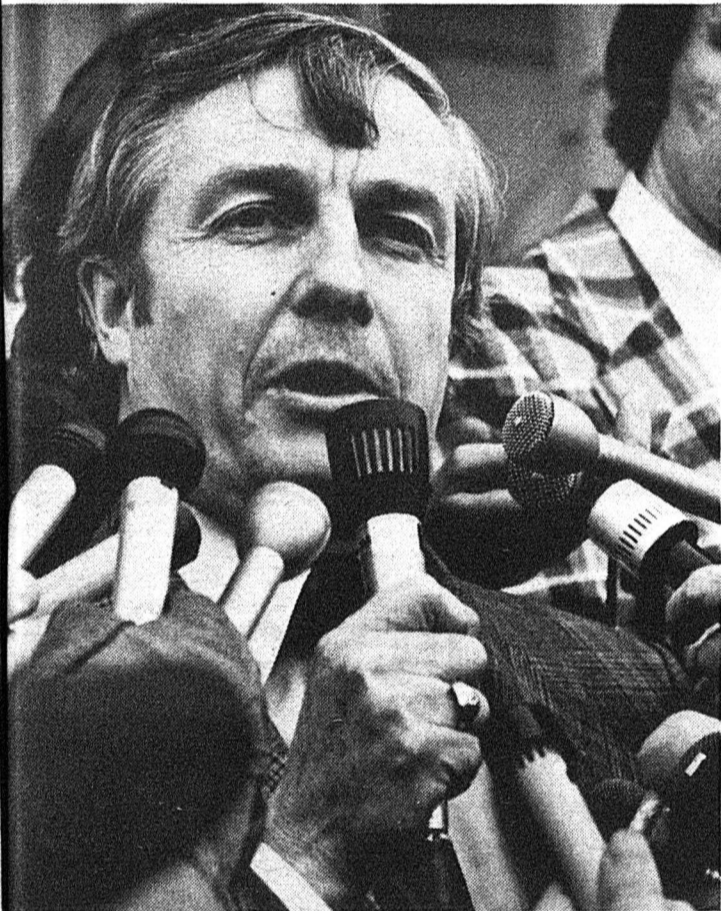

# ALBERTA SPLIT POSSIBLE SAYS PREMIER PETE



Premier Lougheed make Tuesday announcement.

Alberta may separate from Confederation, Premier Peter Lougheed said in a Tuesday press conference, although a provincial referendum on the subject would have to be held before such a move will be made.

"More and more Albertans are telling us they're not happy with the deal we're getting in our federalist Canada," Lougheed said in a 10-minute prepared speech, broadcast over both national television networks.

## Land claim score

Events at Hobbema reserve today heralded a new land policy for Alberta's native peoples.

In a solemn ceremony presided over by government officials, native leaders took possession of small token plots approximately six by four feet, with additional mineral rights extending six feet under the earth's surface.

Actual acceptance of the claims was marked by a 101-gun salute, courtesy of the newly formed Alberta Provincial Police.

APP officials later denied that several natives were cut down by rifle fire during the salute.

The granting of the plots was only the first step in a massive plan to solve AERTA'S "Indian problem." The leaders themselves declined comment

after the ceremony, observing their proverbial "stoic" attitude.

M. Bormann, deputy minister of lands and resources, said he hoped the leaders would soon relax their present rigid posture with regard to the claims. Bormann also unveiled further sweeping changes in the Government's policy.

"We don't realize what a valuable resource our natives are," said the aging German-born official. "We feel that the Government of Alberta must take a leading role in the development of industries in which our Indians can play a vital part."

Facilities are already being erected in northern areas of the province, he said, at which native people will be used in the production of lampshades, soap, fertilizer and ashes.

"And it seems as time goes by we are getting a worse and worse economic deal from Ottawa. Perhaps it's time we agreed to economic separation and a negotiated political deal instead of our present, almost unworkable, union."

Lougheed said Alberta agreed with Quebec in its struggle to separate from Canada, although disagreeing with Quebec Premier Rene Levesque's view that economic union is less important than a political one.

Lougheed told the press conference that it is traditionally the economic ties which have oppressed western Canada and Alberta in particular. He cited western freight rates, federal oil and gas taxing and pricing policies, and Canada Wheat Board policies as examples of situations economically advantageous for central Canada but disadvantageous for Alberta.

## Hohol makes changes in Universities Act

Several amendments to the Universities Act were passed last week at the Legislature. Of significance is a law that professors in Alberta universities must be Canadian citizens at least ten years residence in Alberta, who earned their D. degrees at an Alberta university.

Another important amendment passed was one giving the Minister of advanced education power to override the Board of Governors or General Authorities Councils of the universities.

Within minutes after this amendment was passed, several announcements came from advanced education minister Hohol's office.

Dr. Hohol announced first institution of a Faculty of Indian Studies to fill the gap by the Faculty of Science, where an estimated five professors will remain after non-Albertans leave.

Fees for out-of-province students will increase by 500 per cent since, as Hohol stated, it is

Also announced was the abolition of the Students' Union and other student representation. The reasoning was that students are an interest group

whose interests run counter to those of normal Albertans, who, of course, have made the university what it is.

Hohol's final pronouncement was that the name of the Henry Marshall Tory Building would be changed to, simply, the Tory Building.

When interviewed by the *Getaway*, a senior official of the university, who wished to remain anonymous, said these recent developments will cause many problems

After all non-Albertans leave, the student to staff ratio on campus will be 600 to 1. This will mean that class size will range from 100 in advanced seminar courses to about 1500 in several first year courses.

