

Michael Shea Drinks Carbolic Acid At Glace Bay With Fatal Result-Recently Released From Insane Asylum.

London, July 13.—Dr. Leslie Dodd Ward of Newark, N. J., vice-president of the Prudential Insurance Com-pany, died here this evening. Dr. Leslie Dodd Ward was one of the incorporators of the Prudential Insurance Co. in 1874, and he be-came vice-president of the company ten years later. He was born in 1845 and was graduated from the Col-lege of Physicians and Surgeons, Co-lumbia University, New York, in 1868.


