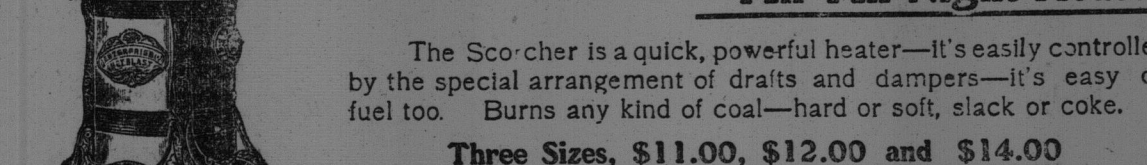

Daily Hints For the Cook

LEMON PIE WITH BREAD CRUMBS. Two slices of baker's bread, one large or boiling water turned over bread and oak until soft, then squeeze quite dry.

TIMES PARIS LETTER

(Times Special Correspondence.) Paris, Oct. 23.—The dramatic actor, H. Henri Bernstein, whose last piece, "Après Moi," was withdrawn at the Comedie Francaise on account of hostile demonstrations, has just obtained permission to re-enter the army and to perform his military service in the Second Artillery Regiment.

An Experiment That Failed. The rate-payers of Elbeuf, a town of 20,000 inhabitants, and the centre of a flourishing cloth industry in the Seine Interieure, have been taught a sharp lesson with regard to the folly of municipalization.

The report on the working of the new municipal services shows that the rate-payers have not even the satisfaction of being supplied with good gas. Never was the town so badly lighted.

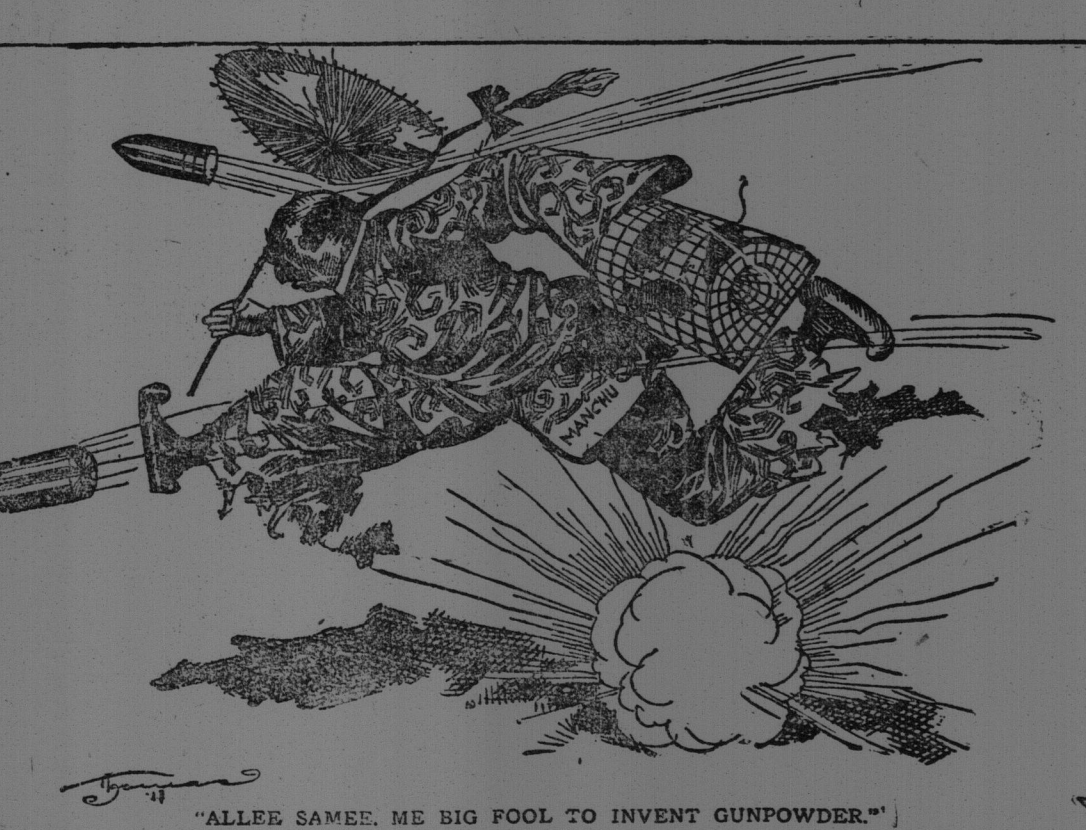

CHILDREN UPON STEPS OF THRONES

Babies' Laughter and Patter Of Hurrying Feet In Royal Households

HEIR TO BRITISH CROWN

Prince of Wales on Borderland Between Childhood and Manhood—Olaf of Norway Press-Ridden Royal Child—Juliana of Holland the Youngest