Since lecture theatres of suitable size are lacking, classrooms will have to be enlarged. Where structurally feasible, walls between adjacent rooms will be knocked out. This approach will lead, for example, into V-wing being converted into

consistently shown a pro-central Canada bias," Lougheed charged, "and we are out to break that bias."

Lougheed said his government would begin campaigning for Alberta separation and would possibly hold a referendum on the issue within a year. He said his government would also begin programs which could easily be continued if Alberta decided to separate from the rest of Canada.

He said some of those programs might include paramilitary work for young men opening up Alberta's northern wilderness areas. He hinted such work might become compulsory

for young men following high school.

Lougheed added that he had already begun an Alberta provincial police force under the direction of Solicitor-General Roy Farran, who will lead the first detachment of the APP in a commando-attack on a

suspected Israeli stronghold in southern Calgary.

Premier Lougheed concluded the press conference with rendition of "Alberta, Alberta above all others," which he says is intended to be the national anthem should Alberta decide to become a sovereign state.

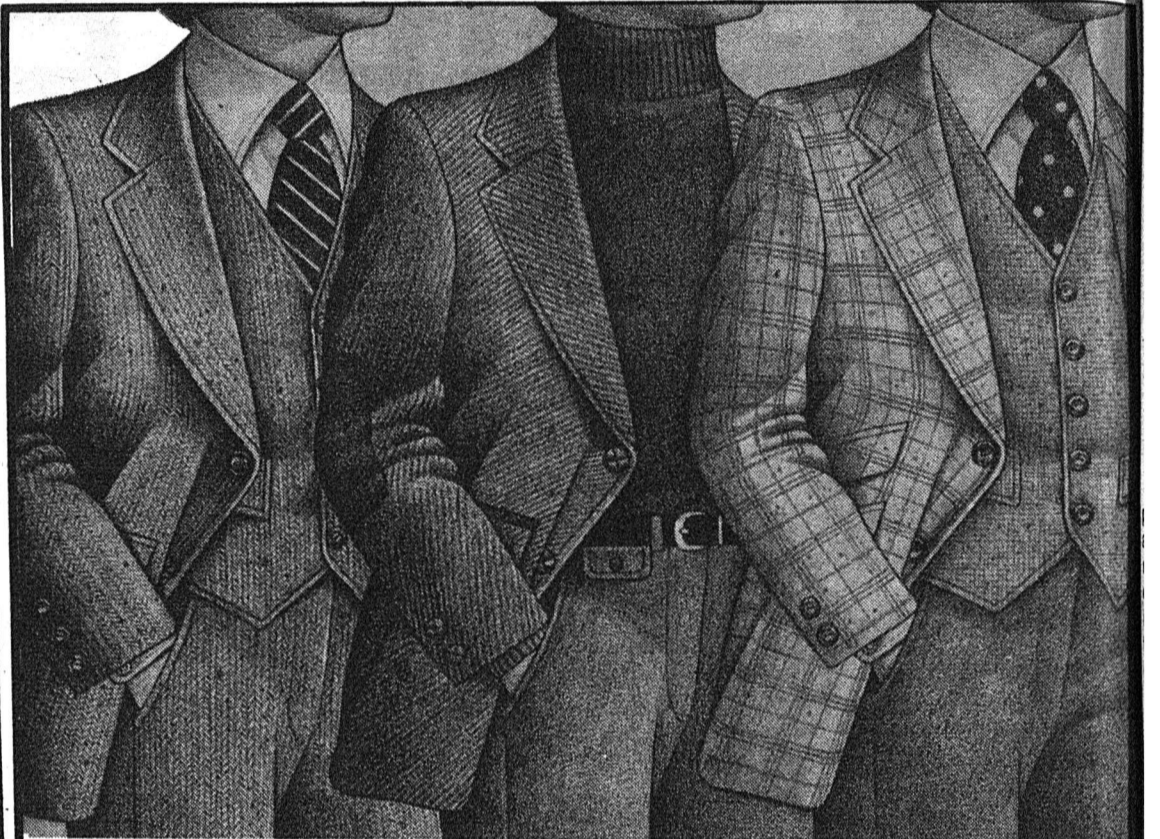

two lecture theatres.

Another approach will be to use television monitors to make one instructor available in many classrooms. In this way, the entire second floor of Humanities Centre will be converted into one classroom for English 200.

According to the senior

official, the most promising approach so far is to use large public buildings. He said negotiations have begun for the use of the Edmonton Coliseum for all Education courses, allowing students to be registered, processed and given their degrees in two weeks.

