Wednesday June 6th, 1792.

THIRTEEN Members being met, agreeable to the Proclamation.

Houle met.

The Speaker took the Chair.

A Message was received from His Excellency the Lieutenant. Go- Message from His vernor, commanding the Attendance of the House immediately in the Council-Chamber.

The Speaker and the House attended accordingly,

And being returned,

The Speaker reported, that the House had attended upon His Excellency in the Council-Chamber, where He was pleased to make a Speech, of which the Speaker said, he had, to prevent Mistakes, obtained a Copy; which he read to the House, and is as followeth:

GENTLEMEN of the Council, and House of Assembly.

IS Majesty having been graciously pleased to appoint me His Excellency's Lieutenant-Governor of this Province, I have, in Confor-

" mity to His Majesty's Commission and Instructions, assumed the

" Administration of the Government committed to my Charge.

- " Among the first and most pleasing of my official Duties, I con-
- " fider the Honor now presented to me, of meeting you in General-
- " Assembly, and adding my best Assistance to your Legislative Deli-

" berations for the Prosperity of the Province.

- "The Situation of the Country-its Political Connection with
- " Great-Britain, and the many natural Advantages it possesses, ren-
- " der it in most Respects equal, and in none inferior to any other.

"I am perfuaded your own Knowledge and Experience will justify

- "my Opinion. It is therefore especially incumbent on us, to exert every Endeavor to bring these Advantages forward into general Utility.
- "To this end let me recommend to your Confideration the best "Means of improving the Agriculture, Commerce, Fisheries, and "Revenues of the Province. These must reciprocally aid each other; and to be availed of their Benefits, the Public Credit should be established, Morality and Literature promoted, Industry and Eco-
- " nomy encouraged, Trade and the Fisheries cherished.
- "Your Zeal and Wisdom, I doubt not, will meet my warmest Wishes in these great Objects, and that the requisite Supplies will be chearfully granted, as well for the current Services of the Year as for the necessary Support of the Public Credit. On my part, Gentlemen, you may be assured of the faithful Application of them, and of my best Care to carry into Effect the Result of Your Deli-
- " berations for the Public Welfare.
- "The noblest Motives combine to animate us:—The exemplary Loyalty of the Inhabitants of the Province, exerted on the most trying Occasions;—the Protection and Support so liberally afforded to us by the Parent State;—our Duty to the best of Sovereigns, who delights in the Happiness of his Subjects;—a steady Love for our Country, and an honest Zeal for its Honor, cannot fail, with the Blessing of Providence, to render our Cares permanently useful to the Province, and highly honorable to the Government.
- "The necessary Papers and Information will be laid before you, by the proper Officers.

Ordered, That Mr. Wallace, Mr. Putnam, Mr. Morris, Mr. Hill, and Major Millidge be a Committee to prepare an Address in Answer to His Excellency's Speech.

Resolved, That no Petition of a private Nature be received after Saturday the 16th Instant.

A Pericion of John Meany and James Meany, presented. A Petition of John Meany and James Meany, was presented by Mr. Pyke, and read, setting forth, that the Petitioners are Inhabitants of this Province, and have been dispossed of nearly the whole of their Property by the Seizure and Condemnation of a Vessel and Cargo under very hard and singular Circumstances at Sydney, in the Island of Cape-Breton, and praying the House will interfere in their Behalf, that they may procure a Restitution for the same.

Ordered, That the Petition do lie on the Table.

Then the House adjourned till To-morrow at Ten of the Clock.

- " before us, with all the Attention and Dispatch that Circumstances will admit of, and provide Ways and Means for such Supplies as
- " are requisite and essential to the Support of public Credit, as well as
- " for the current Service of the Year, having the fullest confidence,
- " that whatever may be granted by the People, will be faithfully and
- " economically applied.
- "And we beg leave to assure your Excellency of our earnest Desire
- to co-operate with you in every measure, that may contribute to
- " render your Administration of this Government, honourable to
- " yourself, and beneficial to the Province."
