**WHAT EXCHANGES SAY**

**FEW MARRIED PAUPEERS.**

Notwithstanding the jokes on the married man, he is nearly 100 per cent proof against the kind of adversity that casts the individual on the rocks of disaster and makes him a human derelict.

This is the statement of Brigadier George Reid, in charge of the Salvation Army's home. According to Reid a report just compiled by him shows that less than 1 per cent of the men seeking shelter and refuge in the industrial home are married. Reid accounts for this by the fact the married men through the responsibilities carried by them develop a resourcefulness that the single man fails in.

"I have talked to hundreds of men coming to the home and find the cases pretty much the same," said Reid. "Something stifles the man's ambition in life, or else nothing has entered his life to develop his spark of ambition strong enough to make it withstand adversity."

"The few married men that drift in here are men whose homes have been broken up. They are comparatively easy cases to restore, however. The single man is our hardest problem, and even he is capable of redemption if we can find a sustaining interest to engage his attention."

**FINANCING HYDRO-ELECTRIC**

Guelph Mercury.—Sir Adam Beck, after an interview with members of the Ontario Government to confer with them on Auditor Clarkson's report, has publicly expressed his belief that the Hydro-electric Commission will continue to receive the Government's steady support in its policy of developing electric energy and acquiring falling-water franchises for that purpose. This should set at rest all unwarranted and unauthorized reports about the government putting on Hydro-electric production in the near or remote future. There will be open and frank discussion about details as each individual project comes up for approval, but it may, and should be taken for granted, that whenever the Hydro-electric Commission has a proposal to announce it has first been submitted to the government. The general public is not a body of experts, and neither is the Hydro-electric Commission, but the Commission has its staff of officials and the public will trust the Government.

**POLICEWOMEN GET MOVIE PEST, WHO IS PUT IN JUG**

BUFFALO, April 14.—In the conviction of August Wehlan, 38 years old, of No. 220 North Division street by Lillian Morrison and Lillian F. Hartnett, policewomen, the police believe they are rid of a degenerate, who for some weeks has been annoying women and children in movies. He was sent to the penitentiary for six months by Judge Woltz yesterday.

Acting on a number of complaints Mrs. Morrison and Miss Hartnett visited the Happy Hour on Main street near Genesee street, about 4.30 o'clock on Monday afternoon. Mrs. Morrison sat next to Wehlan. She repulsed his attentions, but, when he became shocking in his conduct, she told him to get his hat and coat and come along. The wretch thought he had made a hit. When he reached the street he was placed under arrest.

Wehlan said he came to this country from Germany in 1914. He admitted that he had done some of the things alleged by Mrs. Morrison. Wehlan tried to excuse his actions

by alleging that he was encouraged, but Mrs. Morrison absolutely denied that, saying she tried to avoid the man.

**1,000 IRIS COLLEENS REACH AMERICA: MORE ARE EXPECTED TO FOLLOW**

NEW YORK, April 14.—More than 1,000 iris today opened what is expected to be a great influx of immigration from Ireland. The girls, most of whom arrived on the steamship Altic, went to the homes of friends or relatives in this city, and the Rev. Anthony Grogan of the omc for Irish Immigrant girls said their arrival would help relieve the shortage of domestic servants.

Only seven girls were detained for failure to meet immigration requirements, including the filtered test, which debarred aliens at Ellis Island were averaging from 3 to 5 per cent of arrivals. Immigration authorities said that many Irish girls were anxious to come to the United States, but that hitherto it had been difficult for them to obtain passports.

**IRISH LABOR TO PROTEST AGAINST JAIL TREATMENT**

DUBLIN, April 13.—The officials of the Irish trade union congress and the labor party today issued a call to the workers of Ireland for a general strike throughout the country to-

morrow as a protest against the treatment of political prisoners. The officials in their call demand the release of those imprisoned for political offenses.

The general strike call does not affect those employed on newspapers, the telegraph services, the bakers, the humanitarian service and the necessary services among the horses and cattle.

**JAPANESE CAPTURE USSURI RAILROAD**

HONOLULU, April 13.—The Japanese have captured the entire Ussuri Railroad between Vladivostok and Khabarovsk, according to a cable despatch received from Tokio by The Shimpo. The Ussuri Railroad from Vladivostok to Khabarovsk is about 400 miles in length. It runs directly north and south, and passes through the important towns of Nikolsk and Ussuri.

**Penalty**  
Every person required to file a return who fails to do so within the time specified is subject to a penalty of the amount of the tax. Any person, whether an individual or a corporation, who fails to make a return duly required by the Act, shall be liable to a penalty of five per cent of the amount of the tax which the defaulting person is liable to pay. Any information required by the Act, on summary or otherwise, not exceeding \$10,000, or more or to both fine and imprisonment.

Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS and RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

### Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provides information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

### General Instructions.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Make your returns promptly and avoid penalties.

