## Inquest on Death of Charlottetown Man.

### Roused from Sleep and Was Ill-treated By Three Young Men—His Wife Found Him Dead. Lying on Kitchen Floor with Head Bruised.

Charlottetown, Sept. 24.—An inquest is being held by Dr. Dougherty the coroner, into the death of Geo. Holmes, a well-known blacksmith of Victoria, aged 46.

## Abbie Wood Beats Fred Cameron.

### Amherst Crack Loses by Ten Yards—Montreal Champion Won in Sensational Sprint—Time for Ten Miles Was 55.42—Another Match Soon

Amherst, N. S., Sept. 24.—Amherst is in mourning tonight; its peerless winner, Fred S. Cameron, went down to defeat in his first professional race against Abbie Wood, of Montreal.

The race was witnessed by fully 5,000 people, and was uneventful throughout. Wood had the pole but before the lap was finished Cameron took the lead and the first two miles and a half was reeled off in quick order.

Wood then forged to front and Cameron allowed him to set the pace until five miles were reached. Wood took his time the five miles being run in 27.18.

Both men finished fresh and were in condition to go another ten miles. Another race between the two rivals will take place on the Ramblers' ground within a fortnight and a third race has been arranged to be held in Montreal in the near future.

Miss Ida Kerr, who has been in Montreal, returned to her home on account of ill health.


Mrs. James Powell has returned from Port Daniel, where she has been visiting friends.

## DEATH OF C. N. SKINNER

### Represented St. John in Dominion Parliament From 1887 to 1892

Called to the bar in 1860, he early entered politics and was elected a member of the New Brunswick parliament before Confederation.

### KIT CARSON.

Feat of Which the Hardy Frontiersmen Had No Recollection.

One of the most noted of the hardy western frontiersmen was Kit Carson, to whom, with Daniel Boone, belongs the credit of having always dealt fairly with the various Indian tribes, as they themselves acknowledged. The withdrawal of Carson by the government was the cause of a great war. Captain Henry Inman in his book, "The Old Santa Fe Trail," relates an amusing incident of the gallant pioneer.

My own conception of Kit Carson as a child was that he was ten feet high, that it would have required the strength of two men to lift his rifle, that he usually drank a river dry and sicked the carcass of a whole buffalo clean as easily as a lady does the wing of a quail. Years after, when I made the acquaintance of the foremost frontiersman, I found him a delicate, thin, under-sized, wiry man, the very opposite type of what my childish brain had created.

One day while Kit was at the fort I came across a periodical that had a full page illustration of a scene in a forest. In the foreground stood a gigantic figure dressed in the traditional buckskin.

On one arm rested an immense rifle. His other arm was around the waist of the conventional female of such sensational journals, while in front half a dozen Indians lay prone, evidently slain by the hero in the impossible attire in defense of the preposterous female. The legend stated how all this had been effected by Kit Carson.

I handed it to Kit. He wiped his spectacles, studied the picture intently for a few seconds and then said: "Gentlemen, that may be true, but I ain't got no recollection of it."

### A JOURNALISTIC HOAX.

Trick the Harvard Lampoon Played on the Crimson.

Speaking of the Crimson, Harvard's daily newspaper, reminds every Harvard man of the Lampoon's master stroke—or joke—played on that dignified and unsuspecting sheet on Memorial day, 1901. The Crimson had announced that it would not appear on that holiday, but, inconspicuously, so few were surprised to find the Crimson at their door that morning as usual. Their surprise began, however, when they scanned its contents. This always serious sheet seemed to have become most frivolous and irresponsible during the night, for in its columns all sorts of wild and fantastic statements appeared.

