## GERMANS SUFFER TREMENDOUS LOSS

### Thirty-Five Hundred Troops Reported Killed and Wounded by Belgians in Attack upon Vise--French Men-of-War After German Cruisers in American Waters.

(Special to the Graphic).  
Two German officers in disguise were arrested at Ostend today. Military notes and fortification plans of great value were found upon them. They will be shot as spies.

The Third Turpedo boat flotilla, returned to Harwich on Tuesday, little damaged from their meeting with the enemy's fleet in the North Sea.

Fierce fighting is reported from Belgium and hundreds of wounded Germans are being removed to Brussels, where they are being accommodated in the hospitals.

Russia has struck a heavy blow to German shipping, when they seized ten German vessels at Archangel laden with coal and timber.

Austria has now turned her attention to Serbia, and a large army is now engaged in the bombardment of Belgrade, the capital of the state.

A German battle fleet is now off the coast of Finland, and has commenced a bombardment of the town of Sveaborg. This place is highly fortified, and has been called the Gibraltar of the North.

A Paris despatch confirms the report that Germany is bringing pressure to bear on Italy, and has threatened reprisals. Italy, so far, has stuck to her position of neutrality and refuses to move to the aid of the allies.

From Harwich on the East coast of England, the report is confirmed that a great sea battle is in progress on the North Sea. No statement can be had of the fleets engaged.

The French fleet in the Mediterranean has captured another German cruiser, while a British torpedo-boat destroyer held up and captured a German Levant liner.

Reports are confirmed of heavy fighting in Belgium. In the encounter at Vise, the Germans lost 3500 killed and wounded. That Belgium will be the battle ground is evinced by the fact that 30,000 fresh German troops are being hurled against Liege. In the battle of Liege, 25,000 Belgian troops completely defeated 50,000 Germans, who retired, but further attacks are expected tonight. The Belgian losses so far have been slight.

French ships of war have been ordered to the West Indies, where they will search for the five German cruisers which have been reported seen in these waters.

## ORDERS ISSUED FOR ENLISTING CANADIAN VOLUNTEERS

All Branches of Service Will be Represented—Enlistment Voluntary for all Ranks.

(Special to the Graphic)  
Ottawa, Aug. 5.—Orders were issued this afternoon for the enlistment and mobilization at Quebec of a Canadian army division, numbering approximately 21,000 men, of whom about 13,000 will be infantry, and the rest artillery, engineering corps, signalling corps and the other branches of the militia service connected with active service regulations for a British army division. The enlistment will be absolutely voluntary for all ranks, although it is provided in the case of whole regiments or companies enlisting, their unity will be preserved as far as possible.

Enlistment will start at once at the various military centres throughout Canada, and will be in charge of the district officer commanding.

### MILLS WILL NOT CLOSE

Many rumors have been on the street here, that in the event of Britain taking part in the war, the various lumber mills will close here. However, it has been authoritatively stated that there will be no cessation of work in the mills, which will run as usual during the summer.

With regard to the lumber operation in the woods however, there seems to be some dubiety, and it is highly probable that no lumber will be cut, unless the war clouds in some measure clear.

Neither of the vessels could be held here and when their papers are given the captains will take orders from the owners whether to proceed to sea or not. It is said that another Russian steamer is on her way here to load at the Government wharf.

## GREAT BRITAIN'S FUTURE ROLE

(By H. G. Wells.)

London, August 4.—At last the intolerable tension is over. Europe is at war. The monstrous vanity that was begotten by the easy victories of 1870-71 has challenged the world. Germany prepares to reap the harvest that Bismarck sowed. That trampling, drilling foolery in the heart of Europe, that has arrested civilization and darkened the hopes of mankind for forty years—German Imperialism and German Militarism—has struck its inevitable blow.

