





"Yesterday I missed a chance to make an important and timely protest," said Peler McArthur, the sage of Ekfrid, in the course of an article sent to the Toronto "Globe under date of October 17th. Government inspector dropped inexpectedly and caught me right in the act of packing No., 1 and no time to get things in shape for I didn't know he was a. inspector until after I had been introduced to him and had shaken hands with him. Still it didn't matter for he examined my pack carefully and passed it as being up to standard, or a little above it. My

I had been worrying a little, as I had not packed apples for the market for some time. until after he had gone that I remembered the attitude of Big Busi ness toward Government inspec-'You cannot make men honest by law.' 'We must not have interference with private business." If that sort of talk applies to Big Business, why not to little business? Why should the Government come nosing into my apple barrels, if it must not be allowed to ook into the operations of banks? Surely it is as necessary to look after the safety of the bank deposits of the plain people as to see that they are not sold under-sized apples that are wormy or off color. Inspection is every bit as justifiable ank disclosures show that they sometimes pack rotten securities in heir vaults. Why should that us allowed any more than packing rotten apples in barrels? Even handed justice demands that banking be inspected just as carefully as apple-packing."

THE REAL SITUATION REGARDING CHURCH UNION

To All Presbyterians:

Do not be deceived by misleading statements to the effect that Church Union is settled-for it is not finally and rightly settled and cannot be, until settled by the people who constitute the Church.

The general assembly is not the Presbyterian Church. It is a court of the church, constituted for the continuance and maintenance of the Church only.

The Church has been refused the right to consider the question, or to vote upon the proposed legislation. The last vote was taken in 1915 and showed an increase of 23,000 against Union and an increase of only 600 for Union. The bills have never been submitted to the people for their judgment. Union leaders are afraid to submit the whole question to the people today. These bills are coercive and unjust. They ignore the votes of 73,735 members of the Church and the votes of hundreds of congregations recorded against Union. They violate the pledges given by the General Assembly in 1905 regarding the necessity of practical unanimity and in 1916 regarding the rights of those opposed.

These bills must be opposed in the interest of justice and liberty. Do not be lulled into inaction by statements that the consummation of Union will make no change in your comgregation.

DO YOU KNOW?

that under Church Union congregations are deprived of the right of calling their ministers as under the Presbyterian system. The right of appointment rests with the Settlement Committee, which has full power in the matter. This is one of a number of important changes which would be put into effect under present plans for Church Union. Do you want to retain the right to call your Minister?

More Opposition To Church Union

Winnipeg, Nov. 13-Opposition to church union was expressed in a formal dissent presented to the Manitoba Presbyterian Synod today by R.G. Stewart and John McKay, presidents of the Winnipeg and Port Arthur branches of the Presbyterian Church Association .An opportunity will be given later for a debate on the question, it was said by the moderator.


