HOSPITAL CLAIMS.

Solicitor General Presents
Matter to Glo. Council.

A SETTLEMENT LIKELY.

Similar Claims Against Res-
tigouche and Campbellton
to be Taken up.

(Telegraph, 15th.)

Hon W. P. Jones, solicitor-general, is at the Royal on his way home from Bathurst, where he has been conducting the liquor investigation. Mr Jones also interviewed the county council, which was in session at Bathurst, concerning claims which the Provincial Hospital for Nervous Diseases has against the Municipality of Gloucester. The claims extend over several years, and are for the support of pauper imbeciles.

The claim, he says, was well received by the council, although in some cases they thought they should not pay, as the imbeciles were dangerous and should be supported by the province; on the whole, the claims were well received and a committee consisting of the warden and two councillors were appointed with power to act with Mr. Jones in regard to effecting a settlement. In the meantime, Mr. Jones will, if necessary, make an investigation of the cases under oath.

As a result of these claims the municipality will at once remove three paupers from the hospital if they can obtain a certificate from the superintendent that they are not dangerous.

Similar claims have been made against the County of Restigouche and the towns of Campbellton and Milltown, but in each of these cases they have been disputed. If necessary, evidence will be taken and it will then be for the government to decide whether or not they shall require these places to pay the full amount or not.

Restigouche Council

In Annual Session at the Shiretown
this Week.

County Refuses to Transfer Campbellton Lock-up
Building to the Town—A Large Number of
Accounts Passed.

The annual meeting of the County Council opened in the Council Chambers, Dalhousie, on Tuesday morning, at 11 o'clock. Secretary A. J. LeBlanc read a list of Councillors and all reported present as follows:

ACCOUNTS PASSED

Mayor Murray Explained
About West End School
Building.

A meeting of our city fathers was held on Monday evening there being present Mayor Murray and Couns. Ferguson, Blackhall, Laughlan, Vautour and Taylor.

Another supreme court writ in the Duncan case was received and placed on file.

Mayor Murray read a circular he had received from the National Trust Co., Liquidator of the York Loan & Savings Co. For the benefit of those interested we quote from the circular as follows:—

"Shareholders will send in their receipt books to the Liquidator (National Trust Co., 243 Roncesvalles Ave., Toronto) and receipts for same will be mailed to them. The books and correspondence affecting the claims will be filed and in due course each claim will be dealt with. Where the amount shown due by the receipt book is verified by the books of the Company the Liquidator will report the claim to the court for approval and notify the shareholder. Where there is any difference the Liquidator will communicate with the shareholder and adjust the amount due in order that the claim may be reported to the court for approval and a contest avoided."

The Mayor stated that Geoffrey Stead, engineer, would be in town on Tuesday to make necessary survey for approach to wharf at foot of Ramsay St. so that a proper deed of same could be given to the Government.

COST OF THE WAR

The Russia Budget Places It
At \$1,150,000,000

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 12.—The
budget statement for 1906, which was
issued last night, shows that it will be
necessary to raise \$250,000,000 by
credit operations to balance the
estimated receipts and expenditure.

The latter include \$200,000,000 for
the liquidation of the expenses of the
Russia-Japanese war, the repatriation
of the troops in the far east and the
reduction of the army to a peace
footing. For the first time the total
cost of the war, \$1,150,000,000, is
revealed. The credit operations to
balance the budget include the recent
authorization of \$200,000,000 in
treasury bonds, \$75,000,000 of which
have already been used to renew the
Mendelssohn loan, and the credit,
\$160,000,000, which former Finance
Minister Kokovtsov is now negotiating
in Paris. The primary object of the
latter, the proceeds of which will be
retained in Paris, is to be the main-
tenance of the stability of the rouble.

He took occasion to speak with
great optimism of the future of
Canada, predicting that by the end of
present century there would be a
population in the Dominion twice as
large as the combined populations of
Great Britain and Ireland. Every
thing was favorable towards that end
and the natural conditions of the

upon.

It was also satisfactory to know that
the prosperity here, past and present,
was due, not to boom, but to those
natural conditions.

COST OF THE WAR

The Russia Budget Places It
At \$1,150,000,000

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 12.—The
budget statement for 1906, which was
issued last night, shows that it will be
necessary to raise \$250,000,000 by
credit operations to balance the
estimated receipts and expenditure.

