The Home Mission Report being taken from the table, it was moved by Secretary Cohoon to strike out the clause having reference to provisions for H. M. work in New Brunswick. This was adopted. As printed on page two of our last issue this clause is included. Under the clause on District Organization it was resolved on motion of B. H. Eaton to add, as number seven, the followings:

Resolved, That wherever properly organized and efficient country or district committees or societies now exist or shall hereafter be formed, by whatever name they may be designated, which are willing to undertake the administration of home missions within their respective districts, it shall be the duty of the Home Mission Board to carry on the work of home missions in such destricts through the agency of such district committees; all applications for aid and all communications from such district; in relation to home missions within the district to be made and addressed to such district committees, and all moneys which shall be voted by the Board for any district to be disbursed through the district committee.

The Report of the F. M. Board was taken from the table. The clause on Reinforcements was adopted. The clause touching the financial plan received discussion. Much difference of opinion appeared as to the value of what is known as the Couvention Scheme. The opinion appeared to prevail that it should not be so interpreted as to pre-vent each individual church adopting such methods in raising its denomina-tional funds as it might think best. On the vote being taken the motion to adopt the clause was declared lost. Rev. F. M. Young moved a resolution

the vote being taken the motion to adopt the clause was declared lost.

Rev. F. M. Young moved a resolution requiring the treasurers of denominational funds to give bonds in security for the moneys handled by them. The principle involved in this motion appeared to meet with general approval. It was pointed out, however, that there was a difficulty in respect to the method of giving bonds, as the Convention was not an ingorporated body, and also that, as the treasurers performed their work without remuneration, it would be unfair to ask them to be at the expense of giving bonds. It was decided that the resolution should lie on the table for further consideration at the next annual meeting of Convention.

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
