

HUNGARIANS ERECT MONUMENT TO AMERICAN RED CROSS CHIEF

Budapest, May 13—(Associated Press)—The first European statue to a living American has been erected by Hungary in honor of James A. Pellow, American Red Cross commissioner here. It is situated in the municipal park, near the Washington memorial.

In his address at the unveiling ceremonies Count Apponyi declared that "the Americans are the only real pacifists in the world who are showing a spirit of reconciliation in their generous charity toward the vanquished."

Thousands of children in gala dress paraded in front of the statue and heaped flowers around it.

who should come in and take a share in solving once and for all this educational problem. Dalhousie's attitude is well-known. It is written in her charter of 1868, which contemplated and made provision for just such a merger as is proposed.

Windsor, N. S., May 10—King's is willing to co-operate to any reasonable degree toward consummating the proposed federation of the maritime province colleges. Toward that purpose a committee was appointed toward the Board of Governors of King's College, which met this afternoon to view to a full discussion of the problem.

Prominent members of the board were asked by The Morning Chronicle representatives to give some statement of the attitude of the meeting toward the recent proposal of having the colleges of the maritime provinces federated into a great central university at Halifax.

The reply was that "The Morning Chronicle may state the board took no very definite action because there was no definite proposal before the meeting. The Carnegie Foundation, which it has been already intimated, is preparing an offer of financial assistance if such an amalgamation takes place, had not yet put forward its proposals in a concrete form.

The Board of Governors of King's, however, passed a resolution expressing their willingness and desire to enter into a conference with the Carnegie Foundation, and possible federation which may be in the interest of higher education and at the same time for the welfare of the church and the university itself."

The Federation Plan. It is proposed that Acadia, Dalhousie, St. Francis Xavier, Kings and Mount Allison should each leave its present campus and build a new set of buildings on a new campus in Halifax, each one forming a group about a central university. Each would form a unit or college in the university.

The new name would be given but each college would retain its own name and character. Each of the colleges would give up its degree conferring power and all degrees save those in Theology would be conferred by the university.

In the following pages the terms of the proposed federation are set forth in detail. The subjects taught by the university would be Astronomy, Biology, Chemistry, Education, Geology, Physics, Psychology.

Subjects which might be taught by either the colleges or the university are Mathematics, Social Science and the less familiar languages. This grouping gives to the university all the teaching in the experimental sciences which require elaborate laboratory equipment, and thereby would obviate duplication among the colleges and mean greater economy in operation.

Each college would teach all its own Freshmen. After the first year, students, though registered at one college and resident in its dormitories, might also and would take work in their college or at the university. In addition each college would have its own Theological studies.

The Medical, Dental, Pharmacy, Law and Engineering Schools would be under the direction and control of the university. The necessity of such schools being a city would go to the extended facilities of the Dalhousie campus and equipment were important factors in locating the university in Halifax.

Each college would specialize in a limited number of subjects, e.g., English and Mathematics and would have full professors in those subjects who would be head of these departments in their respective colleges. There would be, also, Associate or Assistant Professors or Instructors in other departments.

Each college would retain its present endowment and such property as it possesses or may acquire for use as student dormitories, class rooms, etc. All libraries and laboratory apparatus would go to the university except for such special limited library collections as might be needed by each college, e.g., in Theological departments.

All student fees for tuition or incidentals in the colleges or universities would go to the university. The income of each college would be determined by its endowment and would measure the extent to which each college could participate in the general enterprise. The bulk of the income would be for compensation to teachers which could go as far above a fixed minimum as desired and the balance would be for the college would consist in the relative quality of their staffs.

The collective endowments of the colleges would be about \$2,000,000. There would be needed for the building of the college buildings an estimated amount of \$3,000,000. In addition it is estimated that \$2,500,000 more would be needed by the university to complete the Arts building already started and to furnish endowments. This, with the endowment of the colleges, would give an income of approximately \$250,000 yearly. In addition, student fees would provide \$750,000 and it is expected that, by the three provinces, another \$100,000 would be voted annually in proportion to the number of students sent from these provinces.

This would give a total income from all sources of \$425,000. It is suggested that if the University of New Brunswick enters the federation it should form a part of the Central University.

The governors of the college would be appointed as present unless some changes were made by them. They would administer their secondary schools located as at present; appoint officers, and control the life of the college.

The University Board of Governors. The governors of the University would consist of: (a) The Chancellor. (b) Five members, one named by the Board of Governors of each college. (c) Twelve members named by invitation in the charter.