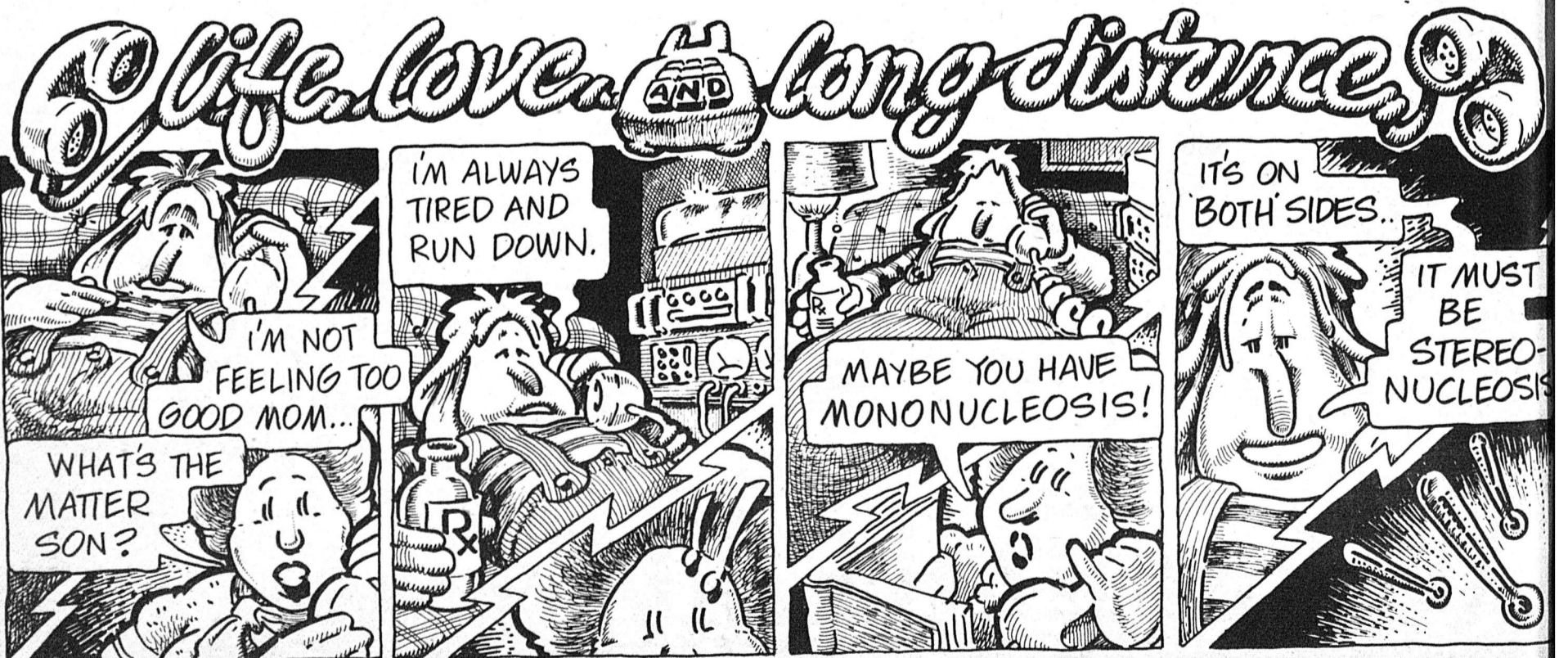


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## Lister Hall put up for sale

The Lister Hall complex was put up for sale by the university administration Monday. Soaring maintenance costs, coupled with declining numbers of student renters were the reasons listed by the university's department of planning and development, in a press release.

Buxton Real Estate, who are handling the sale, have studied the complex Kelsey, Mackenzie, Henday, and Lister halls and estimate their value at slightly over \$500,000. Sources indicate, however, that Buxton will accept Park Place and a hotel on Baltic Avenue in straight trade.

Prospective buyers include the U of A Students' Union, who have indicated they will continue to operate the halls as student residences, if they win their bid. The SU claim that they can

operate Lister more efficiently than the university did because of their experience with HUB and because they are willing to "bend the rules" more than administration. "We might have all night

## Dirty tricks cited at student elections

Revelations of political dirty tricks rocked this campus today when it was discovered that the campaign of the Conceptual Reality Alternative Party (CRAP) slate in this year's SU executive election had been deliberately sabotaged.

In what has become known as the WaterGateway scandal, a group of trained apes, disguised as member of Campus Security, began their counter-campaign by tearing down numerous CRAP posters throughout the university.

This team of tricksters then invaded CRAP campaign headquarters in SUB 226 (the WaterGateway). Here they discovered plans for a fake assassination of Rene LeLarke to be held as a publicity stunt at the election rally.

They quickly substituted real bullets for blanks, and LeLarke, as they had anticipated, was shot. Fortunately, only his nose was damaged in the incident.

In a *Getaway* interview Monday, LeLarke stated that he plans to sue the university for damages

of \$10.35, the cost of replacing the nose.

Informed sources link this plot to the president, who reportedly feared that, with CRAP in power, members of the Board of Governors and General Faculties Council might begin to wake up at meetings. President Gunning has, however, denied any knowledge of the WaterGateway break-in.

When questioned, Campus Security chief Breakey at first refused to divulge any information about the affair. When questioned by GFC, however, Breakey admitted that he had supplied Campus Security uniforms for the imposters at the request of a superior.

Upon further questioning, Breakey also admitted that, yes, the imposters had shown such a high aptitude for the job that he had immediately hired them and had since promoted several of them.

Rumors indicate Breakey may be relieved of his responsibilities in the near future.

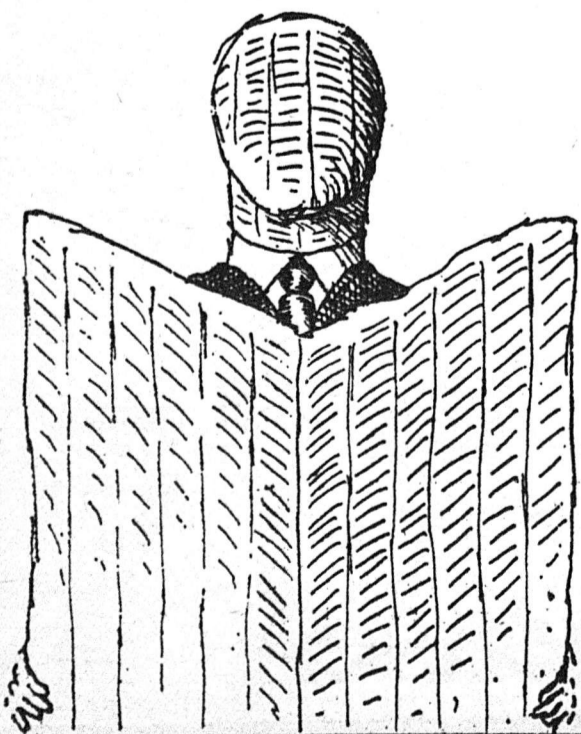
Or maybe it doesn't say anything at all.

