effects and costume to convey correct atmosphere.

Huge River Cables Laid (Vancouver Province) The largest cables to conduct power across a river have just been installed at St. Louis, Mo., spanning the Mississippi River from the huge Cahokia power plant. Three 18,000-volt cables, each 1/2 inches thick and 2,500 feet long, were laid. Previously the maximum length of such cables that could be manufactured was 1,200 feet. It is planned to install 24 more of these 2,500-foot, single-length cables from Cahokia to St. Louis.

Thought Information About Cruise of Margaret Was Reliable

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 25.—A. J. Doucet, former Conservative member of Parliament for Kent, N. B., told Sir Francis Lemieux today just what he had said from the public platform in regard to the cruise of the Margaret and why he had said it. He had made his references to the cruise of the Margaret in two speeches at Saint John and Bridgewater when accompany-

ing Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, prime minister, on his Maritime province tour. Mr. Doucet said: "As far as I can remember, I said in Saint John that the Margaret was taken off her course to Three Rivers where she took Hon. Jacques Bureau and a party of eight on board," he said, "that she then called at Quebec, and there took Hon. Ernest Lapointe on board."

At this point, R. L. Calder, K.C., commission counsel, intervened. "I may say in extenuation of Mr. Doucet that when I heard the name of this informant, if this same information had been given to me by the same informant I would have considered it a proper matter for investigation, and that it is not unlikely that a lay mind, which jumps at conclusions a little more quickly than a legal mind, might be misled," he said.

Mr. Doucet submitted the page of the log-book covering July 18, 1926. It was page 57. He read from it this quotation: "2:30 afternoon. Left with launch, Hon. J. Bureau and Hon. Ernest Lapointe and party. Took them round harbor."

"At Charlottetown," replied Mr. Doucet. He had concluded that Mr. Lapointe had come on board the vessel at Three Rivers or Quebec, and this, substantiated by the information which he had received from the unnamed person, had led him to the conclusion that Mr. Lapointe had been on the Margaret during the whole voyage. Speaking at Bridgewater, said Mr. Doucet, he informed his hearers that Mr. Lapointe denied that he had been on the Margaret. "I said I would accept his denial, but I insisted that his name was on the log," said Mr. Doucet.

"Did you use the expression 'joy-ride or joy-sail'?" asked R. L. Calder, K.C., commission counsel. "Yes," replied Mr. Doucet. "Did you have any intention of indicating that it was a sail with women?" "None whatever."

Calder explained that he wanted to correct an impression made at the Quebec hearing on that occasion he (Mr. Calder) had stated that there was nothing to support the statements made by Mr. Doucet from the public platform. He wanted to make it clear that on that occasion he had referred to what Mr. Doucet was reported by the newspapers to have said.

"That is for you to decide," replied Mr. Calder. He thought, however, that if Mr. Doucet had been reported as saying things which he had not said, he should have a chance to correct the mistake. L. A. Fosyth, of Halifax, appearing for Mr. Bureau, questioned Mr. Doucet briefly.

HALIFAX, Aug. 25.—A message from the light station, Scatarie Island, this evening to C. H. Harvey, local agent of the Marine and Fisheries Department, stated that Patrick Wadden, 58, was drowned this morning, two miles east of the light while sword fishing. The body was not recovered. Wadden was a widower and leaves nine children, seven sons and two daughters.

HOME OFFICE HINTS DRIVE ON PICKETING


Intimidating Tactics at English Mines Likely to Prove Boomerang





DEAR MISS DIX—I am a young man in college, very much in love with a girl who, I feel sure, returns my affection. Shall we become engaged? I am afraid to have her wait for me for fear that when I have finished my college career, which will take several years more, my fancy will be turned to a younger girl and that I will have lost my love for her. I do not wish to be unfair to the girl, for she is now at the age when she could make the best match. What advice do you give? J. N. R.

