A Worthy Public Official Resigned

Mr. W. P. Eaton, of the Railway mail service in compliance to his request has been placed upon the retired list being relieved from duty July 1st.
It is thirty-five years this autumn since Mr. Eaton, left Kentville, taking up duty on the Halifax and Annapolis line. He had previously been engaged for six years in the Kentville Post Office, which makes over forty years given to the responsible work of caring for the public correspondence. For many years he was the only representative of this county but at present we have Mr. K. E. Corbit of Lakeville and Mr. J. Park Cox, of Upper Dyke in the service.

Mr. Eaton has seen many changes in the personnel, as well as improvements and developments in this public service. He made one of twenty men when going in the service, today when fully manned the different roads in this Province require about seventy men. Of the original twenty only one, Mr. C. E. Power of Halifax remains on duty.
At the beginning of Mr. Eaton's service the run Halifax to Annapolis required one man and about one fourth of a car. Today there is in use a whole car, and at least four men each way, required to handle the volume of correspondence and papers in and out of this Annapolis valley.

Originally the service was handled by the post office inspector of each district, but in 1896 it was made a separate branch of the post office department with a Controller at Ottawa and Superintendent in each district. Mr. P. P. Bent is Superintendent at Halifax, and an office staff of six is required to care for the business of the service.

Mr. Eaton is in receipt of a letter from his Superintendent and from his brother clerks, highly complimentary to his work as a mail clerk.

We trust that Mr. Eaton, will enjoy many years of his retired life on his beautifully located home surroundings at Grand Pz.

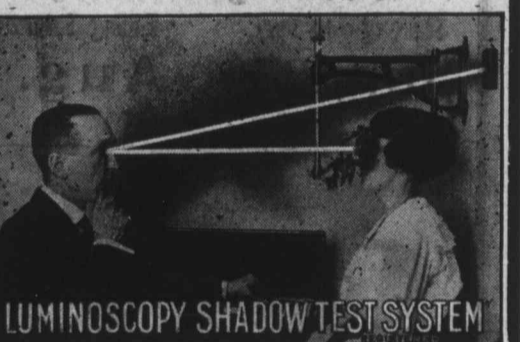

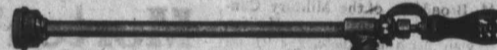

REGISTRATION IN KINGS COUNTY
County Registrar Mr. A. A. McNeil has completed his work of compiling the returns of registration for Kings County and forwarded his report to the government. In the County there were registered 6310 males and 7255 females, total of 13565. This leaves about ten thousand persons belonging to the county who have not registered, among that number are of boys overseas and in training in this county who were not called upon to register, all children under 16 years of age and all who were invalids who could not get out and did not get a deputy to register them at their home.
It will thus be seen that Kings County has complied with the law thoroughly in regards to registration. Very few entered any objection to the measure and we think but few have failed in their duty to comply with the act.

The information the government now has will be used only in conserving and properly distributing the male and female power we now possess to the best advantage of all and the proper carrying on of work at home and abroad in assisting in winning the war.

According to the most recent order of the Canada Food Board all licensed dealers in selling for private consumption up to July 15th, shall sell one pound of substitutes with every nine pounds of standard wheat flour. On and after the 15th, this regulation changes to one of substitute to every two pounds of standard wheat flour.
On and after July 1st, all householders baking for private consumption as well as bakers, etc., must use in making bakery products one pound of substitute to every nine pounds of wheat flour. After the 15th, it is one pound of substitute to every four of wheat.

The Windsor Tribune says:—Two young invalid soldiers, Pres. McGrath and Armstrong came to Windsor July 1st, from the Sanatorium "on leave." They had liquor with them and put up at Armstrong's mother's house on Gerrish Street where they have been boarding. One of these youthful soldiers informed the Tribune that he had lost over \$60.00. He complained to the police. A warrant was issued and the house searched, but nothing was found and the soldier is penniless. The Chief offered to buy him a ticket to take him back to Kentville, but he and his chum are still in Windsor. The question naturally arises how it is that an invalid soldier may remain so long away from the San. Surely there is some person responsible for those who are there as patients. Leave of absence is all very well, but unlimited visitations to another town where they are liable to become stranded is neither good for their health or morals.

Where Are Our Old Records.

In the United States there are many hundreds of organizations formed to collect and preserve the country's old records from which only township, county and state histories and genealogical records can be written. Some of these institutions are very wealthy and employ a large staff of clerks. England and other European countries possess official bodies to carry on this work. Joe Howe used to say that the degree of civilization any community had reached could be measured by the attention paid to preserving its records.

The descendants in a hundred years to come may want to shake up their forebears to ask them why they allowed the records of the early settlement of Nova Scotia to be burnt up, scattered or destroyed. Probably nine tenths of the documents that cast a light on our township and county history, in the history of our educational, religious or industrial progress have disappeared.

