



ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting of the congregation was held on the evening of Wednesday, the 28th March, 1877, the Rev. James Fleck, B.A., pastor, in the chair.

After devotional exercise, the Report and Financial Statement of the Board of Managers were read.

It was then moved by Mr. Stevenson, seconded by Mr. Paul,

That the Reports, as read, be received, adopted, printed and circulated among the congregation, at as early a date as possible.

STATEMENT FROM THE SESSION.

The Chairman stated that the Session had prepared no written report, but had authorized him to give a verbal statement of the spiritual affairs of the Church.

At the beginning of the present ministry the membership numbered 224; diminished in the course of the year by 12, of whom 7 died, and 5 received letters of dismission. During the same period, 50 additions have been made to the roll; 25 by profession of faith, and 25 by certificate. The total number of communicants up to date is 262; 192 of these were present at the last communion, in March.

This in itself is a good indication of the spiritual condition of the Church. So also is the increased attendance at the Wednesday evening service. This service has been greatly blessed in developing the religious sympathies and strengthening the christian life of the Church.

In the work of pastoral visitation, the chairman further said that he had now almost completed the round of the congregation, and was greatly encouraged by the affectionate welcome everywhere given him. It was gratifying to know that family worship was observed so generally; he affectionately urged this simple and sacred duty on the attention of all heads of households.

In concluding he congratulated the Church on a year of unbroken peace and harmony and increased sociability, and recommended the cultivation of a spirit of mutual helpfulness among the members and adherents of the congregation, as the truest manifestation of the Gospel of Our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Mr. James Brown requested to have minuted that he intended, on a future occasion, to ask the payment by the congregation of a sum of money which had been expended on city mission work.

The Doxology was then sung, and the meeting closed with the Benediction.

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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MAN- AGEMENT OF KNOX CHURCH.

Your Board have pleasure in submitting for your consideration the following condensed Report of the matter coming under their supervision during the financial year of the congregation, ending 28th February, 1877, being the fifth of the existence of the Board.

In last year's Report the Managers made hopeful allusion to the call then in process of transmission to Rev. James Fleck; it is with feelings of gratitude to Divine Providence that they now put on record the more than fulfilment of their hopes. Mr. Fleck arrived in May last, and was inducted by the Presbytery into the Pastoral charge of the congregation on 1st June, since which time he has continued to labor amongst us with constantly increasing acceptance.

The progress of the congregation in spiritual matters will be learned from the Session Report.

The names on the seat-roll on 1st March numbered 116, of whom 13 have connected themselves with the congregation during the year.

The number of sittings taken is 347. Of these 103 names, taking 304 sittings, are contributors, and 13 names, taking 43 sittings, are non-contributors. Total amount of seat-rent promised \$1801.

Besides amount raised by the Congregational Missionary Society in aid of the schemes of the Church,

collections have been made during the year for the Ministers' Widow and Orphan Fund, the Students' Missionary Society, and for French Evangelization.

The Ladies Dorcas Society report having collected the sum of \$51.92 which they have used in adding to the comforts of deserving persons wherever found.

The Ladies Auxiliary of the French Canadian Missionary Society of this church have made their usual collection for the Parent Society, amounting to \$53, and for French Evangelization \$20.

At the Union Floral Festival, held in aid of the Hervey Institute, the table supplied by the ladies of this congregation and superintended by them realized the sum of \$54.46.

At the date of our last Annual Report, Miss Brown was fulfilling the office of Organist as a volunteer. Early in the year she requested to be relieved, and the Managers very unwillingly acceded to her request. They subsequently engaged the services of Mr. Fetherston, who continues faithfully to perform the duties of the office.

The Congregation having undertaken increased financial responsibility, the Board took into consideration the propriety of advancing the nominal seat rents, and at their meeting of 8th June last resolved that the rent to be asked for sittings in the centre of the church be at the rate of not less than \$8.00 per sitting per annum, and \$6.00 for those in the side aisles, and that present pew-holders who are paying at a less rate be asked to comply as far as convenient from 1st March, 1877.

With regard to the subscription entered into three years ago for the purpose of liquidating the debt on

the church, your Board desires to say that from changes which have taken place during that time, by deaths, removals from the city, and other causes, a portion of the original subscriptions is not now collectible. The amount still to be paid on mortgage is \$4000; the amount on hand is \$1660; amount of original subscription expected to be realized but not yet collected \$1240; leaving the sum of \$1100 to be raised by new subscriptions, all of which should be in the hands of the Treasurer by 1st June next. The attention of the congregation is earnestly directed to this matter.

Before closing their report your Board would take this opportunity of congratulating you on the present happy and prosperous condition of the congregation. At no former period within our memory has such unanimity and cordial good feeling existed amongst its members. God has blessed us abundantly, may we be enabled to go on relying on His strength, which is sufficient for us, and acknowledging Him in all our ways.



