





The steel workers have been bringing pressure to bear upon the War Industries Board to induce the government to influence manufacturers to grant a still further increase in pay, notwithstanding that the last two years wages have been increased on a greater scale than in any other industry, increases granted by the United States Steel Corporation since Jan. 1, 1916, having amounted to nearly 104 per cent.

One prominent steel manufacturer said: "The profiteering of American labor is a very serious phase of the industrial situation. Puddlers in the steel mills are earning as much as \$80 a day automobiles. The boys who are fighting in the trenches are getting only \$30 a month. The latter make no complaint, but the steel workers want still higher pay."



Kindergartens Win Prestige In States

With Plea of Educationists

New York, Sept. 3—The advance in kindergarten education throughout the country for the year 1917-1918 is noted in a bulletin issued by the bureau of education of the department of the interior. During the school year 1917-1918 five states have developed their kindergarten laws in accordance with the suggestion of the United States bureau of education, while the organization of mothers and clubwomen devoted to the education of children has received remarkable impetus in every part of the

In Maine and Texas the new laws authorize the school boards to open kindergartens wherever parents petition for them. This makes it possible for a community to determine for itself without the slightest degree of difficulty whether it desires the advantages of a kindergarten training for its children. In Maine, a feature of the legislative campaign was the presence of ten of the kindergarten children of Bangor before the education committee of the house on the hearing of the kindergarten.

women's clubs were effective in arousing sentiment for kindergartens all over the state. The education officials of the state supported the measure from the start, and the result was not only successful legislation but a widespread public sentiment for the best type of kindergarter twicing

The amendment to the Washington law, although it does not expressly state that parents may petition for a kindergarten, is practically the same in effect, since it provides that a kindergarten shall constitute a part of the regular school system and shall be supported in the same way that primary and grammar courses are supported. The result is that when fathers and mothers make known their wishes for a kindergarten as part of the public school system of The following arguments presented by a representative of the Congress of Mothers in Washington were effective in obtaining legislation:

(1) The early years are the most impressionable and in a wise educational system these years should not be left system these years about not be actually unprovided for.

(2) Little children receive a good start not only in school but in life through the excellent training which the kin-

dergarten gives.

(3) The majority of parents who want kindergarten training for their children cannot afford to pay tuition at private (4) The kindergarten is democratic in that it brings additional educational advantages to all children before any must

(5) One dollar spent in right formation is better than a hundred spent for reformation later. In Oregon progress was made in kindergarten legislation despite considerable opposition. The new law applies only to the City of Portland, and has the further restriction that not more than five and not less than three kindergartens much be installed during the year. It is
