

In the seventeenth century a number of Chinese immigrants brought into Formosa seed rice, which they cultivated in the Chinese way, producing larger quantities and better grain than was produced by the Formosans, who had cultivated rice from early times and had produced therefrom a distilled spirit of drinking. The Formosans adopted the Chinese manner of cultivation.

When the yerba mate, or native tea of Paraguay, is cultivated the seeds are treated to an acid bath before planting. This softens the hard shell which surrounds the kernel of the seeds and enables them to sprout in three or four months.