## Mad seal bites Bridgette

MONTREAL (Special) — Bridget Bardot is listed in critical condition at Queen Elizabeth Hospital here and doctors give her slim chances of pulling through a babies infection resulting from a vicious attack of baby harp seals as she tried to pet them during a news conference over the weekend.

(Slurtig, paperback 1977, \$6.95)

Frank Mutton's biography of the late Student's Union President Jay Spark must surely rank as his greatest literary work. This definitive volume offers a rare insight into a 'man in charge', and it is written with such depth of feeling that one begins to feel an immediate kinship with Jay.

We all knew him as a man of authority, but few of us ever saw the deep compassion that he held for everyone. Frank illustrates this so poignantly by mentioning the hamsters Jay kept in the presidential office. He loved those little furry creatures so much that when one, named Howie, passed on, he arranged a simple little ceremony and had it buried in Quad. Only a great man like Mr. Spark would do such a thing.

Jay was also a family man, as we see in the chapter of the book entitled 'Jay-Jay Grows Up'. We are told that as a youngster growing up in a middle-class neighbourhood of Calgary, Mr. Spark was forced to suffer the indignity and embarrassment of having to park his Mustang on the street, since the family had no room in the driveway. He swore then that 'as God is my witness, I'll never do without a two-car garage again.'

True to his word, Jay began work the next week as a part-time accountant and managed to save enough in two years to make the down payment on a split-level on Lake Bonavista. At the time of his death, he had amassed a block of real estate ringing the lake, and was charging kiddies \$1.25 to swim. He was always thinking, that boy.

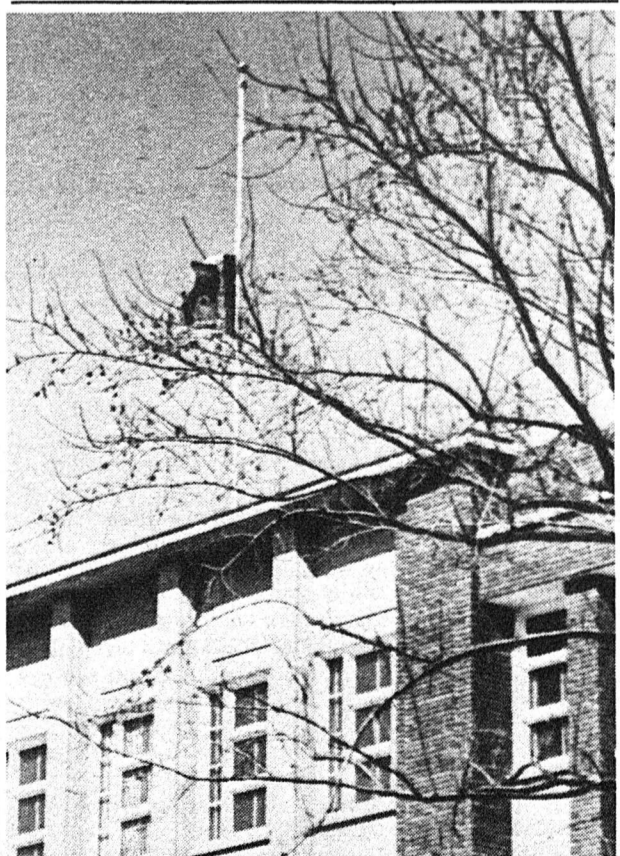

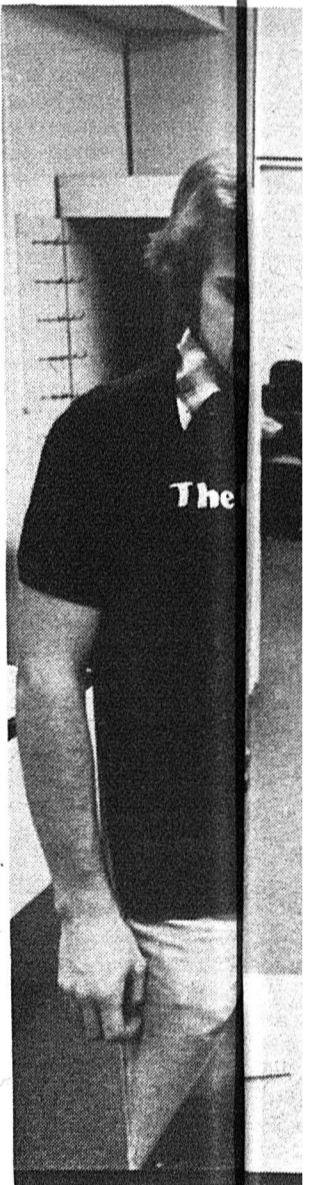

## DO YOU REMEMBER?

What were you doing on that tragic day last fall when an assassin's bullet ripped through the right front tire of President Jay Spark's official Toyota, sending the little yellow car careening into a parked ETS bus?

How did the tragic news reach you? Were you seated comfortably in your easy chair, watching Alex Moir talk about telephone rates on CBC, when the bulletin was handed to him and he fell weeping before the camera?

