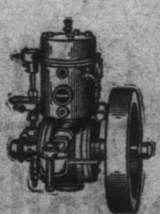

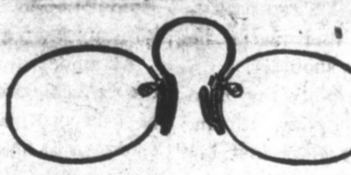

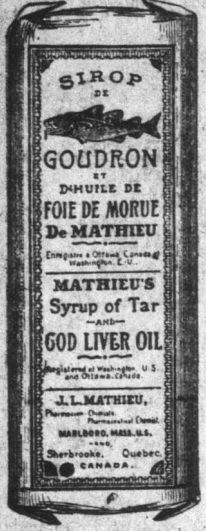

## The Evening Chit-Chat

By MUTH CAMERON



"And yet, I imagine there is a great deal more unhappiness in these beautiful homes than in those simple little houses we just passed, or even in the city tenements for that matter."

I've heard the spirit of that remark in various forms many, many times, and I always disagree, vocally when possible, and mentally when not.

For I think this idea, which many people not troubled by the "burden of wealth" like to comfort themselves with—that riches and happiness are incompatible, is decidedly wrong. Riches and unhappiness aren't inseparable, by any means.

But that doesn't mean they are incompatible. Beautiful walls don't necessarily look down on smiling faces.

Maybe you are wondering what's just as likely to shelter happiness as humbler homes, and I think, very much more likely to, than wretchedly poor ones, for I don't believe happiness gets along with continual hunger as well as it does with occasional surfeit.

## The Picnic Party

Appoints Three Government Inspectors, but Has no Money to Repair the Old Black Punt.

Editor Evening Telegram:

Dear Mr. Editor—Some time ago I wrote a letter to your esteemed paper under the nom de plume of "A Disgusted Tory," in which I complained about the great betrayal of this town at the last election, when Mr. Frank Morris told us that on the word of Sir Edward we could "rest assured" that as soon as the "People's Party" would be returned to power a bridge would be constructed over Placentia Gut. I voted and fought for Sir Edward because I thought he was in dead earnest, now we find we have to be satisfied with a broken-down gasolene boat. Under the Liberal regime we had a splendid boat service, and while I was in favor of the bridge I always recognized that the Liberals gave us a good ferry service. We had two men running the boats; they were always well looked after, were painted and looked nice and trim; these two boats running such a short distance gave us a speedy run, but we were promised the bridge, and on the word of Sir Edward, now we have no bridge, no gasolene ferry, and we are back again on the "old black punt" (which by the way was always painted white and green). But the punts in Jackman's day were well kept, now they have been lying up on the beach and nothing done to them since the election. They are to-day a positive danger and a menace to the lives of the people who have to use them. The principal Tories who shouted for the bridge are now satisfied with leaky boats; they have got good pickings for Government jobs. Do the people of Newfoundland know that although the Government cannot repair these leaky punts that three Government inspectors have been appointed from the town of Placentia since May last.

The first is Mr. Jeremiah Deane, "the illage shoemaker." He has been appointed Inspector of the Deep Sea Fisheries; jurisdiction from Placentia to Channel Head. Salary maybe of 800 a year and picnic expenses.

The second is Mr. Patrick Croke, the village cabman. He has been appointed Inspector of the Inland Fisheries at a salary of maybe \$650 a year and picnic expenses.

The third is Mr. James Croke, "the illage blacksmith." He has been appointed Inspector of Iron Work on the Ionavista Railway. Salary of maybe 750 and picnic expenses.

And last, but by no means least, Mr. Devereaux, Potato Seed Distributor and Lecturer on Agriculture, salary of \$1,800 perhaps and picnic expenses.

And now, Mr. Editor, "the lives of the people are risked in leaky punts while the Tories are getting 'picnics and soft jobs."

We don't hear anything from the Chronicle and News now about the old black punts, but if they are not soon repaired they will have to "chronicle" the drowning of some of our people.