The latter include \$200,000,000 for
the liquidation of the expenses of the
Russia-Japanese war, the repatriation
of the troops in the far east and the
reduction of the army to a peace
footing. For the first time the total
cost of the war, \$1,150,000,000, is
revealed. The credit operations to
balance the budget include the recent
authorization of \$200,000,000 in
treasury bonds, \$75,000,000 of which
have already been used to renew the
Mendelssohn loan, and the credit,
\$160,000,000, which former Finance
Minister Kokovtsov is now negotiating
in Paris. The primary object of the
latter, the proceeds of which will be
retained in Paris, is to be the main-
tenance of the stability of the rouble.

ELLEN CRAIG

The death of Ellen Craig, relict of the late James Craig who died at the residence of her son William Craig of Upper Charlo on the 15th inst. removes from our midst one of the oldest residents of the county of Restigouche. She was ninety-one years of age and a native of Ennis in the County of Antrim, Ireland, where she was born on the 15th February 1815. She sailed from Belfast, Ireland on the 3rd of May 1834 and arrived at Dalhousie N. B. on the 15th July following.

Her daughters are Mrs. Thomas Hodgins of Belldune Gloucester County N. B.; Mrs. James Miller of Springvale Dalhousie N. B.; Mrs. Allan Miller, of Campbellton N. B. and Mary who resided with her mother during her declining years, and nursed her during her illness until death relieved her of her sufferings and exchanged the troubles of this life for the joys of the next. Coun Laughlan enquired of His Worship the Mayor if the title to the west end school building, so called, is vested in the town or in the school district.

A great deal had been said about this building in one of the town papers lately and a petition had been presented to the school board to have it re-opened for school purposes and he (Laughlan) would like to know who were the real owners.

In reply Mayor Murray said that the building was now owned by the town and gave a very lucid statement in regard to the matter. In 1880 a piece of land was bought from Mr. Adam Duncan for which the school board of that day paid to Mr. Duncan the sum of \$100.00. It was no donation.

Two of the school board who negotiated the purchase are still living and state that they saw the hundred dollars paid to Mr. Duncan. The deed which is on record at Dalhousie, is made out in the prescribed legal form and the land thereby conveyed to the Board of School Trustees, their successors and assigns forever. The School Board subsequently, with the authority of the Board of Education, transferred by deed this land, with the building thereon, to the Town of Campbellton. The land and building is therefore now under the control of the Town Council.

Coun Laughlan thought some agreement should be made with the County Council in regard to the town lock-up. He moved, seconded by Coun. Ferguson, that Coun. Taylor be empowered to make a settlement on the basis of resolution passed at a meeting of this council held on Nov. 7, 1904, whereby the town would take control of the building, pay all expenses, with the understanding that in case of loss or damage by fire the insurance money to be applied to erecting new building or for repairs. Carried unanimously.

Some discussion followed on the Provincial Hospital account, which was again to the fore. It was thought that the Solicitor General would visit Campbellton in the near future and the matter would be satisfactorily adjusted. Council then adjourned.

POLICE COURT

Yesterday an interesting case was up for trial before Police Magistrate Matheson. It was the sequel to the "surprise party" mentioned in the Tribune this week. The facts of the case are about as follows as related by one of the police officers.

Jas. Gallant, Wm. Dobson and Jas. Teed broke into Wm. Dobson's Sr., bar, took his horse and sleigh and after purchasing some liquor, although it was Sunday, drove to Mission Point, where they proceeded to make merry. Warrants were issued for the three on Monday for taking the horse and Police Officers Noble and Chamberlain started to search for the lads. About 12 o'clock Monday night they entered the double house occupied by Messrs John Gallant and Teed in search of Jas. Gallant and Dobson, they having been seen there. Noble arrested Dobson but Gallant escaped to his father's part of the house through an upstairs door. When officer Chamberlain went to door through which Gallant escaped he was met by John Gallant. The door was not broken by the policemen, as stated in the Tribune, Chamberlain stepped inside and read the warrant for the arrest of Jas. Gallant, whereupon he was told that the lad was not in the house. Chamberlain said he was going to see for himself and Gallant grabbed a chair and threatened to strike the officer if he attempted to search his premises. Officer Noble hearing the disturbance went upstairs, taking his prisoner with him, in time to prevent Gallant from carrying out his threat. Gallant then went into another room and called for a revolver, saying that the officers would not go out alive. After an unsuccessful search the officers left the house with their prisoner Dobson. They are contemplating taking action against Gallant Sr., for obstructing them in the performance of their duties.

