Samsonoff's few hundred Cossacks, who constituted the garrison. Gen. Sakharoff, in a report received from the general staff, gives further details of the advance of the Japanese forces, and says that on July 7 several minor engagements occurred, but consequence. 

#### The Boundary Papers.

The official papers on the Alaskar boundary question have been laid or the table of the House of Commons They show that the Dominion Government, at the outset of the negotia tions, objected to the composition of the tribunal, expressing the hope that the questions to be adjudicated upon should be submitted to a board of arbitrators, composed in part of foreign jurists, or to The Hague tribunal. Secretary Hay replied that the form of arbitration proposed was the only one acceptable to the President, and that a treaty involving submission of the dispute to foreign arbitration, or The Hague tribunal, would stand no chance of ratification by the United States

When the Colonial Secretary notified Ottawa that Messrs. Root, Turner and Lodge had been nominated as the American members of the tribunal, the Canadian Government at once lodged a protest. "My Ministers," wired Lord Minto, "respectfully but strongly represent that Mr. Root, as a member of the United States Government, directly concerned, is, therefore, one of the disputants in the case, and also that Senators Lodge and Turner cannot be accepted in the class of impartial jurists provided for in the treaty, having both already emphatically declared themselves against the Canadian side of the case. Proposed appointments would be looked upon by my Government as violation of important articles in treaty." Supplementing this dispatch was another one, calling attention to the treaty stipulation that members of the court should be impartial jurists.

Lord Onslow, Under Secretary of State for the Colonies, in reply, admitted that the personnel of the American members had been as much a surprise to the Imperial as to the Canadian Government. It seemed useless, he said, to press the United States Government to withdraw the names. His Majesty's Government had no choice between breaking off negotiations altogether or accepting the American There are fragments of song that nobody nominations, and appointing as their colleagues men who "would meet the altered circumstances of the case."

The Dominion Government declined to accept the suggestion that the disnonorable example of the United States should be copied, and the treaty violated by the appointment of partisans on the British side. This dispatch was sent on March 6, and on the next day the ratifications of the treaty were exchanged in London over the head of the Canadian protest.

The appointment of declared partisans is a discreditable chapter in American diplomacy, but the fault is not wholly that of the executive. The present administration has shown a friendly disposition toward Great Britain, and was no doubt sincerely desirous of removing the irritating boundary dispute, but its hands were tied by the Senate and by
