BRITISH AIRMEN BOMBARD HINDOO TRIBE

PRINCE SPENDING TODAY SIGHT-SEEING IN NEW YORK

Natives On Northwestern Frontier Refused To Comply With Ultimatum Issued by British Government-Declined To Discontinue Attacks On British Posts and Convoys -British Fliers Given Orders To Attack Three Villages.

London, Nov. 19 .- Opening of aerial warfare against the Mahsuc tribesmen on the northwestern frontier of India has been ordered, it is stated in advices from India today. The order was given out November 12, after the Mahsud had refused to comply with the terms laid down in the British ultimatum late in October, in which the tribesmen were informed that unless they discontinued their continual attacks on British posts and convoys and their raids into British territory, they would be subjected to an Intense aerial bombardment. The British airmen now have been instructed to bombard the villages of Kanigurun, Makin and

The Waziri tribesmen in the same district who were similarly noti-Red in the ultimatum had been given until today to reply, and this morning the notification was still unanswered. The effects of their air bombardment have not yet been reported

Jellicoe Declares He Did Not Come to Advocate Militarism

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 19 .- In addressing the Canadian Club here yesterday Admiral Viscount Jellicoe, referring to his present mission, said it was to advise the people of Canada only on subjects on which his advice is asked. It was probably feared, he said, that he was going to suggest too much militarism and the spending of too much money. Such was not the case. He was only here, he said, in an advisory capacity. Admiral Jellicoe emphasized the necessity of British sea-power if the empire is to live, and the necessity of being prepared for any emergency

It was not necessary, he declared, to build up a spirit of militarism







To do this \$250,000 will be required in addition to the remainder of \$100,000 which was voted for the work some time ago.







PRINCE ATTENDS OPERA. NEW YORK, Nov. 18-One of the most brilliant scenes that the Metropolitan Opera House has witnessed was presented tonight at the

gala performance given in honor of the Prince of Wales. The great audience, which filled the house, overflowed into the airles until every available bit of standing room was occupied.
When the prince, accompanied by Viscount Grey, the British ambas sador, entered his box in the centre

of the horseshoe at 10:15, he re-ceived a remarkable ovation. The vast audience rose to its feet, and, turning its back to the stage, applauded for three minutes. The young prince seemed almost embarrassed by the warmth of his reception, but the applause continued until the voice of Caruso, singing a selection from "I'Pagliacci," rose above it.

The program consisted of selections from various operas and concluded with a ballet. As the prince left the house he was the reciplent of another enthusiastic ovation, which was continued in Broadway, where, in spite of the fact that it was nearly midnight, a large crowd had gathered for a glimpse of the British prince.

Compromise moves to rescue the peace treaty from a threatened deadlock made such progress today that its friends declared it had more than an even chance for life.

So far as it had taken definite form tonight the program called for a final vote Thursday and pointed toward acceptance of reservations of the foreign relations committee without the requirement that they must be assented to affirmatively by the other powers.

The way to compromise was opened by the group of mild reservation Republicans, who served notice on the Republican and Democratic leaders that they would not put up the bars entirely to modification of the committee reservations, but would stand out against and defeat the administration's parliamentary program. Compromise moves to rescue the pear

parliamentary program.

Cards on Table.

With this final announcement of how their deciding strength would be used in the closing stages of the treaty contest, the mild reservationists retired to the background. The result was that Republican Leader Lodge and Democratic Leader Hitchcock faced each other and loid all their condensations. ther and laid all their cards on the

other and laid all their cards on the table.

The conference between the two leaders brought no final decision as to the language of a compromise ratification, but it did develop an agreement that the Democrats would have the opportunity for which they had fought to secure a showdown vote on the question of unreserved ratification.

This vote, Mr. Lodge said, would be permitted before the roll call on the committee resolution.

Lodge Insistent.

Another result of the conference was submission to Mr. Lodge tonight of a group of proposed compromise reserva-

group of proposed compromise reserva-tions with a view to making enough modification in the committee program already approved by the Senate major-ity to enable the Democrats to support the committee resolution on ratifica-tion. On this point Senator Lodge was said to be insistent, as he desired all compromise efforts to be made before the vote came on the committee meas-

the vote came on the committee measure.

Meantime in the Senate two more reservations were added to the thirteen already adopted. The mild reservationists supported them as the final qualifications which they would help to write into the treaty, but the Senate extended its session far into the evening, voting down numerous other proposals in an effort to clear the way before adjournment for work tomorrow on the ratification resolution itself.

The two reservations adopted today related to the labor provision in Part Thirteen of the treaty and to voting equality in the league of nations. They equality in the league of nations. They foliow:

"The United States withholds its assent to Part XIII (Articles 387 to 427 inclusive) of said treaty unless Congress, by act or joint resolution, shall hereafter make provision for representation in the organization established by said Part XIII., and in such event the participation of the United States will be governed and conditioned by the provisions of such act or joint resolution.

The state might do the rest by placing a very heavy percentage tax on the incomes of all individuals who are unmarried. This tax should not, however, be turned into the regular revenue of the Government but held as a trust fund or a sort of marriage insurance fund or a sort of marriage insurance, to be released to the individual on his or her marriage, or should he not marry. when he is no longer able to support himself on account of prolonged sickness or old age.

s cancer, owe their ing and frequent X - ray exposure which seems to be productive to these growths merely makes way for them.

Dr. Peyton Rons and other investigators at the Rockefeller Institute of Medical Research, announced some time ago that the juices and fluids of cancers or sarcomata, when filtered under pressure, retained the power to infect healthy tissues with malignant tumor growths. Despite this and other undisputed facts of like nature, many continue to pronounce cancers as non-infectious. They blame it, or at least try to do so by inference, upon heredity a scapegoat almost as uncanny inervousness and imagination.

Experiments With Warts.

Wile and L. B. Kingery of the University of Michigan, have evidence to show that warts injected into healthy flesh are capable of infecting it with their kind. 

Superintendent Testifies That Water Treatment Was to Reduce Congestion in Head.

Assistant District Attorney Thomas F. McKennell brought out from Miss Cobb, the superintendent of the reformatory, that during the past three years there had been 1,000 inmates in the institution and that only fifteen of them had been given the cold water treatment or had been handcuffed to the cell doors.

Inmates at the institution testified that a pail of water was thrown on a girl's head for punishment or else her head was forced in a bucket of cold water.

"What was the purpose of this treatment?" McKennell asked Miss Cobb.

"It was done to reduce blood congestion in the head of the girl." she said, and added that this treatment was carried out because of the behavior of girls who suffered from overwrought nerves. and added that this treatment was carried out because of the behavior of girls who suffered from overwrought nerves, who suffered from overwrought nerves. The witness said it was more for a correctional measure than for punishment and that if it was of no benefit the Idea was stopped.

The superintendent was asked by Lawyer Lynch how the girls were handcuffed, and she said their hands were placed behind their back, handcuffs adjusted, and then another pair of handcuffs were attached and these were fastened to the cell door. Witnesses testified that the stringing up process was in conjunction with the cold water process to quiet the girls and make them tractable.