On Tuesday a warrant was issued against Jas. Gallant for stealing \$25 from Patrick LeBlanc. Officers Duncan, Chamberlain and Noble went to the Gallant house determined that their man would not evade them. Noble went to the back of the house, while Duncan and Chamberlain went in the front door, whereupon Jas. Gallant made a rush out the back door, where he was captured by Noble and afterwards locked up.

The case against the three lads Gallant, Dobson and Teed for taking the horse came up for hearing yesterday but was dismissed on account of lack of evidence.

The case against Jas. Gallant for stealing the money from LeBlanc was also heard, with the result that sufficient proof was brought against him to warrant the magistrate in sending him up for trial.

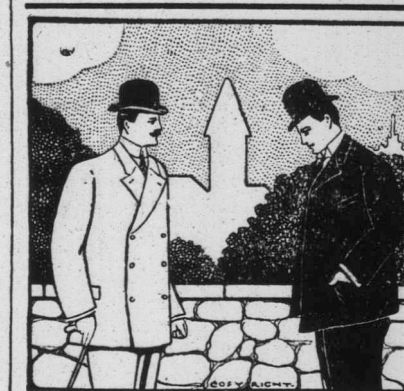

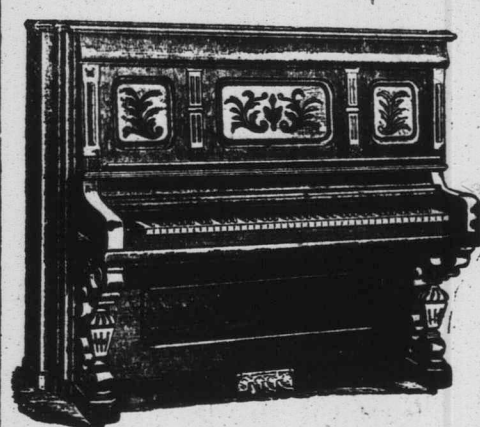

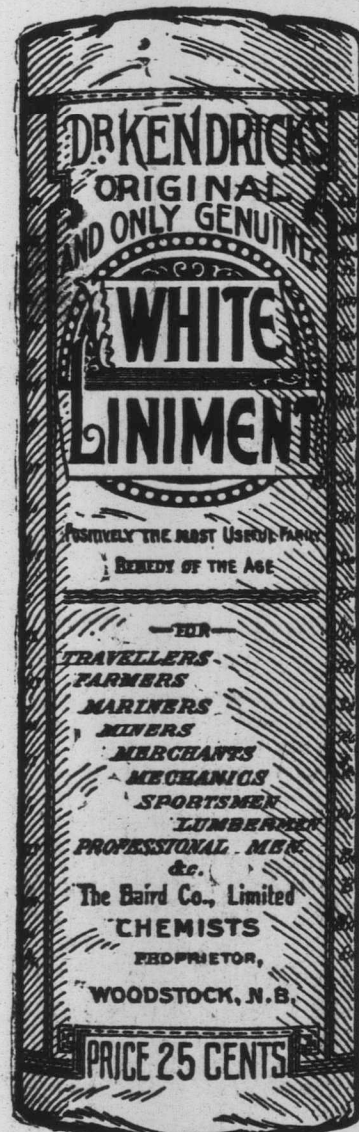
Miss Pauline White returned to Dalhousie convent to resume her studies.

WIN THEIR CASES

Restigouche Riparian Ass'n.
Given Judgment Against
Dynamiters.

About three months ago we published a report concerning certain cases that had been taken by the Restigouche Riparian Association, against certain individuals who have been using dynamite on the Matapedia River.

As our readers will remember, the offence above mentioned, namely Frank Beaurivage and J. N. Tremblay of Levis and Alfred Cote of Trois Pistols and Ernest Labrie of St. Eloi.

Mr. Max Mowat representative of the Riparian Association had offered a hundred dollars reward for proof against these parties and this offer along with other tracing, secured the necessary facts to obtain the conviction of these men.

Mr. John Hall Kelly was retained for the prosecution by the members of the Riparian Association, and the accused were represented by the legal firm of Tessier, Fiset and Tessier, Advocates of Roumouki and Wm Poullet and Drapier advocates.

When the accused heard that a reward was offered, they thought to evade the law by asking friends of theirs to swear to complaints against themselves, which was done, and they were accordingly condemned before a Justice of the Peace, Ferdinand Hapell of Causapocal. When the accused were rearrested under the warrants taken out by Mr. Mowat for the Riparian Association, they then pleaded that they had already been condemned and could not be condemned a second time for the same offence.

