Warsaw Beginning While Russian **Counter Attacks Continue**

ESPIONAGE IN CANADA

Italian Demonstrations Against Austria-German Short of Petroleum-Donaldson Steamer Struck Mine and Foundered.

Field-Marshal von Hindenberg's army, which i advancing on Warsaw over a wide front between the Vistula and the Palicia Rivers on Friday occupied Lowicz and reached the new Russian positions along the Bzura River and southward to Rawa on Saturday, with the result that another big battle is in progress. This is the beginning of the great battle for Warsaw, from which the Germans are now only thirty miles or less. The Russians are continuing their operations against East Prussia, and by counter-attacks re attempting to throw off the Austro-German attacks in Galicia.


