

Fire-Retarding Paints. From tests made at the federal bu reau of standards it appears that, while practically all paint coatings have some fire-retarding action, none of those so far tested afford very great protection. All the samples in question were materially damaged by application of flame for a few seconds. Both sodium silicate and whitewash rank sodium silicate and whitewash rank comparatively high. These have the advantage of cheapness and can both be used on the same surface. However, according to a recent builefin of the bureau, no treatment of wood after effection can be expected to serve as an effective fire protection, and the use of such materials should not be made an excuse for emitting any of the usual

Canada at the National Chemical Exposition, Chicago.

Chicago.

The importance and magnitude of our Chemical Industries form a sensational chapter in the Industrial history of Canada, that has become known the world over. It is no wonder, therefore, that Canada occupied such an important position at the National Chemical Exposition recently held at Chicago, admitted to be the greatest industrial event in the history of that city.

In addition to the large attendance from Chicago, over twenty thousand members of various scientific societies, Universities, manufacturing concerns and others interested in commercial and scientific development, attended the exposition. These included, The American Institute, Mining and Metallurgical Engineers, American Electro-Chemical Society, Technical Association of Pulp and Paper Industry and others.

Germany Built 710 U-Boats During War

Berlin, Nov. 11-(By the Accociate ed) —Vice-Admiral Eduard von Capelle, former minister of the navy, was bombarded with questions today as to why more submarines were not built so as to have made the submarine campaign successful.

Hecklars at the national assembly sub-committee's investigation into the war, have failed to get much information as to why the submarine campaign was not avoided, changed their tactics to questioning the former minister of the navy on submarine Construction. The admiral tried to prove why submarine construction was retarded in 1916, and why it jumped enormously in 1917 and 1918.

A summary of his contribution to U-boat construction was read by von Capelle at the start of the session. "Eight hundred and ten sub

marines were built be fore and during the war." said the former minister of the navy. "Of these forty-five were constructed before the war, 186 were built during the administration of Admiral von Tirpitz and 579 were built by me in the two and a haif years I was in office.

"I took office in April 1916, and in the nine months remaining in that year I ordered built ninety U-boats; in 1917 I ordered 269 and in the nine nonths I was in office in 1918, I ordered 220."

It was here his questioning began. Why was there such a discrepancy between 1916 and the two following years?" demanded Herr Gothein.

Von Capelle replied sharply: "There are a number of reason why so small a number were order ed in 1916. First, the Reichstag took an overwhelming stand against the submarines and I could not start to build, because I saw myself in opposition to the government. Second. I had been out of the naval service and was unaware of the technical improvements in U-boat building and