The Council of Faculty of Arts. 1 by the Lieutenant Governor in Council of New Brunswick. 1 by the Lieutenant Governor in Council of Newfoundland. This gives a total of eighteen. Its duties would be to: (a) Appoint all officers of administration in the university. (b) Confirm appointments of professors in the colleges who do work in more than one college. (c) Fix schedule of academic titles. (d) Fix uniform minimum salary scale for colleges and universities. (e) Fix all charges for tuition and all fees payable by students in the university or by students receiving instruction in more than one college.

The University Senate. It would deal with question of general academic policy, with the approval and granting of degrees, with the establishment of new faculties or departments and any other matters referred to it by the board or faculties. Its duties would be to prepare matters for reference to the faculty and to investigate and execute matters referred to them by the Faculty.

UNIVERSITY FEDERATION

Outline of the Scheme for One Big Educational Centre.

Endowments \$2,500,000—The Proposal Reviewed by Pres. MacKenzie of Dalhousie—Carnegie Foundation to Help.

(Pres. MacKenzie of Dalhousie University.) "The most important matter in the field of education in this part of Canada is the renewed interest which has been aroused over the possibility of federating the various colleges of the maritime provinces, so as to have one strong and efficient centre of education in this part of the province."

The town council of Amherst has voted \$200 to assist those who are out of employment in securing seed and fertilizer for the cultivation of garden plots this summer. Why not revive interest in this project in St. John this spring? It might help the unemployed.



OPEN TO WORLD

MENTAL TESTS IN SCHOOLS



Between Third and Half of Children Not Normal.

The Range of Intelligence is from Genius to Idiocy—The Need of the Mental Clinic.

To the Editor of The Times:

Sir—A far-reaching study of the average progress of our school children, of the country and city schools, is furnishing us with convincing evidence of the seriousness of the retardation problem that are facing us in all our schools today. Proper mental tests, not mere guessing, has shown that between a third and a half of the school children in the United States fail to progress through their work which should be normal. Terman shows that ten per cent of the \$400,000,000 that is spent each year by the United States for instruction of their children is used in order to re-instruct the retarded pupils who frequently find that a child has been in the same grade for several terms. I examined a family only last week which consisted of three children who had been at school for from six to eight years, twelve to fourteen terms, had not one of them advanced beyond the third grade, while another, a girl who had gone to school from six to sixteen, had managed to get into the third grade. I will acknowledge that these are extreme cases, but they are far more common in both our city and country schools than is perhaps known, and the difference between these and the only slightly retarded child is but one of degree of intelligence, and not kind of intelligence.

No doubt much has been done by educational reforms and by the individual efforts of some of our more enlightened teachers for these unfortunate children, but at the best the results have been disappointing and discouraging, and chiefly because of the belief that under proper conditions all children have an equal or almost equal capacity for making the required progress, and the fact that our present school system is based on an average child mentality. There seems to be a general idea that there are two well defined classes among our school children, normal or definitely feeble-minded. To the contrary, we find, on doing a scientific intelligence measurement, that there are many grades of intelligence, grading from the idiot on the one hand up through the normal to genius on the other. For general information I may state that we use a scientific measurement of intelligence, which is a revision of the Binet-Simon test scale, by which we are able to measure the mental age of each child within a month, and also estimate its degree of intelligence, or, as we say, its intelligence quotient. The classification is somewhat as follows:

Above 140—Genius or near.
120-140—Very superior.
110-120—Superior.
90-110—Normal, average.
80-90—Border-line; may be dullness or feeble-minded.
60-80—Feeble-minded.
Below 50—Idiot.

Thus we come to understand that with such vast individual differences of mental investment there are like vast capacities for profit from the best instruction.

Must we not consider it a great waste of time and money and energy to attempt to teach the mental defective children on a level of progress which has been built into a system for the average normal child? Would it not be wiser to seriously consider these various inequalities of our children, as to their original endowment, to give us and make the necessary changes in our course of study so as to allow of progress at a rate normal to the child? This would go far to prevent much of the retardation, the kind that so often spells failure for the child, as well as the repetition of grades so common in all of our schools.

Fully into the question, are aware of the large proportion of children that are acquiring a habit of failure at school, which lessens their spirit for work and destroys any little self-confidence they may have saved from home conflicts. The remedy for this serious condition is, first, to measure the backward children's intelligence and then to proportion the work according to their ability. When our new C. P. R. bridge across the Falls was to be built the engineer in charge of the work was to be ment to work, to depend on patching up any thing that went wrong afterward. If our educational efforts are to be of any value, we must be able to find out if the child's failure is due to its lack of native intelligence, or interest, or improper teaching, or some other cause that might be removed.