Frank Mutton, in his new book *Goodbye, Mr. Spark*, relates his own experiences on that mournful day. He had been assigned to cover the presidential motorcade (consisting of the Toyota and a Honda Civic) as it made its way through the streets

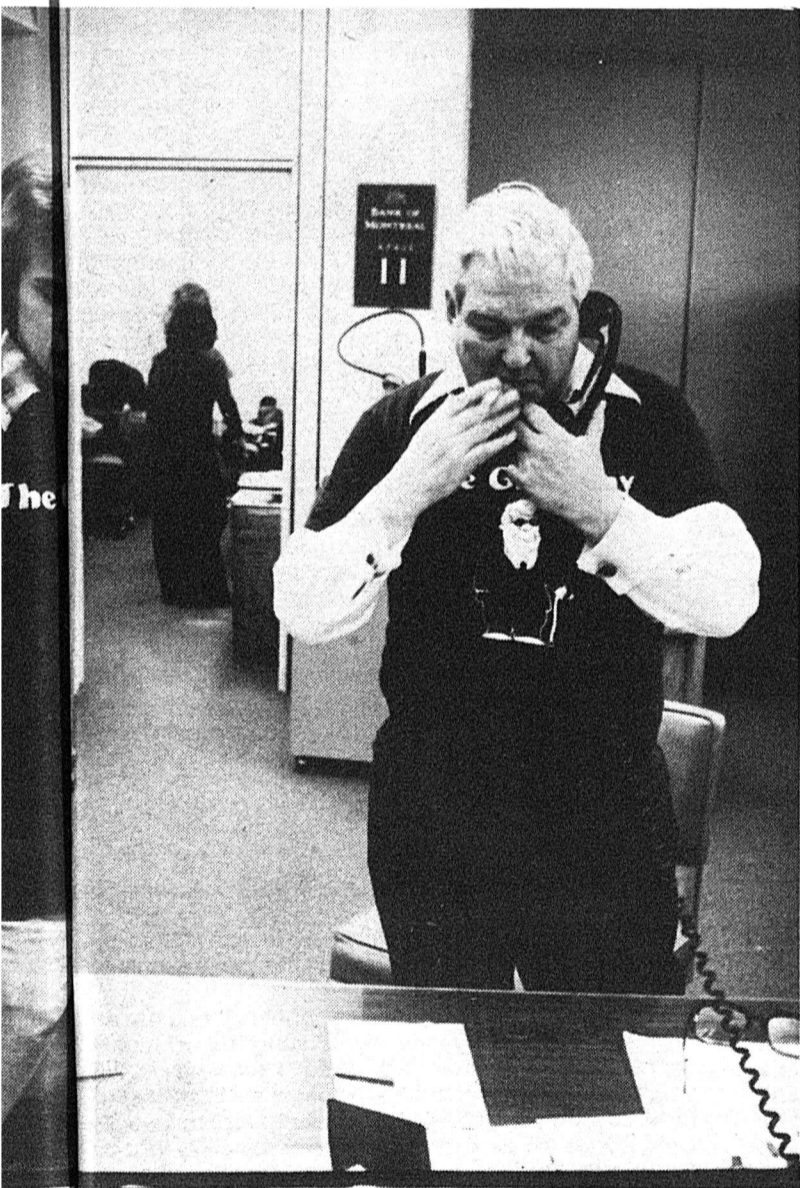
to the President's first GFC meeting. He tells us that, as he emerged from the bus shelter on the north side of 89 Avenue to get a better look at the President, a shot rang out, and then another. Before anyone knew what was happening, the Toyota had broadsided a 36 and Mr. Spark dangled from a tree, with fatal injuries to his nose and index finger.

The tragedy might soon have been forgotten, were it not for the film footage that a casual bystander, Dr. ZaGrude of the English Department, had been shooting at the time. We learn in Chapter 45 of the book that the professor's film reveals what looks to be a rifle barrel emerging from a second storey window in the Dentistry-Pharmacy Building.

Was this the assassin's weapon, or merely a broomhandle being waved about by a sloppy janitor?

Other interesting points are made by Mr. Mutton at this point. Why had the driver of the ETS 36 decided to stop a full fifty feet beyond the bus shelter? Why do we clearly see, in the ZaGrude film, a man with an umbrella dancing on the roof of Education North? Why was a half-open bag of Towne Cinema popcorn found clutched in the President's hand?

Unfortunately, Mr. Mutton doesn't answer any of these questions. But he has some really nice colour shots, and the type is really large and easy to read, and I think the cover is kind of interesting....