The news, though clothed in the usual heavy, dignified Crimson style, was wildly revolutionary in character. Among the items that appeared were: "Plot to Blow Up Memorial Hall," "Strong Men to Get the Varsity H," "Wellesley Crew to Be Guests of the University" and most important of all a notice, "Lampoon Celebration at 7 Tonight." Then the joke came out. The Lampoon had published the famous "The Crimson" joke, the joke was known throughout the country, and that night Lampy's sanctum was the scene of bacchanalian revelry. When the following year the Crimson editors sat up all night with injunctions against a repetition of the fake the joke was again on them, for Lampy differs from history in that he never repeats himself.—K. B. Townsend in Bohemian.

## CHEAPER FUEL FOR CANADIANS

### Government Experiments With Treating Peat Bogs a Success.

Ottawa, Sept. 19—Several hundred tons of pressed peat, prepared at Albert, near Ottawa, by the Canadian department of mines, are to be sold in Ottawa at the rate of \$3.25 a ton, delivered.  
This is being done as a demonstration of the commercial success of the government experiments in preparing peat for fuel. The department claims that at this rate peat is equal to the best anthracite coal at \$6.00 a ton. They claim to be able to sell the peat fuel at the works for \$2.25 a ton, and make a profit.  
It is expected that within a short time private enterprise will be putting peat fuel on the market wherever bogs are found in the vicinity of population centres.  
The Ottawa monument to Champlain is to be erected on Nepean Point on the spot where it is believed the famous explorer stood several hundred years ago to take the observation he made at Chaudiere Falls. The place, which is the highest point on the Ottawa river in this vicinity, is now a part of the Ottawa drive way. The monument, which was designed by Hamilton McCarthy, represents the explorer taking an observation. The site was chosen today by Benjamin Salte, the French historian.

Town Council met on Thursday evening last, full board present. Mayor McMurdo was elected delegate to next meeting of the Union of N. B. Municipalities, which will be held in Woodstock, October 19 and 20.

Following miscellaneous bills were ordered paid:

The bills of Messrs. Desmond and Bethune were certified by Chairman of Board of Health.

Several Aldermen thought that there bills should have been paid by Board of Health out of Health Appropriation, but it was shown that all the money voted by Council for Board of Health purposes was exhausted.

Ald. Clark, Morrison and Russell thought that Mr. Bannon's bill should have been paid by the County, and Ald. Butler, on looking at the Statutes, found that their contention was true. Nevertheless, the Council ordered bill paid, as they feared that the County would delay payment as long as possible if bill was presented to them.

Your Committee has gone over the returns carefully and, on enquiry at office of Town Clerk, finds amounts paid as stated in returns. Your Committee finds returns correct and recommend that they be passed—Thos. Russell—Chairman."

Report was adopted.  
 Bill of Stothart Mercantile Company of \$5.00 for being first at Campbellton home fire, was ordered paid.

Ald. Layton was excused and left the Council chamber.

The report of Police Committee of 1910, and the Police Magistrate's reports for 1908 and 1909, was taken up. The report was as follows:

"To the Hon. the Mayor and the Town Council:  
 Your Committee and appointment to office committee beg leave to submit the following report to you:

**POLICE MAGISTRATE'S REPORTS FOR 1908 AND 1909.**

"We in conjunction with our Solicitor, Mr. Butler, have made a careful audit of same. We find that the maximum fees allowed by law are about \$1.20. Mr. Maltby has been charging \$3.00. This amount was agreed upon in Mr. Davidson's time as Police Magistrate. Mr. Maltby followed in the same line when he came to office.

"There were two items in the 1909 report not correct, but the Magistrate has credited these two errors in carrying out the amounts. Your committee would recommend:

1. That the case of Miller vs Hill be left with Mr. Miller and the Magistrate to settle, as Mr. Miller has expressed his willingness to pay the costs as far as he is concerned in the matter.

2. That in the case of Jones and Vye the Magistrate look to these parties for his costs or refund them to the town.

3. That in the case of the six boys who came before the Magistrate on Nov. 29th, 1909, he be asked to refund the town the sum of \$9.00.

4. That it is the opinion of your Committee that the fees as laid down by law are too small for a Town Magistrate to be governed by generally. We would therefore recommend that in cases where it was absolutely necessary or prudent to let the costs and fine stand the Magistrate's fees shall not exceed what is specified by law; but in cases where costs are paid by offenders, he be allowed \$3.00.