The victory of Germany will mean the permanent enthronement of the War God over all human affairs. The defeat of Germany may open the way to disarmament and peace throughout the world. To those who love peace there can be no other hope in the present conflict than her defeat, the utter discrediting of the German legend—ending it for good and all—of blood and iron, the superstition of Krupp's, Plag Wagging, Teutonic Militarism, as all that criminal sham efficiency that centres in Berlin. Never was a war so righteous as the war against Germany now; never any state in the world so clamored for punishment. But be it remembered that Europe's quarrel is with Germany as a state, not with the German people; with the system, not with the race.

The older tradition of Germany is a peaceful, civilized tradition. The temperament of the mass of German people is kindly, sane, amiable. Disaster to the German army, if it is accompanied by such a memorable wrong as dismemberment or intolerable indignity will mean the restoration of the greatest people of Europe to the fellowship of the western nations.

"The role of England in the huge struggle is as plain as daylight. We

have to fight it only on account of the Luxembourg outrage. If we do not fight England will cease to be a country to be proud of and we shall have a dirt bath to escape from.

"But is it conceivable that we should not fight, and having fought then in the hour of victory it will be for us to save the liberated Germans from vindictive treatment, to secure for this great people their right to a place under the sun as one united German speaking state.

"First, we have to save ourselves and Europe, and then we have to stand between the Germans on one hand and the Cossack's revenge on the other."

### COUNCIL TUESDAY

### Regular Meeting Held, But Small Amount of Business was Before the Meeting

The Town Council held their regular meeting on Tuesday evening, in the absence of His Worship the Mayor, Councillor Alexander presided at the opening of the session. There were present Councillors McLean, Evans, Patterson, Quinn and Goss.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed, after which Deputy Mayor Miller occupied the chair.

Communication read from the acting Secretary of the Municipalities Union advising that the Annual Convention would take place in St. John on September 9th and 10th, and asking that delegates be appointed. The matter of the appointment was laid over.

Petitions received from the residents of Park Street asking for water privileges. This was referred to Water and Sewerage Committee.

## REPORT OF NAVAL FIGHT IN THE NORTH SEA IS NOW CONFIRMED.

London, Aug. 4.—Germany has violated the law of nations once again. Before war was declared between Germany and England, the German North Sea fleet assumed the offensive, and attacked scattered units of the British fleet. When the news became known in London the indignation of the populace knew no bounds. An attempt was made to wreck the German embassy by thousands of infuriated citizens and thousands of the Metropolitan police, including the whole of the mounted force, struggled for over an hour and a half against overwhelming odds. The building was partially wrecked, but nobody was seriously hurt among the occupants, though scores of people in the crowd were trampled by the police, who repeatedly charged the mob.

News of a naval engagement in the North Sea is confirmed tonight. Wounded from the battle landed at Cromarty in Scotland, and are now being cared for by a special corps of doctors and nurses rushed from Aberdeen in a troop train on an emergency call.

No word can express the anger of the British public. News received in London from provincial cities and towns report that the most violent demonstrations have taken place in all quarters.

### MANY GERMAN STEAMERS CAPTURED BY BRITISH

London, Aug. 4.—Confidential sources have received the report that French warships have captured the German steamer Porosoff, at German Channel Islands.

The capture of a number of German steamers by the British is a serious blow to the German merchant marine, and the British cruiser American Line steamer Koenig Luise recently converted into a mine layer. Trawlers returning from the North Sea have reported that no hostile warships were to be seen.

Four German Cruisers have been sunk or captured to date, three in the Mediterranean and one in the North Sea.

### FRENCH AND BELGIAN TROOPS ARE UNITED

London, Aug. 5.—Great Britain declared war on Germany last night. This momentous decision came before the expiration of the time limit held by Great Britain in her ultimatum to Germany, demanding a satisfactory reply in respect to Belgium neutrality. Germany's reply was the summary rejection of the request that Belgium neutrality should be respected.

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Germany has sent an ultimatum to Italy serving notice that she must assist the British alliance or be attacked by it at once.

## CANADIAN PARLIAMENT SUMMONED TO MEET AT OTTAWA ON TUESDAY, AUGUST 18TH.

Ottawa, Aug. 4.—At the conclusion of tonight's cabinet meeting the Prime Minister announced that parliament was summoned to meet on Tuesday, August 18th.