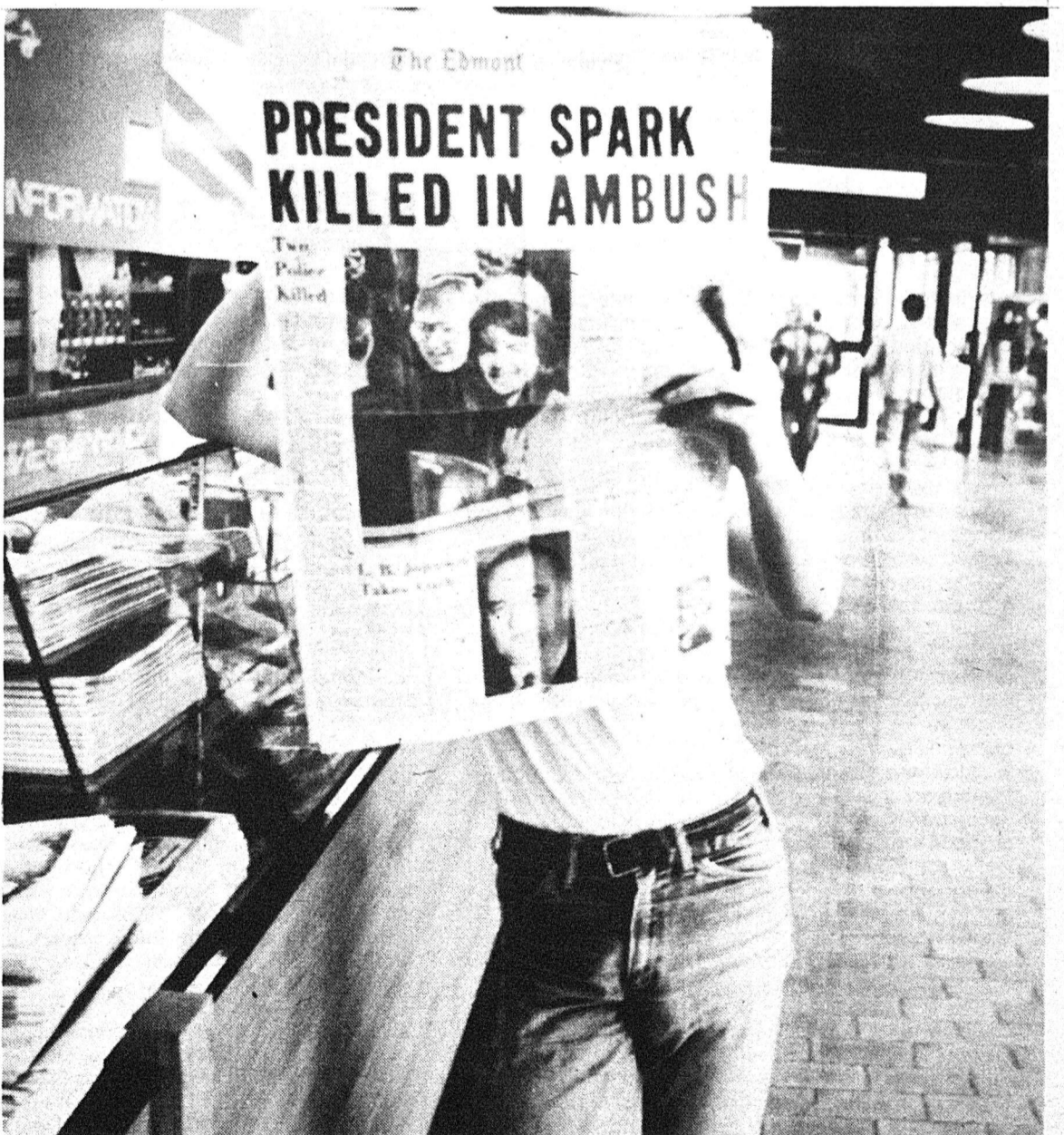


## He meets Mutton

## Pungent precocity

*Les Niais du Garneau*  
Written and Directed by  
Lina Wertmuller  
(Capitol Square).

There is a peculiar pungency about Lina Wertmuller's films, a roller-coaster careening from heights of great subtlety to jackhammer blows on the head. In this, her first film in French (trans: "The Simpletons of Garneau"), Wertmuller again regales us with the parade of absurdities and ironies which are the essence of life.

As in her previous classics (Love and Anarchy; Seven Beauties), the theme is simple: a year in the life of a Students' Union president at a dull, pedestrian barely-known university. Ah, but with what spirit she weaves her pastiche! There is all the Brobdignagian bragadoccio of a quadruplegic King Kong in her thrusting portrayal of the hero (improbably named Len Zoeteman).

In the title role of Zoeteman, Giancarlo Giannini has excelled himself. His is a performance of fulminating power, those oh-so ephemeral eyes darting to and fro with the joyous madness of a crazed pinball bouncing between frenzied bumpers. Yet Giannini can also be an actor of consummate depth. The haunting agony of his visage as he ponders the cancellation of a popular social event (curiously appellation *Bar None*) creates a moment not to be forgotten in cinematic history; particularly when combined with the grim spectre of a thousand chanting proletarians ("Aggies") attempting to influence his decision. This scene especially is a descent into Kafkaesque maelstrom, with horses here, cows there, and vast kegs of "draught beer" swirling around the chaos.

Also poignant is the Renaissance beauty of Dominique Sanda, who archly portrays a vice-president forced to sacrifice a powerful political career to care for her lunatic brother.

The whole bizarre beauty of "university life" portrayed through a slightly askew lens makes *Les Niais du Garneau* the unquestioned cinematic triumph of the season.

## Gogol misses

Few things in recent Canadian history have left as bitter a taste as the maltreatment of white people by intolerant, unthinking immigrants who are unwilling to tolerate and accept white Canadian culture and insist on maintaining ethnic purity.

The public outcry against this injustice, however, has not been forthcoming: it is a sad but true fact of Canadian life that the public has been all too willing to accept the outlandish behavior of the immigrants, and so far unwilling to press any decent, good, white values on them.

The problems faced by the courageous intellectual elite trying to do so — Alberta legislators — is poignantly etched in novice playwright E.P. Slougheed's gripping work *The Legislator Nogooks Incident*, now playing at the Rice Theatre of the Citadel complex.

Slougheed shows many of the weaknesses of the beginning playwright: there is a tendency to be ultra-sensitive to criticism, the long-term consequences of some actions aren't plotted out, but all the inherent weaknesses of the play are overcome by the masterful, driving performance of A.E. Gogol as himself. He is not a racist, Gogol explains, he merely wants to ensure that white Canadian culture as we know it is not overwhelmed by immigrants, and that goes for French Canadians too, he stresses in one of the most searing segments of a theatrical roller coaster.