ANNUAL MEETING KNOX CHURCH CON-
GREGATIONAL MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The Annual Meeting of the Congregational Mis-
sionary Society was held in the Lecture Room of the
Church on February 28th. Rev. Mr. Fleck, Presi-
dent, in the chair.

After the usual devotional exercises the Secretary
read the Annual Report as follows:

ANNUAL REPORT OF KNOX CHURCH CONGREGATIONAL
MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

In presenting the report of the Society for 1876,
your Committee desires to acknowledge with feelings
of gratitude the blessings of God which have sur-
rounded us as a society during the year.

We are glad to be able to state that, notwithstand-
ing a decrease in the membership of the Society dur-
ing the vacancy, and consequently a diminished
number of subscribers with which the year began,
the contributions are well kept up. Let us earnestly
pray that our Heavenly Father will enable us to go
on prosperously from year to year, giving from the
heart, and still more liberally, towards this means for
diffusing the glad tidings both in our own land and
among the benighted heathen.

Various meetings have been held during the year
for missionary intelligence, at which interesting

accounts have been given, by several members, of the great work now being carried on in foreign lands by our own church as well as by others.

These meetings are intended to interest the congregation in Mission work, and your Committee, while noticing the fair attendance at them, would urge on the members of the Society the propriety of encouraging by their presence those who take upon themselves the work of giving to the congregation such missionary news as they may from time to time collect.

Your Committee deeming it a matter of importance that each member of the Society should be a reader of the "Record of the Presbyterian Church in Canada," resolved at its last meeting to appropriate from the funds of the Society a sum sufficient to furnish each family being subscribers to the Society with a copy.

They would also recommend the taking into consideration the propriety of adding "French Evangelization" to the schemes aided by the Society.

Now that our beloved pastor has come among us, the Society as well as the church will reap the benefit of his labours, and we earnestly trust that with his valuable assistance and advice, and the hearty co-operation and liberality of the members, the Society will be able to do more next year for the cause of Missions than it has ever done heretofore.

The allocation of the money collected will be found in the Treasurer's statement.

ANNUAL REPORT OF KNOX CHURCH SAB-
BATH SCHOOL FOR 1876.

In reviewing the work of the school, we have great cause for the deepest gratitude to our Heavenly Father for the measure of success which has attended us during the past year, and for the prosperity we have enjoyed.

Since in the good Providence of God our esteemed pastor came to labor amongst us, the school has received a great stimulus, and has been much benefited by his instructions. His affection for and earnest labours in the Sabbath School and Bible Class show what a deep interest he takes in the spiritual welfare of the young.

A marked feature of the past year has been the successful formation of a Temperance Society and Band of Hope in connection with the church and school. The children seem to have united heartily in this good work, and we are confident that this Society will materially assist, not only in promoting the cause of Temperance among the young, but in more thoroughly interesting the children in Sabbath School work.

ATTENDANCE.

We are glad to be able to state that the scarcity of male teachers felt last year no longer exists; several having voluntarily come in to help us, thus encour-

aging our hearts and strengthening our hands in this work of instructing the young.

Since the beginning of this year, one of the infant class, a little girl, after a few days' illness has been removed by death, reminding us both old and young of the Saviour's words, "Be ye also ready."

BIBLE CLASSES.

The Bible Class for young women conducted by Mr. Aikman has been well maintained throughout the year; in the month of October the pastor commenced a class for young men, taking for the subject of study "*The Confession of Faith.*" This class is in a flourishing condition, which is an evidence of the able and instructive manner in which he conducts it.

MISSION WORK.

Our missionary efforts, we rejoice to say, are still maintained with unabated zeal by the children, and we trust this work will fit them for a more extended sphere of usefulness in the future.

SINGING.

A new and choice collection of Hymns has been introduced into the school during the year, and has led to a marked improvement in this department of the service.

ENTERTAINMENTS.

Our usual soirée was held on the 21st of January, and a happy evening was spent. A pleasing feature

in connection with this, was the presentation to Miss Tilly Brown, of a gold locket and chain, accompanied by a suitable address from the scholars, in recognition of valuable services rendered by her. A pic-nic was also held on St. Helen's Island in July, and an enjoyable day was spent by the children and friends. We again tender our warmest thanks to the kind friends who defrayed the expenses of these entertainments.

LIBRARY.

The circulation of books has been as extensive as usual. No additional volumes have been purchased during the year; but a donation of 55 volumes from Robert French, Esq., has just been received, for which we record our grateful thanks.

The teachers continue to receive the "*Sunday School World*," and the children the "*British Workman*," "*Sabbath School Messenger*," and the "*Child's Paper*."

In presenting this our Fourth Annual Report we desire to express our sincere thanks to the many friends who have assisted and encouraged us in our work.

Although we commenced this year with fewer subscribers, the total amount collected is slightly in excess of last year. This is due to the energetic efforts of our Vice-President, the zeal of the collectors and increased liberality on the part of subscribers. The sum of \$178.57 has been raised, this with the box collections, amounting to \$91.43, gives a total of \$270.