Then the first business of parliament will be to vote funds required for defence purposes, and to ratify the Governor-General's warrants, which have already been issued.

Parliament will likely remain in continuous session until peace is declared. The Militia Department has taken steps to place guns at Glace Bay and other cable stations, fortifying them against a possible attempt by a German cruiser to cut communication with Great Britain.

The orders for the mobilization of a Canadian contingent of 21,000 men will be approved, after details have been finally passed upon by the cabinet. It is possible that parliament may be asked to impose a war tax. The treasury has now little funds on hand, and in order to raise money recourse will have to be had, either to a special war tax, or to an issue of Dominion bonds which may be taken up in Canada.

## ORDER TO FIGHT FLASHED TO THE BRITISH FLEET IN THE NORTH SEA.

London, Aug. 4.—Immediately after midnight King George sent a personal message to the entire battle fleet now sailing against the German armada, cleared for action. It read: "I have every confidence that the British fleet will revive the old glories of the navy. I am sure that the navy will again shield Britain in this hour of trial. It will prove the bulwark of the empire."

This was the first message sent to the fleet since it cleared from Plymouth harbor and sailed to the secret rendezvous in the North Sea. Ever since the wireless has been silent. No word was permitted to go forth until tonight when the signal for the most tremendous naval battle ever fought sputtered out through the darkness from the great naval wireless station.

## MARTIAL LAW DECLARED IN PORTS OF HOLLAND

The Hague, Aug. 5.—Martial Law has been declared in all ports of Holland. It is officially announced that up to the present time the Germans have not violated the Dutch Frontier.

## LORD KITCHENER IS NOW SECRETARY OF WAR

London, Aug. 5.—The first day of the war for Great Britain has been a day of suspense and rumors. Every half hour a fresh "Extra" was shouted through the streets with some startling rumor. The sum total of the rumors was that cannonading had been heard off all the coasts of Europe. The first fruits of the war are several German vessels brought to harbor by British cruisers, and others impounded in port. This was the day only news as far as British Naval and Military operations were concerned. The votes of \$50,000,000 for war purposes and the appointment of field marshal Earl Kitchener as secretary for war, were the two government measures of the greatest importance.

## PRUSSIAN CAVALRY FIRES ON BELGIAN CIVILIANS

Brussels, Aug. 5.—(Via London).—LePeuple asserts that in the fighting between Germans and Belgians near Vise, a platoon of Prussian cavalry was almost annihilated by the enfilading fire of the Belgians from a building on the Bank of the River.

The Prussians in revenge, fired on civilians. At Fiemalle, near Argenteau, a Belgian force surprised a body of Prussians, and killed seventy out of ten officers and eighty men. The Belgian losses were two officers killed and ten men wounded.

## FRENCH FLEETS CUTS OFF GERMAN CRUISERS IN NORTH SEA

London, Aug. 5.—The French embassy tonight, announced that France has captured another German cruiser. It is believed that the French fleet cut off one of the German North Sea scout cruisers and forced it to surrender.

## TWO GERMAN REGIMENTS DESTROYED BY BELGIAN ARMY

Paris, Aug. 5.—Two regiments of German Uhlans have been destroyed by the Belgian army, according to an official announcement given out by the French war office this evening.

## GERMANY ATTACKS SCATTERED BRITISH SQUADRONS

Germany has violated the law of nations once again. Before war was declared between Germany and England, the German North Sea fleet assumed the offensive and attacked scattered units of the British fleet.

## OFFER OF TROOPS ACCEPTED

London, August 5.—Volunteers are flocking to Army headquarters. The war spirit has spread everywhere. It is announced that the War Office will accept all offers of troops from the colonies, but that no arrangements for transportation will be made until it is certain where they will be needed.

## WAR NEWS

The dirth of authentic war news has been a great disappointment to all. During the time of anxious waiting much impatience was shown at lack of reliable news.