Copyright, 1911, in the United States by Curtis Brown. (All Rights Reserved.) London, Aug. 24—If a sudden wave of disaster were to sweep over Europe and carry off its reigning monarchs nearly all their successors would be children, none older than 17, and one or two of them mere babies.

England's heir, the Prince of Wales, in his last year of childhood, having just attained his seventeenth year; in fact he may be said to be on the border between childhood and manhood, for, according to royal prerogative, he comes of age next year, when he will have his own establishment and attendants. Up to the time he was at Dartmouth Naval College he figured very seldom in public life, but since he left there he has come much more to the fore, and already he has taken part in some of the stirring events of this year in England.

His life, like those of his four brothers and sisters, has been particularly happy, though distinctly strenuous for a boy. The King and Queen have decided views on his training, and never allow anything to come between him and his lessons. While at Osborne College and Dartmouth—where he was known among his companions as "Sardines"—no difference was made between his life and those of the other boys. On one occasion he gave a tea party to some of his particular chums, with the result that he found himself about one dollar on the wrong side afterward. He wrote to his father asking him for the money, and it was sent to him at once, but a small sum was stopped out of his pocket money every week till the overdraft was paid.

As the Duke of Cornwall he already has an income of between \$400,000 and \$450,000 a year, but that is being looked after carefully till he is of age. Most of the income is derived from his lands in London, and particularly poor parts of London, and King George is now paying particular attention to this property. He has had the whole estate surveyed, and all particular areas laid before him, and all the worst houses are to be pulled down and comfortable dwellings put up in their stead.

Norwegian Prince Prince Edward's first cousin, Olaf of Norway, is the most press-ridden and the most photographed royal child in existence. He is also the heir to the youngest kingdom in Europe, his father, who began life as Prince Charles of Denmark, having been chosen by the Norwegian Storting to be the first king of the country after its separation from Sweden in 1905. He then changed his name to Haakon, and his little son, who began life as Alexander, was renamed Olaf, after the patron saint of Norway.

Olaf, though said to be not over intellectual, is such a bright and pretty child, full of high spirits, and so obviously delighted with everything wherever he goes, that he is a tremendous favorite with the public here at home and abroad. When he first went to Norway as a short-froked baby of two his new subjects paid him so much attention that he was fond of kissing him and his mother was obliged to withdraw him from public view and keep him in the palace grounds for a time, that he is a terrific "chatterbox" and one.

was a great favorite with his grandfather, the late King Edward. He and his mother and father may be said to represent the "simple life" among royalty. A little while ago they were all shopping in the principal street of Christiania, and King Haakon awaited his wife and son outside a shop where the queen was making some feminine purchases. The saleswoman inquired if she might forward the parcel to the palace, when Olaf chipped in: "Oh, no, father's outside. He always carries mother's parcels."

What a different atmosphere is that in which the little Czarevitch, heir of all the Russias, lives with his four sisters! Over their young lives hangs the shadow of danger and death, a shadow which is slowly but surely clouding over the life of their pretty young mother, once the happiest Princess in Europe. Yet though they are guarded day and night by soldiers and secret service agents, though the fear of assassination by bomb or knife is never absent, and though they are practically prisoners in whatever palace they happen to be, these children manage to live fairly happy lives, for as far as possible the terrors that are the perpetual companions of their parents are not allowed to be known by the children.

The little Czarevitch, who made a most welcome appearance at his fourteenth birthday, is the richest and the most heavily insured royal child. On the day he was born the state settled on him an annual income of \$2,000,000, which is to cover all his expenses until he is 15, when a further allowance will be made. Besides this the Czar transferred to his name foreign stock which will bring him in another \$1,500,000 a year, so he won't want for money when he comes of age.