It is not often that the man in love considers the woman's side of the case and the injustice that he may be doing her by asking her to stake her whole life's happiness on the gamble of what he may or may not feel three or four years hence. Yet it is a vital matter to the girl, because her youth is the brief day of sunshine in which a woman must make her matrimonial hay and provide herself with a home and a husband if she is to have them at all.

From 18 to 25 is the time when a maiden is most attractive to men. Between those two milestones almost every girl can find a husband, but after that she strikes the trail where eligible men are few and far between. It is, therefore, a cruelly selfish thing for a man to prevent a girl from marrying while she is good in order to wait for him on the supposition that he may still want her somewhere in the indefinite future.

Very often he doesn't want her when the time comes for him to make good, and he either throws her over, a jilted old maid whose romance days are over, or else he marries her from a sense of duty, and she finds herself that most forlorn of all creatures, an unloved and unwanted wife. ANSWER:
Go on and marry your young man. Live your own life and be happy. Your parents are utterly unreasonable and selfish in wanting to sacrifice you to their own comfort and pleasure, and you will be very silly if you permit them to do so. Suppose they are kind and loving to you and did take good care of you and educate you. That was nothing but their duty, since they brought you into the world, and it gives them no right to enslave you for the remainder of your life.

You will observe that your mother didn't consider that she was obligated to stay at home with her mother and child and comfort her. She married and set up her own home and had the full normal life of a woman, and she is cruelly selfish to deny that to you.

If she really loved her daughter she would want her to have the bliss of being loved, the comfort of having a good husband, the pleasure of her own home, the joy of a baby's head on her breast, the certainty of having someone to care for her in her old age. Then into this hot syrup stir slowly the whites of three eggs beaten stiff. Add three-quarters cup of fine ground walnut meats. Beat till it is well mixed and either pour into a mold or sherbert glasses. It is to be served with either custard sauce or whipped cream.

refuge with respect to this transaction behind the fact that the contract was made by the Canadian National Railways. That, however, was not a justification for the government granting permission for the awarding of the contract at this time. Appropriations for the Canadian National Railways were made by Parliament just as were appropriations for all other public purposes. The appropriations for the contract for the Vancouver Hotel had not been made in the estimates submitted to Parliament nor had the awarding of the contract had the approval of Parliament in any form. It was something more than a coincidence that when Mr. Meighen formed his previous Cabinet and brought Dr. Toole of Victoria into it as a member, a contract of over \$6,000,000 was awarded for a graving dock at Victoria. Now that Mr. Stevens of Vancouver, had been taken into the government a contract of over \$3,000,000 of which the government had approved had just been awarded in that city.

EXTRA SIGNIFICANCE

Of additional significance was the fact that each of these contracts was awarded without any advertisements and competition, and that no tenders had been called for and that both had been awarded during the period of a session, he declared.

Hon. Mr. King said when Sir Wilfrid appealed to the country in 1911, tenders had been called for the building of ships of the Canadian Naval Service both on the Atlantic and on the Pacific Coast. The contracts were ready to be awarded when the dissolution of Parliament was being discussed. Sir Wilfrid Laurier took the view, however, that to award a contract for my large amount of money on the eve of or during the period of a general election was an indefensible course of procedure and that to award contracts of large amounts at such a time was to justify the suspicion in the public mind that one way or another they were connected with the campaign itself, the Liberal chief said.


HOTEL IN VANCOUVER

Mr. King added that he wished to make it clear that he had nothing to say about the need for a hotel in the city of Vancouver or the propriety of a contract for that purpose being awarded at the right time and surrounded by the right precautions. He, in no way, wished to reflect upon or criticize the Canadian National Railway management as a party to the transaction, as the railways had not proceeded in the matter until duly authorized for the purpose by the provincial administration. What he was taking strong exception to was the present government presuming to award contracts directly or indirectly or to obligate the country to any course of expenditure seeing that the government itself was one which Parliament had declared to be illegal and which, as matters now stand, is without authority to carry out either at the instance of Parliament or the people.


