FRENCH OF PROVINCE ASK BILINGUAL SCHOOL

Educational Congress at Capital Discusses the Subject.

Ottawa, Jan. 19.—The French-Canadian Educational Congress of Ontario in private session here this morning decided to advocate for the establishment of a representative French-Canadian weekly for the province, a larger French representation on the Ontario bench, and in the Dominion Senate, and the establishment of separate schools for French-Canadians wherever possible. There are over 1,000 delegates now in the city. This evening a public reception was held, at which Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. Charles Murphy, and others spoke.

FRANCE ENCOURAGES U. S.

French Chamber of Deputies To Take Action on Tariff.

Paris, Jan. 20.—The publication by President Taft of the names of the foreign countries that will be granted minimum tariff rates by the United States, excluding as it does both France and Germany, has greatly alarmed the French Government, and the Minister of Commerce announced today that he will ask the Senate to raise the tariff schedules fixed by the Chamber of Deputies so as to make them more favorable to American trade.

LINER TUNISIAN HAS ROUGH VOYAGE

Halifax, Jan. 19.—The Allan liner Tunisian, three days overdue from Liverpool, has arrived after the worst voyage she has ever made. On Sunday afternoon, Jan. 9, she only made 133 miles.

Toronto, Jan. 19.—The different representatives of the Railway Brotherhood will when they journey to Montreal to discuss matters with the general managers of their roads, urge for the immediate abolishing of what they term shadowing employees while off duty. It seems that during the past year, when the employees receive their pay checks on pay day, they are followed to the bank at which it is payable, by one of the company's secret service men. If they enter a saloon the fact is reported to the divisional superintendent.

TAFT WOULD AVOID FRICTION WITH CANADA

U. S. Frontier Cities Hostile to Minimum Tariff Being Used.

Washington, Jan. 19.—The proclamation of the President yesterday, naming the European countries who will enjoy the minimum tariff under the Payne-Aldrich bill, brings the question of Canada's position to the fore. It is well known that Mr. Taft is anxious to avoid friction with the Dominion, and would be pleased to place that country under the minimum clause. To this end he has been beset with requests from chambers of commerce along the frontier, whose members enjoy a large trade with Canada.

One of the nations placed under the minimum clause yesterday was Great Britain, and the question which now arises is whether Canada will be considered apart from Britain in tariff matters, and thus subject to the 25 per cent extra duty, or whether the Dominion will be deemed part of the British Empire for trade purposes and entitled to the minimum rate.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE E. M. A. SOCIETY

Secretary Trebilcock Had Some Good Things to Say of the Western Fair.

At the annual meeting of the East Middlesex Agricultural Society yesterday evening the following report was read by the secretary, Mr. Charles Trebilcock. In presenting my report for the past year, I cannot refrain from calling your attention to the general return to prosperity that has marked all trades and callings during the year. Nor have the farmers of this section enjoyed the least share of this return to prosperity. The demand for every kind of farm produce has greatly exceeded the supply, and we have profited by the resulting good prices. It is true there was a good deal of wet weather last spring, which somewhat delayed the seeding, and then the long midsummer drought prevented the crops from coming up to an average yield; but even this was not too discouraging. Pigs and beef-cattle brought exceedingly high prices, as also did all dairy products.

Our society has had a fairly prosperous year. Our chief interest, of course, is centred in the Western Fair Association. The exhibition of 1909 was one of the most successful in the history of the association. The attendance was nearly equal to that of previous years, and there is a surplus for this year.

It was attended by many prominent Canadian and shipping and railway men, including Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, the president, and other representatives of the Canadian Pacific Railway, as well as deputations from steamship alliances, Hamburg-American, Allan and White Star Steamship Companies, the Grand Trunk and Southern Pacific Railroads, the Bank of Montreal, J. O. Smith, representing the Canadian Government, and J. M. Clarke, the Ontario Government, also attended.

SEIZED THE BOATS.

Milwaukee, Wis., Jan. 19.—Following the appointment of the receiver in Cleveland for the Gilchrist Transportation Company, United States Marshal Well today seized 18 boats belonging to the company, which are in Milwaukee harbor. Twenty-five different writs of indictment were secured by creditors of the company against the vessels here.

Mr. C. C. James Says Municipal Reports Are Sent Promptly to Toronto by City Clerk.

At the Canadian Club luncheon at noon today Mr. C. C. James, Deputy Minister of Agriculture of Ontario, delivered a most interesting address on agriculture.

Three New Branches. "We have now three new branches to our department," said Mr. James.

Department of Agriculture. Mr. James referred to the growth of agriculture in Ontario. Thirty years ago the department had but \$130,000 to expend, when last year the estimates were \$750,000.

Ontario in First Place. Ontario still held first place in production of the farm. Last year approximately \$200,000,000 worth of farm products had been grown, more than in any other province of the Dominion.

Improvement of Products. There was the necessity of improvement of products. The best seed should be used, and the very best methods of development utilized by the farmer.