### UNIONS OUT TO BEAT THE SWITCHMEN'S STRIKE

NEW YORK, April 13.—Union Labor's co-operation in an effort to break the unauthorized strike of railroad workers here was pledged last night by representatives of the four big railroad brotherhoods in conference with representatives of the Eastern roads. A statement given out after the meeting characterized the strike as a "mob movement" and asserts it was "bound to break."

John C. Walker, Labor expert and Secretary of the Bureau of Information on Eastern Railroads, who made the announcement, said it was the consensus of opinion of the brotherhood

leaders that the strike would burn itself out." He said the conference "received information that the strike was easing up around Chicago, Indianapolis, Columbus and other Western cities, but remained unchanged locally."

"The surprising part about the strike is the fact that the men who are regarded as conservative have become impregnated with radicalism," Mr. Walker said. "The strike is one fostered purely by radical influence."

### Is First Official Conference

It was announced that the brotherhood leaders had "tried their best" to have the men ignore the radical agitators who invaded New York from New Jersey yesterday. Previously the brotherhood leaders had mingled with strikers and loyal union men in New Jersey, urging them to respect their contracts.

The conference last night was the first officially held here between the Labor leaders and Railroad representatives. Timothy Shea, Vice-President of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen; Thomas R. Dodge representing the brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen; L. C. Griffing, representative of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, and S. C. Cowan, representing the Order of Railway Conductors, attended the conference.

### Run Millionaire Special

It was learned at the Lackawanna offices that a "Millionaire Special" was run from Hoboken to Morristown, N. J. late today. The train was manned, with the exception of the engineer and conductor, by five wealthy residents of Morristown.

Strikers on the New York Central and New Haven roads have agreed to supply crews for milk trains. In making this decision public the strikers declared they were "not fighting the babies, the ill and the poor."

CHICAGO, April 13.—While the unauthorized strike of railroad employees, which started in Chicago two weeks ago with the walkout of seven hundred switchmen on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad, today appeared to be gradually waning in the Middle West and the Far East; the situation in the territory east of Cleveland took on a more serious aspect.

The centre of development in the walkout of insurgents had definitely shifted to the east where additions to the ranks of the rebel railroad workers had caused a serious stoppage of freight and passenger traffic and the closing of several industries

### A WARNING TO LONDON



### BULLET PIERCES HEART; LIVES FOR SOME HOURS

**BUFFALO, April 13h**With a bullet wound in his chest and making no effort to attract assistance, Chester Germain, thirty-two years old former physical instructor at the Terrace playground, laid on the floor of his home in the lower flat at the rear of No. 750 Elk street, for four hours yesterday afternoon before he was discovered. The man, who is dying at the Emergency Hospital last night told Captain of detectives Zimmerman that he had shot himself with a revolver in an effort to end his life at 11 o'clock yesterday morning.

Germain told the police that until January 1st last he was employed as playground instructor, but that a nervous break-down forced him to take leave of absence. He said that his mother died during January and that he had no desire to live since then. He was living with his brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Germain.

The dying man told the police that he shot himself shortly after Mrs. Germain left the house. The bullet pierced a lower muscle of the heart and lodged underneath the shoulder blade. Germain laid on the floor until 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon when his sister-in-law returned home.

Unable to gain entrance to the house, Mrs. Germain asked Joseph Burns, a boy who lives upstairs, to climb in a window and open the door. When she entered the house, she found her brother-in-law lying on the floor, his clothes saturated with blood. Mrs. Germain summoned Dr. Fred H. Boyle, who hurried to the house. Dr. Boyle said that the case was remarkable, because the wounded man was able to walk from the house to the street where the doctor's auto was waiting. The man was taken to Mercy Hospital, where he walked into the operating room.

Dr. Boyle and Dr. R. Edward, M. Dooley probed for the bullet last night and found it underneath the left shoulder blade. Germain recovered from the anesthetic and was able to talk to the surgeons and police.

### THE MYSTERY SOLDIER TURNS OUT TO BE FAKE

**TORONTO, April 11h**—Toronto's "mystery soldier" will be deported to England by the immigration authorities as soon as all details can be arranged. Although "Frank Hall" as he called himself, has not recovered his memory, the prison officials backed up by Bertillon measurements and photographs, have never suffered from the same lapse. "Hall" was positively identified yesterday afternoon by Inspector of Immigration James C. Mitchell, Toronto, as Clyde Densham, an ex-convict, who was deported to England in June 1915, after serving ten months of a 24-month sentence in the Provincial prison. This sentence was imposed at St. Thomas on August 20, 1914, following this conviction for theft. His people live in Exeter, Eng.

