THE STUMPAGE QUESTION

As It is Understood on the North Shore.

From a gentleman who has recently been travelling on the North Shore the Sun learns that the increase of stumpage as proposed, or rather decided upon by the local executive, does not meet with the approval of either the operating lumberman or the general public. The Sun's informant, who says he has ample opportunity for getting at the inside feeling of parties interested, states that in general opinion the proposed increase is not at all necessary in the interest of the province, and that the extravagance of the government present practice is as well as that which makes their steel bridge contracts and other corrupt bargains of former years, are really beyond the capacity of a clique of lawyers and high officials to handle upon every industry, corporation, company and organization that could be forced to yield up a penny in support of the unprofitable trips to Ottawa and England and the States, and other high jinks indulged in by those creatures of circumstance who have a temporary contract in the province, they have ventured to again bleed the lumber industry. "But don't let yourself be misled," said one operator, "this new rate is not intended to affect the old operators who are 'healers' of the government, they will still get the benefit of the 'rake off,' but we smaller chap and particularly those of us who have not supported the bootlers at Fredericton will have to toe the mark and every cent of the extra will be taken out of the pocket of the operator."

Another gentleman, not an operator, but an official of one of the big North Shore concerns, in reply to an enquiry: "There would be no necessity for any increase if the government would only collect the present stumpage, and let the favorites get off easily, while others have to pay 'up in full.'"

AMERICAN FLAG HAULED DOWN Serious Trouble of U. S. Consul in Turkey.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 8.—The United States flag over the consulate at Alexandria, Asiatic Turkey has been hauled down and the Consul has left his post for Beirut. In consequence of a serious diplomatic incident, during which Mr. Davis was insulted and assaulted by the local police. The affair grew out of the arrest of an Armenian, Ohannes Attarian, a naturalized American citizen.

Attarian had been in prison at Aleppo during the past two months and had been liberated through the intervention of the consular agent, on condition of his leaving the country forthwith. Mr. Davis was accompanying Attarian on board a departing steamer, when the police intercepted the party, assaulted and insulted Mr. Davis, and in spite of the resistance of the consul and attendant guards, re-arrested Attarian and took him back to prison. Mr. Davis immediately lowered the flag over the consulate and formally broke off relations with the Turkish authorities by quitting Alexandria, leaving the consulate in charge of the vice-consul.

A mob of Moslems seized on the occasion to make a hostile demonstration on the consulate. The local authorities assert that Mr. Davis was insulted with a cane and after the arrest of Attarian the consular cavasses (military couriers) attempted to rescue him and that in the process which ensued the cavasses broke the windows of the prison.

When Attarian was arrested \$200 was found in his pocket. The consular believed, may have contributed to his arrest, the Turks suspecting him of being a revolutionary. The matter is engaging the energetic attention of the U. S. embassy here. Minister Leishman has made earnest representations to the porte and is now awaiting a full report before taking any further steps. The outrage, it is anticipated here, will lead to strong action on the part of the U. S. to obtain full reparation, especially if satisfaction is not forthcoming. PLUCKY RESCUE AT REED'S POINT.

FATAL ACCIDENT.

Man Injured on the Dredge A Lighter Holiday Trade New Dominion Than for Many Years.

Died Monday Afternoon—Accident Occurred While the Mud Digger Was Being Put in Winter Quarters.

A fatal accident occurred Tuesday morning on board the dredge New Dominion, which came down the river several days ago and was being put in winter quarters at Wiggins' slip, Carleton Place. The victim of the accident was Robert Purvis, aged 40 years, a native of Kings county, and a man of good physique and in good health. He was standing on a platform which was being lowered by means of an iron bar. Purvis was standing on the platform when the dredge was being lowered, and he was struck by the bar which was falling from the top of the dredge. He was thrown into the water and was drowned.

SUDDEN DEATH AT MONCTON. MONCTON, Dec. 8.—The death occurred this evening of Mrs. C. D. Connelly, nee Miss Solma McKean, daughter of the late Samuel McKean, and sister of Mrs. Dr. Somers of this city. Her death was surrounded by particularly sad circumstances. Mrs. Connelly came here from Utiqa, N. Y., to pay a short visit to her mother and sisters. Shortly after her arrival she was stricken with typhoid fever, from which she later suffered a relapse. On Saturday last her husband was summoned and has been at her bedside since. The deceased had been married a short time. She was about 32 years old and had a great many friends here. Her death was mourned by her relatives. The funeral will take place on Thursday.

A Speech That the "Scotsman" Editorially Commends With Vigor.

The Great Newspaper's Remarks—A Synoptic Report of Mr. Foster's Utterances in the Synod Hall, the Earl of Camperdown Presiding, Before a Vast and Enthusiastic Gathering of Electors.

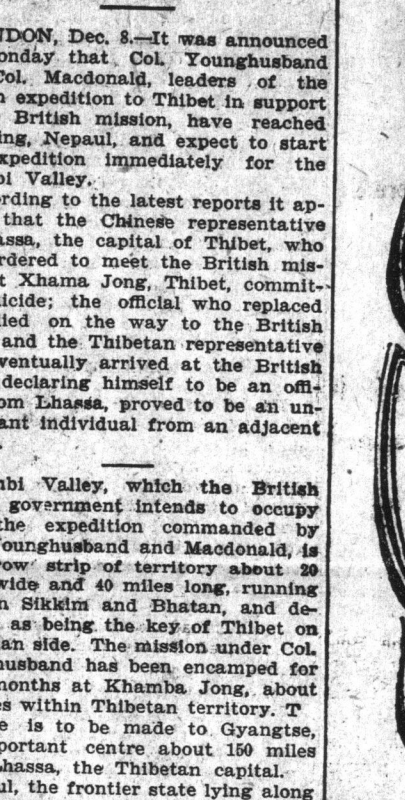
