Powers of Commission

Mr. Carter—"We may as well settle the point whether the commission is going to enquire about the sub-contracts outside of the cost of the road."

He read the section of the act governing that part of the enquiry. He claimed that the jurisdiction of the commission was limited to enquiring whether money had been paid by contractors to Hon. Messrs. Flemming and McLeod. The court was confined to the authority which was conferred on it by the act. While counsel on the other side claimed that public interests demanded the fullest investigation, this did not give any powers.

Judge McKeown—"Who do you say are the contractors?"

Mr. Carter—"The St. John and Quebec Construction Co., and the Hibbard Co. are sub-contractors, and Scott and Kelly are sub-contractors of the sub-contractors under the St. John and Quebec Construction Co.? Inasmuch as Scott and Kelly have no contract from the St. John and Quebee Construction Co.? Inasmuch as Scott and Kelly have no contract from the St. John and Quebee Construction Railway Co., I do not think that their business can be brought in. How can the government be interested in matters between the contractors and the sub-contractors? I submit that it is not in the public interests, but inimical to them to allow Mr. Carvell to go into private matters of this sort."

THE PASSING DAY. RAT CATCHERS.

One of the oldest professions is that of rat catcher, and strange and wondrous to the lay mind, are many of the feats performed by the followers of this curious trade. This might be called lRat Catchers' Day, for it is the anniversary of the memorable achievement of the most celebrated of all thoses of the murine species, the Ple Piper of Hamelin, who has been in mortalized by Browning's poem.

Washington he captured 906 rats in one night, and on another occasion he won a wager by catching 87 within an hour. Another man who attained fame in this profession was Henri Dayve of Paris, who was known some 40 years ago as "the King of the Rat Catchers." Harry Jennings, known as "Dick the Rat." won fame and fortune from this occupation in America about the middle of the last century. Rat catchers, like poets, are born, not made, and none of them has ever revealed the secret of his power.

Chinese rat catchers train cats as their assistants, and the Oriental carries as symbolic of his craft a cat-in a bag.

Rats are now feared as common carriers of deadly disease germs, but in former and less provaic times they were accredited with mystical powers. They were believed to have an uncanny instinct for forecasting evel, and "rats leaving a sinking ship" has become a common figure of speech. 