Mr. Kelly answered this plea by stating that the first convictions had been obtained through fraud and collusion, and that the accused had resorted to these first convictions in order to prevent the Riparian Association from having them condemned as they deserved.

This was the first time that such a plea has been brought up in the Province of Quebec at a preliminary examination of the prisoners, and the result was that many adjournments of the cases took place and Judge Chauveau who is also Professor of Criminal Law at Laval University, Quebec, after taking the case under consideration ordered a rehearing on the above stated point of law.

The cases were argued anew during the present month at Rimouski, and they were fixed for judgment on Friday last.

Just before judgment was to be rendered, the attorneys for the accused, seeing from the remarks of the judge that judgment was to be rendered against them, asked permission to withdraw their plea, and put in a plea of guilty.

They were all four condemned on their plea of guilty, and sentenced to imprisonment and also to a fine. In summing up the cases Mr. Kelly stated that such cases deserved to be punished.

If this kind of practice was carried on for even a very short time, the rivers would soon be only ordinary streams, and the net fishermen along both sides of the Bay Chaleur as well as the American gentlemen who lease these rivers would be the ones to suffer thereby. By killing the salmon in the river with dynamite the spawning grounds are destroyed.

Judge Chauveau reprimanded the accused very severely and said that the public in general benefit greatly by the large sums of money that the American sportsmen spend in our province and on our rivers, and they should receive the protection of the law. No one has the right to use dynamite on any river, and still less to a river leased to private individuals. By breaking the law in such a manner, the accused were exposing themselves to very severe punishments and any man who uses dynamite in a salmon river, and makes a practice of this, in order to injure the rights of others deserves no mercy from our courts. The law is very severe on this point and the criminal code of

LIQUOR INQUIRY

Witness tell of Gambling
For Geese and Money

BATHURST, N. B., Jan 11. — The investigation into the charges brought against the liquor license commissioners and the inspector for the county of Gloucester before Hon W P Jones this morning.

G G Gilbert appeared on behalf of the complainants and W. A. Mott and John J Harrington for the commissioners and the inspector. About a dozen witnesses were examined, confirming to a great extent the testimony already given as to the violation of the law by holders of wholesale licenses selling at retail and gambling on licensed premises.

The gambling, however, according to most of the witnesses, consisted mainly of playing for geese, a game somewhat peculiar to Bathurst and vicinity whereby all chip in and buy one goose or more. Then the game commences and the winner carries off the goose. Evidently the witnesses distinguish this pastime from the ordinary vulgar vice of gambling.

One witness testified, this morning, that he had been in licensed premises and had seen the inspector play cards for money.

As to the charge that the inspector is a confirmed drunkard the witness generally deposed that they would not consider him a drunkard, some of them had seen him, on more than one occasion, under the influences of liquor; others when he was feeling "nice," and others when he would have been just as well if he hadn't taken so much.

Cross-examined the witnesses with one exception gave the commissioners and the inspector certificates of good character. The exception decided not to give any opinion.

John E O'Brien, before whom all the liquor cases are tried, was a long while on the stand giving testimony and details as to every case dealt with during the year.

A night session of the court is being held which will probably wind up the evidence for the complainants.

Canada provides that a person who commits such an offence leaves himself liable to eleven years imprisonment.

There are also two other cases against Antoine Fortin and Lude Tremblay for having fished for salmon on the Matapedia river out of season. They were both condemned to the sum of twenty dollars and the costs of the case, which were very heavy.

During the past season Mr. Mowat secured several other convictions against parties who had been poaching on the Matapedia River, and it is probable that these parties or others will not resort to such a pastime in the future.

Mr. Mowat deserves to be congratulated for having taken action against the guilty parties, and the same course will be followed in the future if the rights of the Clubs are not respected.

NEW WHARF.

Foreman Making Preparations to Begin Work Of Construction.

Before very long the government wharf at the lower end of the town will present a very busy appearance. Contractor Simmons now has quite a force of men engaged completing the extension to the government wharf and in a few days a large crew of men will commence work on the approach to the proposed wharf for the Lady Eileen. This work will be done by the day under the foremanship of W. P. Gray. The plan calls for a 15 foot crib work, set out from the main wharf at the shore end about 20 feet and at the junction with the new wharf, a distance of 60 feet. The intervening space will be filled in and planked over, making a total width of 35 feet at the shore and 75 feet at the other end. The length of this work is about 270 feet.

Tenders for the new Lady Eileen wharf, which is to be 200x75 feet, are now under consideration by the department and the contract will likely be awarded in a few days, so that in the near future a third force of men will be engaged in wharf construction.
