It is becoming more apparent that both the Government officials and higher ecclesiastics are resisting the advice of intemperate-minded persons. Minister of Public Worship Briand announces that the Government "cannot be driven into the trap of closing the churches," and Cardinal Richard, archbishop of Paris, has strongly censured the placarding of appeals to the clericals to make violent resistance to the officers of the law.

"No violence," he says, "but passive resistance to the unjust law, after exhausting all protests at every step." This is the disposition, so far as the higher ecclesiastics are concerned, but their followers are preparing to abandon the churches and organize private

PASSENEERS AND CREW SAFE

Terrible Privations for Two Days, Until Rescued by a Passing Steamer.

Port Arthur, Ont., Dec. 11. - The teamer Monarch, of the Northern Navigation Company's fleet, is a total loss at Blake's Point, the extremity of Isle Reyale. She left Port Arthur at 4 o'clock Thursday afternoon, and went on the beach at 11 o'clock the same night, in a blinding snowstorm, then raging. The bow of the steamer was driven up on the shore, and the crew of 38 and 8 passengers were able to reach the land in safety by a rope, the end of which had been lassoed over a rock. One of the crew-James Jacques, of Point Edwardperished, being carried away by

huge wave. The unfortunate people built fires in the bush, and they were able to bring blankets and food from the steamer. They remained huddled over the fire, without shelter and with the thermometer standing as low as 25 degrees below zero, for a night and two days before they were able to attract any notice. On Sunday evening they, signaled a passing steamer, the Edmonton, which came on to Port Ar-

thur with news of the disaster. The wrecking tug Whalen was dispatched to the scene yesterday morning, and she returned here with 41 persons, who were taken off the inhos-

pitable shores. Some of the crew, including Capt. Robertson, were badly frostbitten about the ears, hands, and feet, but it is not thought that the results will be serious with any. This was the Monarch's last trip for the season. She was going down with a full cargo of wheat and flour.

Famine in Many Provinces Is Causing Peasants Frightful Suffering.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 10.—The acute political unrest in Russia has diverted the attention of the world from the fearful economic conditions prevailing throughout large areas of 'he empire, involving horrors and sufferings among peasants vastly greater than the oppression of even the most ruthless administrative exterminators.

In ten provinces in Central and beginning to end. The chancellor a Southeastern Russia the cumulative competitor of the courtly camarilla, evils of three successive bad harvests afflict the peasant population, who are now at the starving point. The Stoly-pin Government is doing its best to cover up the horrors by optimistic tales of improving times, but the dreadful fact remains that nearly six million Russians are panic-stricken and on the verge of starvation. Nearly two millions are actually suffering from direct pangs of hunger.

Conditions are worst in the Province of Simbirsk, but they are nearly as bad in Orel, Voronej, Afa and Perm. Nothing sensible has yet been done by the Government officials in St. Petersburg, while the local officials are at loggerheads, each accusing the other of peculation and stupidity. The railways which should forward grain to the famine districts are completely disorganized, and hundreds of wagonloads of rye and wheat have been lying rotting at way stations for months.

RUSS AND JAP STILL AT TREATY

mouth Conference Not Yet Concluded.

London, Dec. 9.—The Times has received the following cable dispatch from its correspondent at St. Peters-Contrary to the prevailing rumors, I understand there will be no important ministerial changes before the elections.

The reactionary influences continue to be strongly exerted against Stolypin, and political wiseacres prophesy all sorts of combinations in which the names of Witte, Kokovtsoff and Vasilchikoff alternate. For the present, however, there is no reason to presume that the sovereign's confidence in Stolypin is impaired.

The Novoe Vremya publishes an ap-

parently inspired note on the pending negotiations with Japan, which describe them as proceeding slowly, and not without difficulties. The note proceeds. "It is well known that the treaty of Portsmouth left not a few questions open. The Japanese Government, in discussing these questions displays a great deal of insistency, and interprets them with extreme latitude. The exacting tendency of the Japanese Government is particularly strong in its negotiations for a fishery convention; also with respect to a commercial treaty in connection with which leges irreconcilable with the interests of our borders. There also is proceeding complicated diplomatic correspondence regarding the sequestration of the Red Cross property seized at Port Arthur, the regulations issued in September for the usufruct of private property in Kwangtung, and the affairs of our fisheries. United States Govt. Owes Canadian Farmers Over Million for Excess Duty.

Ottawa, Dec. 11.-Petitions are once more being sent in to the Canadian Government asking them to renew the demand upon Washington for a settlement of the claims of Canadian farmers, 90 per cent of whom are in the Province of Quebec, for a refund of excess of duty collected about the year 1881 upon hay sent into the United States. The claims in question aggregate abou \$750,000, and with the addition of interest would make \$1,500,000. The circuit court of the northern district declared that the duties paid on the hay in question were double the amount called for by law. In spite of the justness of the claims they have not yet, although a quarter of a century has elapsed, been satisfied by the United States Government. On technical grounds payment has from time to time been evaded. This is not a very dignified proceeding for a great and wealthy nation like the United States. Another indebtedness to Canadians which the adjoining republic has failed to discharge is the cost of repairing a cable at Quebec, broken some years ago by a revenue cutter which had been granted permission by our Government to pass through the canal system from the upper lakes in order to reach the Atlantic. Apologies for the breakage were made at the time by the United States war department, coupled with a promise to pay. That was the last the sufferers heard of the matter, and up to date no reimbursement has been made. Perhaps it would be as well for the United States Government before undertaking to buy out Canada's rights in the seal fisheries or any other national asset to scan their accounts for the past 25 years and settle obligations which have been long overdue. They can then start with a clean sheet after paying off old scores.





He lays bare to the bone.-Metropolitan Magazine.


