Features of Bill Introduced by Hon. A. K. McLean

ACTION AFTER BUDGET

Add Two to Commission and In-

tical — Ottawa Gossip About
Tariff

Ottawa, June 11—The civil service bill introduced in parliament yesterday by Hon. A. K. MacLean contains some particulars other than those covered in the resolution on which the bill was based and which was adopted by the house recently. The bill and the re-classification of the civil service will be fully explained by the minister on the second reading, which will likely be deferred until after the budget debate.

The bill sets aside the distinction between the inside and outside services and provides that men who do the same to be of a practical character. Examinations will be competitive and returned soldiers will be given the same preference as at present. Provision is made in the bill for the payment of overtime except to civil servants occupying administrative or executive positions.

Provisions are made for a re-classification of the service with the guarantee that no one in the service will receive a lower salary than at present.
