





Fortyfive per cent of the pauperism, or 412.133 persons (being 11.5 per 1.000 of the population) were infirm: 242.-546 persons, or 26.8 per cent of pauwere children, while the insane numbered 115,163, or 12.7 per cent of pauperism, or 3.2 per 1,000 of population.