### "That's Not Me"

"That's not me," exclaimed "Hall" when shown several photos taken at various times and at different prisons. The first recorded came from the Indiana State Prison at Jeffersonville, dated December 2, 1908. Petty larceny was the ground of conviction in this case. Then comes one from Brantford, six months this time, also for theft. The date was February 5, 1912. Following was a sentence of nine months for theft imposed at Hamilton in February, 1913. The last was the St. Thomas conviction. Oddly enough, "Hall" claimed to have "enlisted" with the C. E. F. on August 20, 1914. On that date he was given 24 months for theft in a St. Thomas court.

At Jeffersonville, Indiana, the "mystery soldier" is said to have given Clyde Densham as his name. This changed to Craman DeEnon at Hamilton, back again to Densham for the Brantford conviction, and then to Royce DeEnon at St. Thomas. On Saturday night a soldier told the hospital authorities that the man's real name was Densham, that he knew him in England, and that, so far as he knew, he had seen no service with the Canadians. After long questioning yesterday by Col. Major Shields, Inspector Mitchell and other officers, "Hall" persisted in denying the identity proven by the photos.

### Placed on Scales

A scale and measuring machine was brought in. Looking to be on the verge of a nervous collapse "Hall" was placed on the scale. His height was recorded as 5 feet 3 inches. Prison measurements, taken minus the boots, gave 5 feet 1 3/4 inches. The weight taken yesterday showed 111. However, vaccination marks, a scar on the head, and one on his face all corresponded.

### Booker Backs Up On Birth Control

**DECLARES THAT HE WAS NOT**  
**SPEAKING SERIOUSLY—REV.**  
**FATHER MALONEY CALLS**  
**LEGALIZED MURDER**

HAMILTON, April 13.—Attending  
the closing entertainment for re-  
turned soldiers at their friends at  
the Knights of Columbus hotel last  
night, Mayor Booker took advantage  
of the occasion to express his latest  
views on birth control and incident-





## Growth Shows Desire To Extend Army Work

Commissioner W. J. Richards, chief of the Salvation Army in Eastern Canada, has completed his fifth year in that capacity. During that time the Army has seen one of its greatest periods of usefulness. This period takes in the "war years." The great war had been under way since August and new problems presented themselves to the organization when he assumed command. These problems required a large measure of initiative to overcome. The task of rendering the highest and most efficient service was shouldered and Canada paid tribute to the success which attended those efforts by over subscribing the amount asked for during the Red Shield Drive.

Commissioner Richards is a forceful man. He is a man of few words. He believes in doing things. During the five years, more than 11,000 persons are recorded as having sought salvation. Notwithstanding the losses due to war, there are today nearly 2,000 more names on the Membership Roll than there were in this territory five years ago.

In July, 1915, Canada East was separated from Canada West, the dividing line being Port Arthur. Ever in view of this, there are now only forty one fewer officers in active service in the Eastern territory alone than there were in the combined territories five years ago.

In the Field Report two very striking indications of financial growth are given. In 1914, the Self-Denial total for the combined territories was \$43,726. In 1919, for Canada East alone, it was \$75,591. Harvest Festival returns have been doubled.





### St. Lawrence Waterway Man Is Appointed

OTTAWA, April 14—Hon. J. D. Reid, Minister of Railways and Canals, has announced that Mr. W. A. Bowden, B.A.Sc., M.E.I.C. chief engineer of the department, has been selected by the Government of Canada to act as Canadian consulting engineer in the reference to the International Joint Commission of the question of the further improvement of the St. Lawrence River between Montreal and Lake Ontario.

The Government of the United States is also a party to this reference, and each Government undertook to appoint from its official engineering personnel an engineer to confer with a similar officer of the other Government in the acquiring of engineering data, the making of necessary surveys, and the completion of outline plans and estimates of the cost of the proposed improvement. In conformity with this arrangement, the United States Government has appointed Lieut. Col. Wootton, a member of its permanent Government Service to the corresponding position in the United States side.

The reference to the Commission is in the form of a series of questions, the chief of which is:

What further improvement in the St. Lawrence River between Montreal and Lake Ontario is necessary to make the same navigable for deep-draught vessels of either lake or ocean-going type; what draught of water recommended, and what the estimated cost?

In answering this question, the commission is requested to consider:

(a)—Navigation interests alone, whether by the construction of locks and dams in the river; by side canals with the necessary locks, or by a combination of the two.

(b)—The combination of navigation and power interests to obtain the greatest beneficial use of the waters of the river.

The possible effect on the St. Lawrence ship canal below Montreal is to be studied as well as its conditions, also what improvement may be expected of the resources, commerce and industry of each country, as well as of traffic.

The commission intends to conduct public hearings in both countries to bring out information bearing on the physical, commercial and economic aspect of the project. An itinerary is under consideration, and hearings will probably commence about May 1.

Engineering plans and estimates are to be submitted to the commission as soon as practicable, but not later than one year from date of appointment of the engineers, and the commission is requested to forward to the two Governments its final report not later than three months thereafter.

No delay is anticipated from the Canadian standpoint. As a matter of fact, it is understood that Mr. Bowden already has tentative plans well advanced.