The Graphic has since Monday, endeavored to get early news of the war happenings, and has made arrangements to publish a bulletin each afternoon about 4.30. So far the results have been disappointing, but we hope to have matters adjusted shortly so that bulletins will be posted just as soon as news of any important event is received at St. John.

The Graphic has received enquiries for news from all over the country, our telephone being kept busy at times with calls from town, and as far distant as Chandler.

## KING'S MESSAGE TO CANADA

The following message from H.M. the King was received by the Governor-General.

"Please communicate to your ministers following message from His Majesty the King and publish:—  
"I desire to express to my people of the Overseas Dominions with what appreciation and pride I have received the messages from their respective governments during the last few days. These spontaneous assurances of their fullest support recalled to me the generous self sacrificing help given by them in the past to the Mother Country."

"I shall be strengthened in the discharge of the great responsibility which rests upon me by the confident belief that in this time of trial my Empire will stand united, calm, resolute, trusting in God."

"(Signed) Harcourt."

## VIOLATED NEUTRALITY OF SWITZERLAND

Paris, August 5.—The Foreign Office today confirmed the invasion of Switzerland by German troops. This is a violation of Swiss neutrality.

## FIGHTING IN HOLLAND

German troops have crossed to Dutch soil at Eijaden. Hollanders are desperately fighting the invaders. There is desperate cannonading. It is feared the casualties will be heavy.

London, Aug. 5.—The German steamer Willehad, which left Montreal last week, is reported here to have been captured by British cruisers of the Newfoundland coast.

## HOW THE NATIONS WILL LINE UP

Austria Hungary and Germany are opposed by Russia, France and Great Britain, Serbia and Montenegro. Italy has declared her neutrality, but is mobilizing. Belgium, Holland and Switzerland have mobilized. The German demand that the Belgian Government should permit the free passage of German troops through Belgium was answered by hasty preparations to resist such an advance across Belgian territory. Sweden has made no answer to inquiries from Russia, and Germany regarding her attitude, but is preparing to defend her neutrality. Japan is making ready to live up to her alliance with Great Britain. Spain is reported to be preparing a proclamation of neutrality. Austria Hungary for the moment has retired from her campaign against Serbia for the purpose of holding back Russia, and Serbia has mobilized with the reported intention of invading Bosnia.

## THREE GERMAN CRUISERS CAUGHT BY BRITISH

Assisted by French They Destroy One And Capture Two

London, Aug. 5.—A despatch to the "Chronicle" from Paris says that after bombarding the Algerian town of Bona, the German cruisers Goeben, Breslau and Panther were caught by the British and French squadrons which had been awaiting them. The French warships captured the Goeben and Breslau and sunk the Panther.

## ADMIRAL JELlicoe's REPLY TO KING GEORGE

Navy Determined to Uphold Tradition of the Fleet

London, Aug. 5.—To-day Admiral Jellicoe, in supreme command of the British fleet in the North Sea, replies as follows to the King's message to the fleet sent last night: "In behalf of the officers and men of the home fleet, I beg to tender dutiful thanks to Your Majesty for the gracious message, which will inspire all with determination to uphold the glorious traditions of the past."

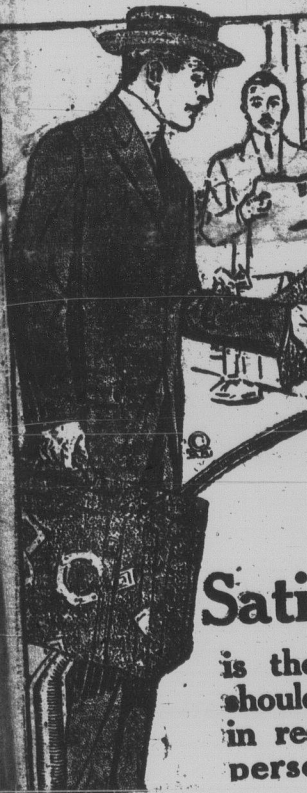