"Nous sommes d'accord qu'il faut aimer les chinks et les chinois, mais nous esperons preserver nos traditions historiques et culturels," he says in this bilingual play funded by a 1.5 million dollar Canada Council grant which enabled the cast (who refer to themselves collectively as the Alberta Cabinet) to rehearse for six weeks at the height of the ski season in Gstaad, Switzerland.

This is the reasoning Gogol puts behind charging foreign students and immigrants exorbitant fees to study in Alberta universities, but his struggle appears to be for nought, as well-organized bands of radical communists and saccharin-users who boycott coffee oppose Gogol's valiant attempts to maintain cultural unity for whites. This leads to scenes of particular emotion, for example when Gogol, meeting with his opponents, makes a plucky, but unsuccessful plea of "Ein Volk, Ein Reich, Ein Führer."

How the struggle resolves itself in the end — and the questions it raises for Canadian society as a whole — make the play unforgettable.

# Ram fee collector

EDMONTON — In the plush enclaves of Canadian petropower, where jaded cynics utter short, bitter laughs at the antics of the Lougheed government and smile wanly at the existential absurdity of it all, there are few surprises.

Yet even the most callous eyebrows shot up this week when advanced education minister Bert Hohol named the administrator of the Progressively Conservative government's policy of charging wogs a king's ransom to study at Alberta universities.

For the man is none other than Jagjivan Ram, 68, fat, corrupt opportunist extraordinaire of Indian political life, popularly known as "the scum of Bihar."

Ram, who recently lost the power struggle to succeed Indira

Gandhi as India's Prime Minister, assumes his new post July 1.

# Night Watch crew raped

Three members of the University's Night Watch squad were sexually assaulted in four separate incidents last Thursday night by an unknown assailant.

"It was terrible! He threw me down on the blankets and put the picture of Golda over our heads. We couldn't run or get away without spilling the water in our buckets."

This recent assault prompted the formation of "Parents of Night Watch Night Watch" team headed by Ram Marr's mother. The new patrol will wear orange polka dot armbands and hopes to prevent further attacks on the virtue of the University Night Watch patrollers.

The Commerce faculty at the University of Alberta may be responsible for bringing in a new fad that is sweeping the country. The fad? Attache case curl-

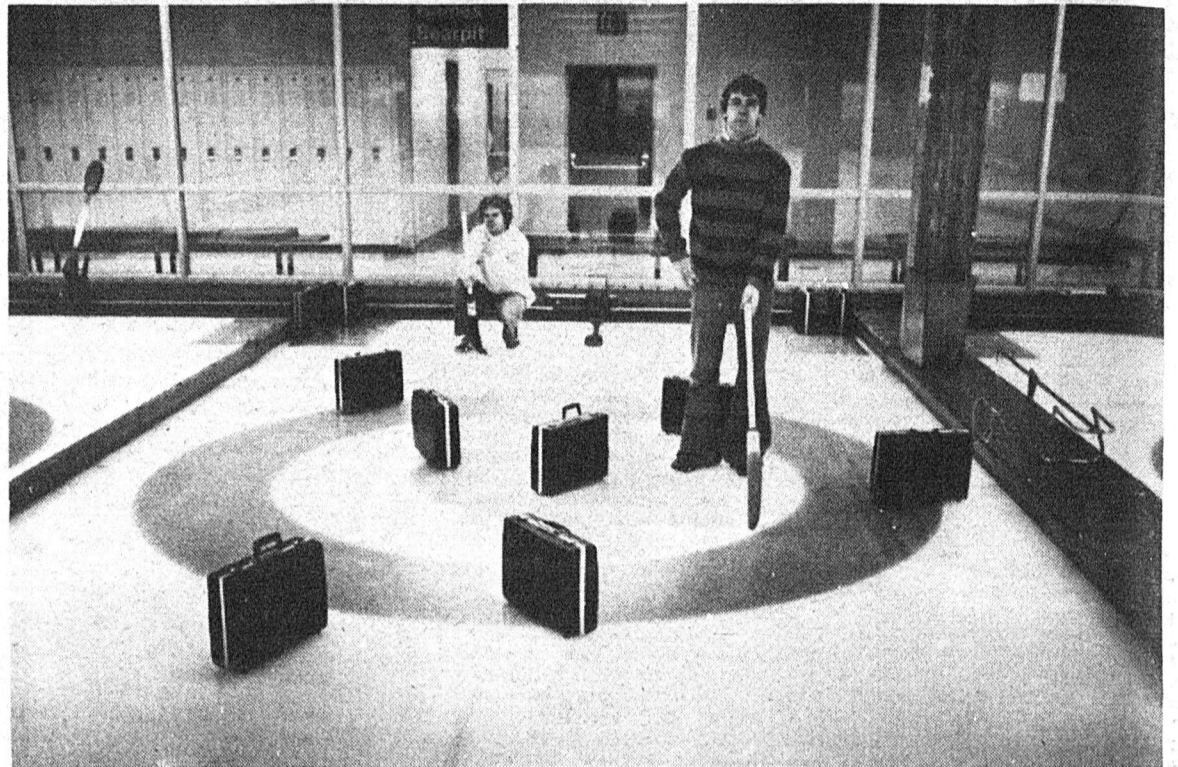
ing. The Commerce students had all the ingredients to start the sport which takes up where the traditional game of curling leaves off.

