

NEW PEACE MOVE BEING MADE IN NEXT FEW DAYS BY GERMAN CHANCELLOR FOR Numbers Only Limited by Accommodation Offered. S. Frank Glass Uses Influence CONSUMPTION OF NEUTRALS

OTHER CITIES GENEROUS HOPES FOR A REPRIEVE Once Wilson's Reply From Entente Is Received, Hollweg Is Expected To Further Define Position of Germany and Send More Notes to Neutral Powers.

> AMSTERDAM, Jan. 9 .- via London .- Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, the German imperial chancellor, may be expected to make an important declaration about the middle of the present month, according to a dispatch to the Tijd from Berlin today.

> The reply of the Entente to President Wilson is being awaited, says the dispatch, and the chancellor, after its contents are known, will further define in the Reichstag the position of Germany.

> Germany, it is declared, will simultaneously address epresentations to the neutrals which supported President Wilson's proposals.

AUSTRIAN CABINET APPEARS TO BE STRIKING SNAGS

dispatch to the Tageblatt from Vienna says the Austrian cabinet, headed by Count Clam-Martinio, which it had been expected would be able to solve most of the existing problems, appears to be strik-ing snags, which day by day grow more difficult to overcome. The Czech parties have suddenly ceased to demonstrate the concillatory and obliging attitude of confidence which had been expected of them, and which was counted upon mater-ially to help in the settlement of many problems.

Hold Aloof From Government The Austrian Socialists, also, says the Tageblatt correspondent, are holding absolutely aloof, and refuse to commit themselves to the Government. According to the correspondent it has now developed that the Germans in the cabinet joined it only under condition that "the Government supply the requisites for parliamentary rule," which has not yet been the case. Finally, says the correspondent,

the solution of the Galician problem, which seemed easy, has be-come extremely difficult, and the

Government also finds itself confronted with doubts about the wis dom of the ausgielch (trade agreement) with Hungary, as framed. Thus far, nevertheless, the Government still hopes to find a way out of its difficulties. Socialist Manifesto.

The Opposition Socialists, com-prising the supporters of the Reichstag minority, the so-called Spartacus group of extreme Socialists, and the adherents of the Socialist international movement, have just finished a convention here. They adopted unanimously & peace manifesto, in which it was declared that the time had come for the Socialiste in all belligerent countries to demand of their gov-ernments an exact statement of their war aims, and to oppose any conditions which would be humiliating to any belilgerent or injure its vital interests.

The manifesto opposes any territorial changes to which the inhab-Itants do not consent, and declares it to be the duty of all Socialists to fight every government and every party advocating war alms Inconsistent with the above.

At the same time, the board of trade should at once consider the changes and ascen tain whether other districts have had, their train service reduced in the same degree as London. The railways have maintained that too many trains are run for the volume of passenger traffic. And while war freight is being held up, it is probable that the change is absolutely necessary, especially so when one considers the short supply of coal upon which Western Ontario has been getting along.

The railway changes simply mean that the country is beginning to feel the necessity for getting down to bedrock and wasting as little as possible while the war is in progress. Railway equip. ment is difficult to secure, and the right class of skilled labor is scarce. It is no time for quibbling over the changes, but the city should examine the changes and ascertain the comparative results in various localities.







Hunger and Food Riots Confirmed by Troops Captured on Somme.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10 .- The Sun this morning publishes the following from

"The correspondent of the Sun is able to present letters of guaranteed authenticity, taken from German prisoners captured on the Somme within the last two weeks, revealing the actual conditions in Germany brought on by the food shortage. The following letter was written from Hanover:

"Here in Hanover the people are gradually becoming thinner, always thinner. Nobody ever grows any fatter. Anyone desiring to obtain food must obtain nothing. Isn't this awful?' A letter from Hamburg found on a German prisoner says:

Riot in Hamburg.

"Here in Hamburg there has been a frightful riot. Tonight in the Hof-weg. Bergweg and other streets, wo-men and children broke into shops and cobbed them. What is going to happen? The people have nothing to eat, there are no potatoes, grease and bread

Another letter from Hamburg says: "Yesterday it was war here, too. There were soldiers with bayonets a ir backs. All the bread and butter shops and some grocers' shops were wrecked. Then mounted soldlers ap-peared. What a life! They were afr doorsteps. This is a fine state of

A third letter from Hamburg says Gets Worse Every Day.

"There has been a frightful comm there has been a Frightful comma-tion here. The shops of Tietz and Heilbutt have been broken into and everything plundered. Bread has been stolen from the bakers. The green grocers had to sell all their potatoe

'It gets worse every day. A hundred vomen marched through the streets. They all wanted more to eat. For a ortnight we have seen no butter. Time continually getting worse. I don't know what the end will be.'