Parliament has created the Archives department to collect and preserve all existing documents, books or records bearing on old time events and make them available to students and writers of history. A branch office has been established at Halifax under the direction of Mr. W. C. Milner. All persons possessing old files or copies of local newspapers, or session or municipal books of record, old letters or other documents of a public character cannot do better than communicate with Mr. W. C. Milner Archives Department, Halifax.

The Admiralty Court of England has awarded Larder Brothers, of Halifax, \$86.48 as remuneration for salvage services for saving steamer Archeene, ashore in June 1916, at Miquelon. She was towed off and taken into St. Pierre. The action was taken for all three steamers engaged—Bridgewater, Capt. Larder; Sable I., Capt. Murley, and Portia, Cape. Kean.

An interesting story has recently been published about an Australian soldier, Thomas Skeyhill, who was blinded by a shell explosion at Gallipoli, and whose sight has been restored by a simple operation at Washington, D. C. Skeyhill has been delivering addresses throughout the States in behalf of the third Liberty loan. A physical examination a few days ago revealed a slight dislocation of one of the vertebrae at the head of his spinal column. An adjustment was made, with the result that his sight was immediately restored. It was explained by physicians that the displaced vertebra had impaired certain nerve functions indispensable to sight.

Distinguished Service Order

This Decoration is one of the most distinguished and coveted honours awarded by the King for conspicuous military service. It is scantily bestowed and given only to officers and is as highly prized by a General as by an Officer of a much lower rank.

Kings County has two men whose military achievements in the world's war have been of a character to merit this honour. We name them in their order in point of time of bestowal and give the recommendation by the Commander in Chief on which they were conferred.

Major Barry Wentworth Roscoe received the Order in 1917. The following is the official report of the valorous services performed by him which gained him the distinction.

"On New Year's day 1917 Major Roscoe was decorated by the King with the Distinguished Service Order, the following being the recommendation:—"At Maple Copse, June 2nd., 1916 for the brave and efficient manner in which he led his men through enemy barrage fire to Maple Copse and arriving there, for the splendid leadership displayed by him in the position of his men at the east end of the Copse, which position he maintained till wounded and from which position overwhelming numbers of the enemy were unable to dislodge his men, although extremely heavy casualties were suffered."

Lieut. Col. Allison Hart Borden was decorated by the King with the Order on the first day of January A. D. 1918. The following is the official statement of the brave and resourceful operation which was followed by the honour he has had bestowed on him.

"Lieut. Col. Allison Hart Borden by personal reconnaissance in the face of great danger from machine gun and rifle fire, obtained sufficient information to deal with an unexpected situation caused by the enemy's counter-attack and with complete disregard of his own safety made a tour of the line. His example to the battalion was magnificent."

While differing in character each service appears to have had such conspicuous merit in it as to mark these young men for the high distinction conferred.

It is Time to Spray Potatoes

By G. E. SANDERS
Dominion Entomological Laboratory Annapolis Royal N. C.

The U. S. Government report is out which shows that the State of Maine has only 112,000 acres of potatoes this year, a falling off of 36,000 acres from last year. The decrease in the New Brunswick acreage is about the same. There is not a state in all New England that has more potatoes planted than last year.

If there is a full bumper crop there will probably be enough potatoes to go around. If we have as much blight as last year it is hard to say how short the

crop will be or how high the price will be, but it seems probable that with average blight conditions, the crop will be short and the price high.

The tests in the Annapolis Royal School plot last year showed that the unsprayed plot gave 75 bushels per acre, while the plot that was sprayed gave at the rate of 221 bushels per acre. At St. Annes College at Church Point, the plot sprayed under the direction of Father LeChantoux gave 300 bushels per acre while the unsprayed portion of the field yielded at the rate of 150 bushels per acre. Tests at various experimental stations over a period of years show an average increase of from not less than 90 and running to nearly 100 bushels per acre, due to spraying.

Bordeaux made according to the 4-4-40 formula to which any of the common poisons may be added with safety, is the standard potato spray. Bordeaux may be applied in any way so long as every portion of the plant is wet. The best method of application is of course the traction sprayer and the next probably the power sprayer and the spray gun. A hand or barrel sprayer or even a knapsack sprayer will do good work if one takes enough time or if one has no other means of applying spray a common garden watering can or bucket and whisk broom may be used. The idea is to wet every portion of the plant thoroughly by one mean or another. Apply the first spray if possible before July 20th and repeat every two weeks until frost.

In one field last season the sprayed plants remained green for 40 days longer than the unsprayed. The increased yield in that case was slightly over 200 bushels per acre. Every day a field is kept green it grows and stores about 5 bushels of potato tubers per acre. Three days growth will pay for all of the material and labour for spraying five times. No one can afford to neglect spraying their potatoes this year.
