The Union says that no patriotic man would wish to hamper the king with pledges, when once upon the throne, he has promised to discuss matters with the repre-ASSURANCE COM'Y sentatives of the people; the Universe Gents' Furnishing Goods says that those who object to the white says that those who object to the white flag are all farceurs; and L'Assemblee Nationale declares that, since the Republicans and Bonapartists wait a prorogation of Marshal McMahon's powers, the Chamber must vote the Monarchy, or it will lose all prestige, and even its own life and honor. This is something of a non segditur, but it answers the purpose for which it is intended. This is the state of affairs at present, and if any one can tell what is to come of it, they can tell more than I can. The Monarchists seem to have taken their ground. They want the Roi publish another Saint-Ouen declaration, like that written for Louis XVIII. by Talleyrand, and which the King refused to sign until forced to do so by the Emperor Alexander, and they demand that he shall be recalled by a vote of the Chamber without being called upon to subscribe to any charter or to give any pledges. If any charter or to give any pledges. If that were done, I have very little doubt that Louis Veuillot is right when he says that Louis Veulliot is right which he sight of the white flag floatin from the towers of Notre Dame would be loudly cheered by the working population of Paris, for when resistance is imporof Paris, for when resistance is impossible, the people are quite ready to cheer anything. Hundreds of persons declared that Napoleon III. would be assassinated after the coup d'etat, yet he mounted his horse and rode in triumph through the city, and never was the population more enthusiastic. Henry V. or Napoleon IV. would be received in the same way; but if, two hours later, a portion of the army revolted, the entire mass would rush to the side of the insurgents, and cry down with the tyrant they had just acclaimed as a savior of France. From this it will be inferred that the fate of the country rests with the army, and that Marshal rests with the army, and that Marshal MacMahon controls; Mme. De MacMahon controls the Marshal, and she does not

controls the Marshal, and she does not want any change. Gen. Chanzy says that the army is very strongly against the ancient monarchy, and if this be true everything depends upon MacMahon, who has the power to resist the Parliament if he will. I do not think that he will, but I am very sure he will please his wife by doing all in his power to keep things as they are. And if my opinion is worth anything, I think they will remain as they are, and that the term of the Provisional will be prolonged. The Monarchists are very determined just now, but if the first proposition is delayed the different factions will demoralize each other, and they will come back to the prorogation as a last resort.