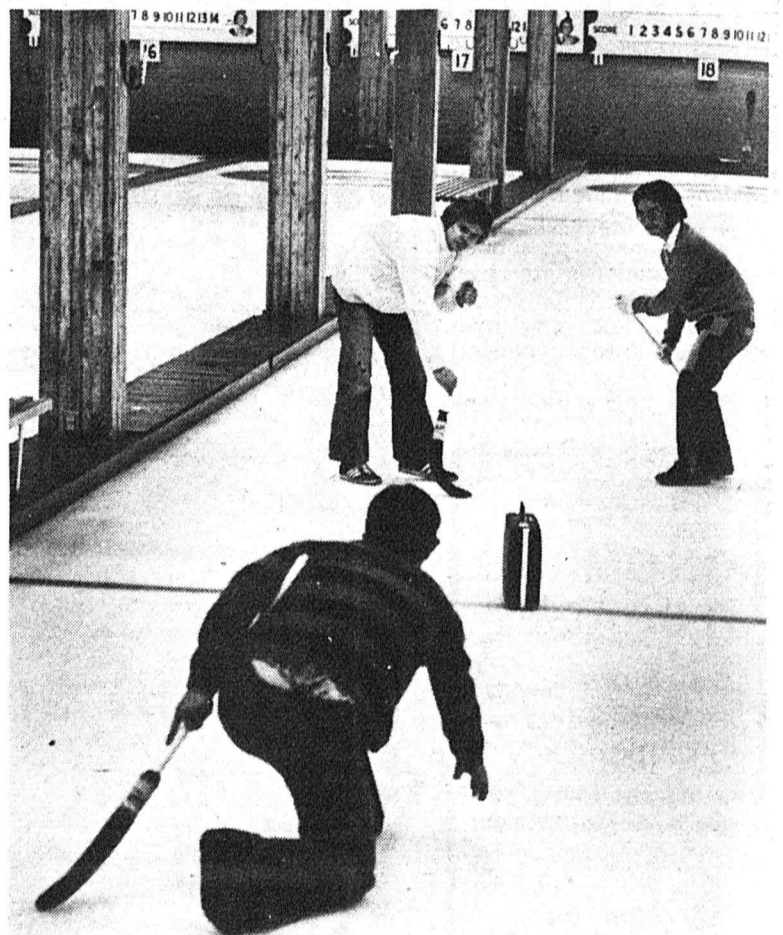
Skip Tom Burke makes sure his case is clean

Players in attache curling are allowed to "weight" their cases by putting in text books, the texts however, must be approved by the Commerce faculty.

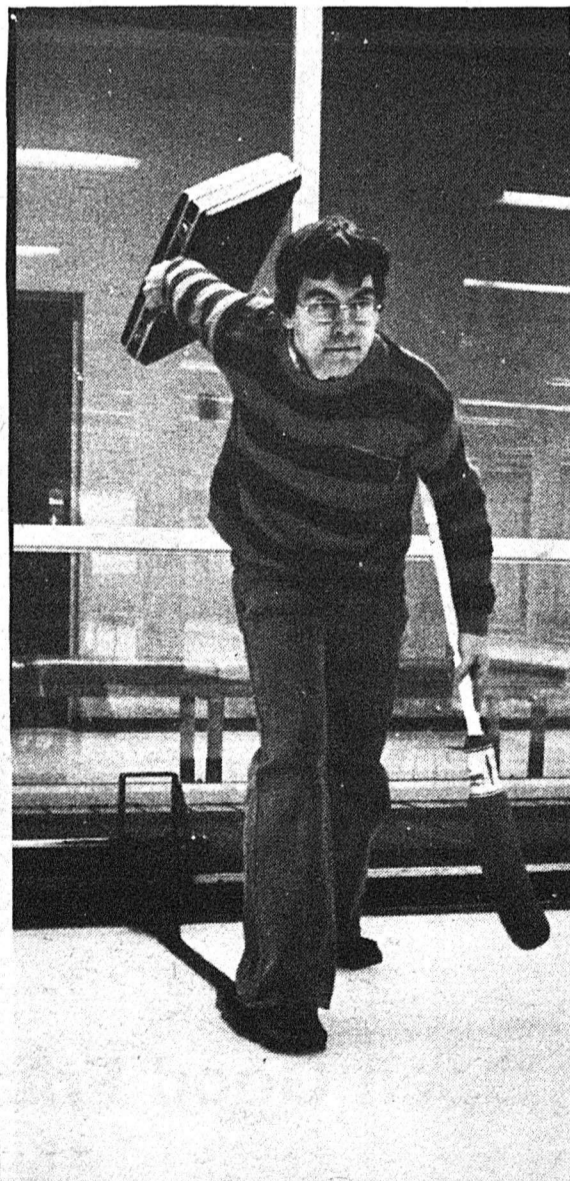

And on the third semester our marks rose again according to the professor. And ascending into the abstract, we sitteth by the right side of the limit.

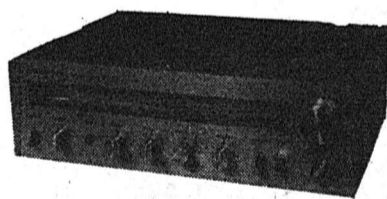
And he shall come again in glory to calculate the passes and the failures. And out of his domain, there shall be no end.

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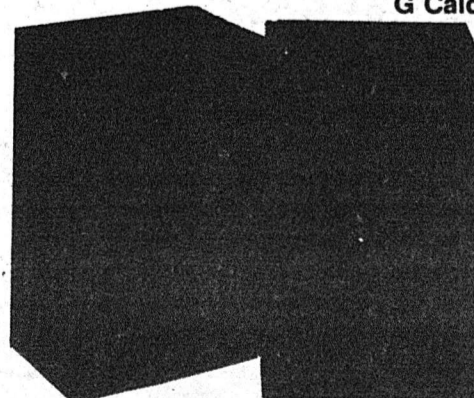