FAIR POSTPONED.

SAINT JOHN VOCATIONAL SCHOOL

This modern school aims to give every boy and girl who enrolls a Sound General Education, together with adequate Vocational Guidance and Training.

It is open to students from any part of New Brunswick. The following is an outline of the four courses to start after Labor Day 1926. Each course is of three years' duration except course No. 1, which is two years only.

NO. 1. JUNIOR OR PRE VOCATIONAL COURSE

Students for this must have passed through grade 6 and be not less than 13 years of age. This course prepares pupils for writing High School entrance, or entering directly upon Vocational courses.

NO. 3. PRACTICAL ARTS (Home Economics) COURSE

This course is for girls, and is a happy combination of cultural and utility subjects. It prepares them for scientific management of the home, or prepares the girl for entrance to the nursing profession.

NO. 2. INDUSTRIAL HIGH SCHOOL COURSE

A three year course for boys of High School entrance standing; designed to train boys for the trade of their choice, or to enter engineering college. Half of the time will be spent in shop work, including Electrical, Motor mechanics, Machine shop, Print shop, Draughting and Woodworking courses.

NO. 4. HIGH SCHOOL OF COMMERCE COURSE

This course is designed for boys and girls who plan to enter business. In addition to the broad general education, the following practical subjects are included: Shorthand, typewriting, bookkeeping, commercial geography, business correspondence, history of commerce, office practice, salesmanship, economics, banking, law, commercial art, French and Spanish.

In addition to the above High School courses, special intensive day courses in practical subjects only, of one and two years' duration will be offered persons over 16 years of age, who can profit by the instruction.

Evening classes for adults will open the first week of October.

He has to work for a living and in the past has not been able to take the trips that Lacoste and Borotra have made around international courts.

Cochet in the past has been regarded as an "in and out" good one day and not so good the next, and there is no doubt that his inconsistency of form came as a result of not being able to play as much as his fellow countrymen, Tilden, Richards and other American players. The same is true of a number of good English players who would rate much higher in international tennis if they could pay more attention to the game.

Cochet is certain to be a hit in the United States not only because of his great game, but because of his likable personality. He is another Billy Johnston on the courts and off the courts and certainly nothing finer can be said of any man.

HOPEFUL SIGN SEEN OVER COOK'S MOVE IN BRITISH STRIKE

Sends Message to Ministry of Labor; Another Act Hints Long Fight

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Aug. 25.—One development in the coal situation today is taken as a possible move toward peace, while another might be considered as preparations for continuance of the strike.

A. J. Cook, secretary of the Miners' Federation, it was announced, had been in communication with the Ministry of Labor and this was interpreted as a hopeful sign, especially as Mr. Cook said that he and the other leaders desired a meeting with Sir Arthur Steel-Maitland, who is in charge of the situation in behalf of the government.

Mr. Cook's message was passed on to Sir Arthur, who is in Scotland, and it is understood that he will return to London tomorrow.

In the meantime arrangements are going on for Parliament to meet in short session next Monday to confirm the government's emergency regulations, which automatically expire Aug. 30.

Two proclamations signed by the King were published by the Official Gazette today, one declaring a continuance of the "state of emergency" and the other summoning Parliament to convene Aug. 30. Parliament will re-consider the state of emergency unless there is definite proof that the miners and mine owners will settle their differences in the next few days.

Probably all the members of Parliament, except Lady Astor and Miss Wilkinson, will hurry to London from various parts of the country in expectation of lively debates regarding the striking and alleged interference by the police in the mine fields.