It is not sufficient to just remove a child into a special class because it seems retarded, without a proper psychological test. There should be a scientific diagnosis and classification at least of every child that is in the least retarded—also those who are super-normal, for it is necessary to know the degree of the defect; for there are many high grade defectives who are easily overlooked, the moron grade whose mental development ceases somewhere between the ages of seven and twelve years, that is, no matter what their physical age their mental age remains for all time between seven and twelve. Some of these will perhaps drag along through the grades up to the fifth or sixth, but never get any further. That is, they cease to be able to develop in abstract thought, though many, nearly all, if properly taught, will make quite a success of some form of manual work and so become self-supporting, thus an asset to the community.

It is largely this last type of child, the high grade moron, that figures in the juvenile delinquent class, and is the chief source of trouble to the teacher, the truant officer, the probation officer, and the juvenile court; largely because he or she is not recognized for a defective without proper psychological testing, and is so apt to come in for punishment instead of proper care.

These defective children are by no means only found among our working classes, as we who work among them know, but frequently come from good homes surrounded by every advantage and care. It is from these mental defectives that practically all our criminals, paupers, prostitutes, inebriates, homo-sexuals, vagrant, homeless, unemployed, etc., come.

A NEW LEASE OF LIFE FOR AMATEUR SPORT IN YORK CO.

Enthusiastic Meeting in Fredericton Last Night.

Will Form Amateur Baseball League in County—Plans for a Body to Control All Sport Made.

Fredericton, N. B., May 12.—That the amateur sporting spirit of York county is not yet dead was clearly evidenced by the enthusiasm with which proposals for the formation of a York county amateur baseball league were received and approved unanimously by the players and fans at a large meeting held last evening in the Y. M. C. A.

The meeting, which had been called for the purpose of considering the prospects for amateur sport this summer, says the Gleaser today, "gave assurance in York county a new lease of life."

It was unanimously decided to proceed with the formation of an amateur York county baseball league to be comprised of at least three and most probably four teams.

The meeting was addressed by Dr. A. Sterling, president of the N. B. and P. E. L. Amateur Hockey League. He pointed out the difficulties which lay in the paths of amateurs who had any thought of branching into independent or professional sport. Dr. Sterling referred to the amateur teams which had existed in Fredericton and vicinity in the past which had won the highest laurels through clean sport. He was ably seconded in his contentions by other speakers.

A suggestion for the formation of an amateur athletic association which would control all amateur sport in the county and city met with hearty approval. A temporary organization was formed last evening for the purpose of carrying on until a further organization meeting can be held.





The amendment also places a tax of \$15,000 per annum on liquor warehouses and increases the exemption granted companies from \$20,000 to \$100,000 for taxation purposes.



SENSATION IN
STILLMAN CASE

Detective Admits Paying \$15,000 to Beauvais for Letters Alleged Written by Mrs. Stillman.

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., May 13.—The hearing of testimony in the Stillman case closed with a sensation yesterday when a detective hired by James A. Stillman, New York banker and plaintiff, testified that he and Outbridge Horsey, one of Mr. Stillman's lawyers, had paid \$15,000 to Fred Beauvais, Indian guide, named as respondent, for four letters alleged to have been written to Beauvais by Mrs. Anne U. Stillman.

The purchase of the letters from Beauvais, who Mr. Stillman contends is the father of three-year-old Guy Stillman, was made in Montreal this week, the detective, Edmund Leigh, said. It was arranged through James Shean, a New York newspaper man, Leigh explained. The letters, replete with terms of endearment, were accepted in evidence after Mrs. Stillman had denied writing them. She swore the handwriting was not her own, but Harriet, Hibbard, housekeeper for Mr. Stillman, looked at them and then said to the best of her recollection the handwriting was Mrs. Stillman's.

DOUBTS STATEMENT

Montreal, May 13.—In connection with a New York dispatch stating that Fred Beauvais, Indian guide, had sold to James A. Stillman four letters alleged to have been written him by the banker's wife, containing various endearing terms for the sum of \$15,000, to be used against her in the legal divorce battle now in progress, John G. Gardner, associate editor of The Standard, and author of a lengthy history on Beauvais' life which is now being circulated by the United Feature Syndicate, emphatically declared this morning that he did not believe there was a word of truth in it. "I knew Beauvais intimately," he said, "and I am certain that he never received any such sum from Stillman or anybody else. As a matter of fact he is even now trying to raise a few thousand dollars for the development of two or three little schemes he is interested in."

BEAT WOMAN TO DEATH AND ROBBED HER OF JEWELS

was fractured in two places, both jaw were broken and there was a deep gash below her left eye. The third finger of her left hand was broken and lacerated in an attempt to secure a diamond ring which was still on the finger. Several diamond rings were missing.

The living room gave evidence of desperate struggle. A man's tooth was found under a small table. It had been broken off short and it is the only clue police have to the identity of the man.
