## THE CURE OF RINGWORM

Disagreeable, Contagious Disease of Farm Animals.

The Symptoms Carefully Described -Treatment Carefully Applied Usually Successful—A Fly Spray -September Notes.

Ringworm is a contagious disease to which all classes of animals. Including man, are subject.

Calves and young cattle appear to be more susceptible to the trouble than other animals, but no age renders an animal immune. It is purely a skin disease, and is due to the presence of a vegetable parasite, which is readily capable of being conveyed from one animal to another by direct contact, the hands of the attendant, pails, stable u ensils, clothing, harness, saddles, blankets, the contact of one animal with the stalls, etc., of affected animals, etc.

In like manner, curry-combs, brushes, rubbing cloths, etc., that are used on affected animals, become a fertile cause of infection.

While any part of the animal may be the seat of the disease, the skin around the eyes and on the face, and on the neck and back, appears to be the favortice seat. The first symptom shown is usually an itchiness, which is followed by a slight form of eruption, which soon assumes the appearance of little yellowish scabs of a circular shape, the mass scales forming a circular space; hence the term "rinsworm." A variable number of these circular patches may be noticed on different parts of the body. They are of a yellowish color when fresh, but become lighter in color as they grow older; the hairs become bristly, some break off, and some become spilt. When the disease is not checked the affected areas become more numerous and the patient apparently suffers acutely from itchiness and another architecture. areas become more numerous and the patient apparently suffers acute-ly from itchiness, and sometimes rubs against solid objects with such force as to cause bleeding. Treatment.

In order that the spread of the disease may be checked, it is necessary that great care be taken to avoid the conveyance of the virus from the diseased to healthy animals. Where practicable, it is well to resmove all non-infected arimals to non-infected premises. If this cannot be done, the diseased animals should be isolated, and the premises in which they had been kept should be disinfected by thoroughly sweeping and dusting, and then giving a thorough coat of an inseclede, as a hot 10 per cent. of one of the coal tar antisepties or carbolic acid, or a coat of hot lime wash with 5 per cent. carbolic acid. This precaution is desirable on account of the virus longing in stalls, bedding, etc., and infecting other animals.

Local treatment consist in moistcring the scales with warm water and soap, or sweet oil, removing them in order to expose the unprotected surfaces of the affected areas. It is good practice to burn these scales. An insecticide, as incture of ordans white hellebore mixed with an ounce of vaseline, or, in fact, any reliable non-irritant insecticide, once or twice daily until cured.—J. H. Reed, V.S., O. A. College, Guelph.

In addition to the foregoing there are also some infectious agents (disease germs) which cause a very fatal form of scours or dysentery in foals. Symptoms.—When the foal is affected with scours, the symptoms may be first preceded by a constipated condition, which, however, is soon followed by the passage of liquid matter. The discharges at first appear soft and slimy and have often a peculiar, offensive odor. The tail and hips become soaked and covered with the discharges, which, in severe cases, become more frequent and tery watery. The foal then rapidly loses condition and becomes very weak, and the belly becomes tender. If not arrested, the condition may prove fatal in from two to ten days.

Treatment and Prevention.—As a means to prevention, the first consideration should be the avoidance of the various causes which have been mentioned. The foal should be

Head lettuce requires cool moist weather to head well. The loose leaf sorts are best for warm weather.

Prepare orchards for spraying for San Jose Scale and other pests by pruning and scraping off loose bark.

Be sure that all seed corn and root seeds are secured from the best sources available, and are in ample quantities for spring seeding.

## EFFECTS OF CROPPING

Sure to Exhaust the Best Soil in Time.

Plant Food Must Be Supplied— Mother Earth Has Her Limits— Seven Rules for Poultry Raisers -Breaking Up Broody Hens.

Lands that have been farmed for half a century usually show a de-crease in crop production. A few farms that have been well managed in the various sections of Ontario are still very productive. Some have been so depleted of the plant food materials that were accumulated during the period of forest development as to be unprofitable under tillage today. Previous to clearing, and cropping the process was accumulating fertility. Since cropping has been practiced the process has been reversed and supplanted by one of expenditure. Under a farming practice that exhausts the humus and returns no vegetable matter the soil hardens quickly, dries out and becomes non-productive, simply because there is neither food nor soil life to release such to growing plants.

Mineral Elements Become Exhausted.

Mineral Elements Become Exhausted.
Frequently one of the mineral elements—lime, potash or phosphorous—is exhausted by cropping or leaching. Nitrogen exhaustion is a very common condition noticeable in lands that have been cultivated for more than twenty-five years. After all, the soil is only a storehouse for those elements required in the life processes of the food plants that the farmer grows. In that storehouse various forms of life are at work converting the unusable to a usable or food condition for the plant. If we crop for years and exhaust the nitrogen or the potash or the phopological plant where any of such could not be supplied in quantity sufficient to meet the full demands of the growing plant then we have a condition of plant mal-nutrition or starvation.

If home-made lime-sulphur solu-tion is to be used, make it now and store till needed. Insects that eat the foliage must be kept in check by spraying, with a poison they will eat, like paris green or arsenate of lead.

BUYING A FARM.

Very Practical and Timely

Some Very Practical and Timely Hints to Would-be Purchasers of Farm Property.

The most important decision that a farmer is called on to make is the selection of a farm on which to live and earn a living. The judgment used in making the selection of a farm may make or break a man, may tie him up for life to poverty or to wealth. In districts where the soil is uniformly good over a large area and where prosperity is evident on all sides the task is not so great and risky. But in districts where various types and grades of soil exist a poor farm and a good farm may lie side by side. The good farm will no doubt help to sell the poor one, which, by the way, is always for sale. See Your Prospective Farm In July.

Farm purchases are most frequently made during the winter when the opportunity for close examination is least. This should not be so. If farms were purchased on the basis of the crop showing during the month of July there would be fewer regrets. If a man contemplates purchasing a farm in a district where he has lived for a long period, he will know the soil and district conditions. Knowing conditions the purchaser will hand over his money with his eyes wide open; if he does not know conditions the nonesty of some one eise. Purchasers of farms are advised to live and work in the district of their choice for at least a year before investing heavily.—L. Stevenson, Secretary Dep., of Agriculture, Toronto.
