## COAL DISTRICT Warning That Strikes Are Not To Be Taken Too Seriously

The Berne correspondent of the Daily Mail deprecates a too ready assumption that the strike will have serious effects in Germany. He says no strike or

revolt in Prussia can be taken seriously until it has won its spurs.

"The mind and moral will of the whole population has been made too effectively mechanical by a century of military drill. It must be remembered, too, that strike funds are almost non-existent in Prussia for, although the workmen have been earning high wages' they have virtually been compelled to subscribe them nearly all to the war loans and get no interest."

Newspaper opinion in London regarding the strike is divergent. Some papers incline to the belief that the strike realy denotes the growing strength of a democratic spirit in Germany, while others favor the view that the whole thing to a great extent has been engineered by the government for its own purposes. The Dafly News, while accepting with reserve the more extravagant accounts, thinks it is obvious that there has been spread into Germany and Austria some measure of the spirit which dethroned the Russian Emperor. It adds:





## Household Survey of Stocks of Foods

there is on hand in this state and the statistics obtained in this survey are desired as a guide in the conservation of food surplies in the United States.

The survey in Maine is part of the comprehensive inventory of food resources in this country and is known as the war emergency food survey. This survey will touch every dealer in food and food materials, every food manufacturer, and every holder of substantial quantities of foods. A separate schedule will be sent to a representative number of specially selected homes throughout the country and upon returns from these an estimate will be made for all homes. The act of congress providing for the war emergency food survey fixed a fine not exceeding \$1,000 or imprisonment not exceeding one year or both, as punishment for any individual or concern who wilfully fails to make report when requested, or wilfully reports incorrectly. quested, or wilfully reports incorrectly. The government, however, counts on the full co-operation of the affected trades, industries and individuals, and hopes that there will be very few cases in which it will be necessary to enforce compliance

A CARLOAD OF FISH DIRECT TO THE FARMERS.

Petrolea, Jan. 27—A carload of fresh frozen haddock and codfish from Nova Scotia, packed in 200-pound boxes, will arrive in Petrolea early next week, and arrive in Petrolea early next week, and be sold in unbroken boxes at 9c. per pound, at any point in the county of Lambton. This enterprise is to help out the meat conservation idea. It is made possible by the Ontario government cooperating with the food controller's office at Ottawa, and through the agricultural representative for Lambton, W. P. Macdonald, arranging with the farmers' co-operative clubs to distribute the carload. This is the first car of fish ever imported into Ontario and handled ever imported into Ontario and handled direct to the farmers in this way.







United States Limits Amount Of Flour Bakers May Purchase And Schedule Of Substitutes Is

Washington, Jan. 31-Licensing regulations as applied to bakers were extended by President Wilson in a proclamation tonight to take in hotels, Customs receipts for the month of January were \$233,287.23, as compared with \$238,118.81 for the corresponding month in 1917.