5. We would also recommend that the Magistrate be requested to collect costs at least from all offenders when it is possible to do so.

We may add here that Mr. Maltby was before your Committee and he has agreed to all the suggestions and recommendations of their report. We found him quite willing to meet the Town in all fairness.

We would therefore recommend:

6. That his reports for 1908 and 1909 be received and adopted.

7. Your Committee are of the opinion that it would be more satisfactory to all concerned to pay the Magistrate a salary and have all costs and fines go to the Town. (Signed) L. B. McMurdo, Chairman.

After the report was re-read, as above, it was taken up section by section.

### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-empt six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent and cultivate fifty acres extra).

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.







The business will be continued under its present name, with practically no changes. The Shives Lumber Co. purchased the entire Gunter holdings, which were very large. No plans for the future have been given out, but business is being carried on at Richardsville as heretofore.

SAYS LENEVE WAS JEALOUS OF BELLE ELMORE

London, Sept. 19--Something of what Ethel Clare LeNeve suffered as halfmad with jealousy, she impatiently awaited the fulfillment of Dr. Hawley H. Crippen's promise to make her his wife, was revealed at today's session of the inquest into the death of Belle Elmore with the murder of whom the doctor and his typist are jointly charged.

In her distress, Miss LeNeve confided in her landlady, Mrs. Jackson, and the story that the latter told on the witness stand rivalled the most sensational evidence introduced at the murder trial.

Mrs. Jackson said that the accused girl gave up the room which she had occupied at the home of the witness on March 15, explaining that she was leaving to be married to Dr. Crippen.

Until the first week in February Miss LeNeve had slept regularly at Mrs. Jackson's. After that she stopped at the house only occasionally. She said that she spent the other nights at the home of friends. On one occasion LeNeve mentioned having been at the Hill Drop Crescent home of the Crippen's early in February, to help the doctor in a search for a bank book which showed an account of \$1,000. She added that a diamond tiara and rings had been found in the house and that the doctor had raised \$820 on these.

About the middle of February the witness said Miss LeNeve appeared miserable and depressed. Such was her state that Mrs. Jackson followed

Threatened to Kill Two Men on C. P. R. Sleeper and Later Killed Himself.

Toronto, Sept. 18--Having threatened the lives of two men in the C. P. R. sleeper from Ottawa to Toronto Friday night, Alfred Robertson, inspector on the Winnipeg police force, and formerly the big drum major of the 48th Highlanders, fired two shots into his own brain in the ladies' lavatory of the car "Cascade" after he had arisen Saturday morning.

The cause given is reaction after a night's dissipation. The conductor of the train took Robertson's revolver away, but when he quieted down gave it back again.

She is his wife and when I see them go away together it makes me realize my position as to what she is and what I am."


Mrs. Jackson asked: "What is the use of you worrying about another woman's husband?" To this Miss LeNeve answered: "Miss Elmore has been threatening to go away with another man. Dr. Crippen has been waiting for her to do so when he would divorce her." Solicitor Newton who is looking out for the interests of Dr. Crippen and Miss LeNeve, closely cross-examined the witness suggested that her lodger's having resurrected a trouble which the girl experienced during her earlier association with Dr. Crippen but the witness maintained the correctness of her evidence as given.

London, Sept. 19--Evidence in the Crippen inquest consisted mostly of a repetition of the evidence of previous hearings, neither of the defendant were present. Nothing specially interesting occurred until a juror asked how it was that during the inquiry Crippen was not stopped going away. The coroner would not allow the question. Dew was somewhat agitated and expressed a wish to answer, and the coroner again refused, but Dew said there was no evidence of any crime. Inspector Dew gave evidence regarding the identity of the brooch and Miss LeNeve's landlady identified clothing given her by Miss LeNeve, who told her it was cast-off clothing of Mrs. Crippen's.