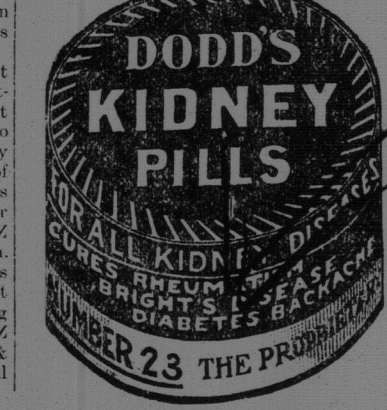

FIRST DRAFT OF CHARTER

BRACELET CASE IN THE POLICE COURT

Grant Was to Have it Repaired, Says Owner, But Later Said he Lost it—Segee Assault Matter Dismissed

A case against Thomas Grant, charged with stealing a gold bracelet from Mrs. Matilda Gertrude Wilson of Acadia street, was heard this morning in the police court. The value of the bracelet is \$5 and the court asked Grant if he preferred to be tried in the police court or else go to the higher court. The prisoner chose the latter. The preliminary hearing was then begun. Mrs. Wilson said that in March last Grant came to her house and took a bracelet, telling her that he would have it repaired for her. Mrs. Medley Tibb told of having a conversation with Grant about the bracelet about a month ago. She said he told her it was in a jewelry store in Main street being repaired. On inquiry there she said she found that the bracelet had not been left there. Grant later told her that he had lost the bracelet and that he was willing to pay for it. Grant told the court that he would repay the price of the bracelet to Mrs. Wilson given a chance. He was committed for trial.

Leo and Raymond McLaughlin, reported for removing sand from a beach on the west side explained that it was the mud deposited by the dredges that they had removed. The matter was allowed to stand over until Monday morning. Charles McCarthy and Andrew Magee were each fined \$8 or two months in jail on the charge of drunkenness, in the police court this morning. Patrick Quinn, arrested on a like charge, by Policeman Marshall was not able to be brought into court, as one of his legs was badly injured and he was unable to walk. Dr. D. E. Berryman found that the man's right ankle was broken. He was sent to the hospital in the ambulance.

Ward B. Stevens, arrested on a charge of assaulting John A. Segee pleaded not guilty. Mr. Segee swore that Stevens struck him on the head with his fist and had also struck him with a chair. Stevens swore that he and Segee lived together in a little shack on the Millidgeville Road, and that on the night in question Segee told him that the officers were coming to put them off the land again. Segee, he said, told him that if the policeman came that he would tie him hand and foot and throw him out, but didn't strike him. The case was dismissed.

SEND AWAY APPLES TO BOOM PROVINCE

Prize Fruit From Local Show Going as Far as Pacific and New York

The New Brunswick Apple Show which was successfully conducted in St. Andrew's rink all week, was brought to a close last night. The attendance was very good and much favorable comment was made on the exhibits. This morning the exhibitors were busy getting their goods ready for shipment. Many of them intend keeping their fruit in the rink for the purpose of showing them at the Amherst Winter Fair which will be held in Amherst on December 5. The exhibit of the department of agriculture will be split up and sent to different fairs. Two boxes will be shipped to the fair to be shown at the Dominion fruit growers' convention there on Dec. 12. Fifty boxes will be sent to the Ontario Horticultural Exhibition which is to be held in Toronto on Nov. 15, and twelve boxes will go to Quebec to be shown at the annual meeting of the Pomological Society on Monday next. Secretary Turney will accompany the exhibits to the different places. It is just possible that 200 boxes of the department's exhibit will be auctioned in the rink here tomorrow morning, but the matter had not been definitely settled today.

Not only in this way are the apples to be sent around to advertise New Brunswick as a fruit growing district, but individual purchasers are taking advantage of the fine display to boom the province. Walter H. Golding sent boxes away as far as New York and Vancouver. H. L. Watkins of the Keith management, who was here on business this week, visited the fruit show and was so much impressed with the quality of the apples that he purchased several boxes to send to friends in the states. Secretary Turney is busily engaged making up the list of prize winners at the show and the amount won by each. The list will be ready by tomorrow.