Thos. Santucci Puts Bullets into Youth's Head as He Sits in Auto



WAS MEMBER OF ORANGE ORDER FOR 64 YEARS

Sons Here Notified of Death of Albert L. Duplisa

DIES IN HOSPITAL IN FREDERICTON

Veteran Had Reached His 82nd Year—Death Followed Operation

Albert L. Duplisa, aged 81 years, a well known native of Fredericton Junction, and for years an outstanding personality in the life of York county because of his widespread charities and hospitality, passed away in the Victoria Hospital, Fredericton, early this morning following a surgical operation. He leaves his wife, five sons and four daughters. Sons living in Saint John are C. A. Duplisa, of the Duplisa Piano Company, and C. J. Duplisa, blacksmith. The Saint John members of the family use the old French spelling of their name. The aged resident was perhaps the most conspicuous figure in New Brunswick Orangism, having joined that organization when he had a meeting held in a village home, aged 64 years ago.

LARGE FAMILY

The other children of Mr. Duplisa are David A., a partner with his late father at Fredericton Junction; John A., with the C. P. R., at Sherbrooke, P. Q.; Frank B., train dispatcher for the Bangor and Ansonabook at Bangor, Maine; Mrs. John A. Nason of Fredericton Junction; Mrs. B. B. Jordan, McAdam Junction; Mrs. Frederick Tupper, Fredericton; and Mrs. W. F. Blair of Fredericton are daughters. A sister living in St. John is Mrs. Fredrick Duplisa of Belleville, Sunbury county.

BROTHER LIVED TO 95

The longevity of Mr. Duplisa's immediate family was again emphasized last autumn when his brother Andrew, in his 95th year, fell victim to an automobile accident near Providence, N. B. Mr. Duplisa, who died this morning, was a well known general blacksmith at Fredericton Junction where he had a lucrative business connection for a large number of years.

HISTORIC INITIATION

Mr. Duplisa's initiation into the Orange Order took place in 1862 in the Orange Hall at York Junction, a building which is still standing. Authority for this initiation was derived from a borrowed warrant, Number 11, but later on a lodge was instituted under the name Star of the Boyne, No. 98. When he moved to Fredericton Junction 20 years later Mr. Duplisa transferred his membership to Sunbury Lodge No. 145, upon whose banner he has brought renown in the fraternity for his length of service.

IN EARLY DAYS

Mr. Duplisa was born at Hoyt Station in 1845, his father being John Duplisa and his mother Susan. He acquired the elements of education in a log hut under the tutelage of Levi Sharp. Early in his married life he learned the shoemaking trade in which he was assisted by his wife. Mr. Duplisa attended the school at the old European & American Railroad, running from Saint John to Mattawankeag. Mr. Duplisa led a strenuous life until an accident on the railway caused him to give up that work.

ONCE WORKED HERE

When the fire of 1877 laid Saint John in waste Mr. Duplisa superintended the building operations for a structure now occupied by the W. H. Hayward Co., Ltd., Princess street. In 1882 he returned to Fredericton Junction where he conducted a wagon-building and blacksmith business up to the time of his retirement. He was the possessor of the 80-year service gold medal, presented by the Grand Orange Lodge of New Brunswick, and has been the recipient of numerous gifts from his friends in various parts of the province because of his distinguished citizenship. Mr. Duplisa's funeral will be held at two o'clock on Sunday from the bereaved home at Fredericton Junction and will be conducted with full Orange honors.

The gift includes all schoolbooks, regardless of the ability of the parents to buy. This year's distribution is much larger than that of the first year, 1925. Saint John naturally enjoys the largest portion of this gift each issue by reason of its larger number of scholars.

NEW PASS PROJECT

Street Railway Issuing School Day Ticket For School Children Here

An announcement of particular interest to parents has been made by the New Brunswick Power Company to the effect that a special street railway pass for school children is being issued. This is something entirely new to Saint John, and is expected to prove a considerable economy to families whose children live at some distance from the schools which they attend. The new pass will allow school children to travel free school days, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., and will be sold only at the company's office each Friday afternoon from 3:30 to 4:30. Formerly, school children using passes were called upon to pay \$1.25, the regular pass rate, but the special children's pass will cost only 80 cents, representing a saving of 45 cents a week for each scholar.

REMAINED IN AUTO CASE