We appeal to Sir Edward to fix up these boats until the bridge that he promised is completed.

## What's Wrong With the World?

Every succeeding day seems to give greater pungency to Chester-ton's query, which was commented on recently in an article in the Evening Telegram from the gifted pen of Roderic Random.

In Portugal the tension exceeded the power of political cohesion and Revolution has raised its head. In Spain the tension is so great that great anxiety prevails as to the outcome and the police are watching apprehensively the gathering of anarchists in Barcelona who meet to celebrate the Anniversary of the Execution of Ferrers, and to effect a revolution if they can.

France is in the grip of a railway strike which may extend and tie up the traffic of France.

Germany is disturbed by strikes and lock-outs of miners and ship-builders and is threatened with a strike of half a million metal workers.

England has been passing through a similar phase in regard to mining and railroading. There is a lock-out now on affecting hundreds of thousands of cotton operatives.

In India a spirit of unrest has caused meanness for a long time, and is still watched with much anxiety.

Happily for Newfoundland the failure of the Labrador fishery and the meanness about the Italian and Portuguese markets for dry fish have not been aggravated by acute disputes between merchant and fishermen, or between employer and employees.

For the latter we have to thank the good sense of all and particularly the level-headed way in which collective bargaining has been conducted. Collective bargaining is the spirit of Unionism and in Newfoundland has been a preventive of strikes and lock-outs and a preservative of good feeling between masters and men.

## Safe Blown Up

**AND \$1,000 STOLEN.**

News was received in town to-day of a desperate deed committed at Grand Falls, which marks the beginning of a new species of crime in this country. We often have read of such crimes in the United States and Canada, but it is the first time that ever the American burglar's special "stunt"—safe blowing to get money—has been tried in Newfoundland. Last night when the peoples of the Pulp Town were quietly sleeping in their beds an explosion at the A. N. D. Co's. general stores was heard that woke all the people residing in the neighborhood. The men who arrived on the scene first discovered that the safe in the office of the supply store had been "dynamited" and the building considerably wrecked. The cashier says that the whole day's cash receipts were in the safe; \$1,000 were taken. There are no further particulars yet to hand, but the gentleman who received the news informs us that no arrest has been yet made but may be very shortly, as there is a well grounded suspicion.

## Man Dies Suddenly.

Supt. Grimes to-day had the following telegram from Sergt. John Ryan of Trinity: "Henry Humby, aged 60 of Indian Arm, who was working on the Bonavista branch line of railway, died at his camp at Gott's Cove at 8 o'clock last night." He was employed, we learn by Mr. Cobb, as a carpenter, and has been working there all the fall. It is believed that excitement over having received a timber and river grant yesterday brought on an attack of heart trouble, to which he succumbed. He had gone to the construction train and received the grant in the mails brought along. The body is to be taken home to-night for burial.

## Is This a Wreck?

Mr. H. W. LeMessurier, Assistant Collector of Customs, had a telegram last night from the Sub-Collector saying:—

"Lot deals and scuttling picked up since Friday; reported marked Empire, apparently not long in water."

The schr. Empire, owned by Mr. G. M. Barr of this port, is now at his wharf. There is a schooner called the British Empire owned by people of Fortune Bay and she loaded recently at Sydney for this section of the coast. It may be that this schooner had a deck load of scuttling and deals on board and that some of it in the recent stormy weather had been washed overboard. If the British Empire is not yet arrived from Sydney, the finding of this material will cause uneasiness about her.

## Railway News.

W. D. Reid, Esq., returned from Trinity in the s.s. Fife this morning and gave the Telegram the following information about the progress of the work: The line is graded to the 63rd mile, ready for the rails, and the advance graders are on the 79th mile. The rails are laid to the 53rd mile, in company with Sir Thomas Esmond. Mr. Reid walked out from Trinity over the line to Salmon Cove and inspected the work. Sir Thomas was very much interested in all he saw and enjoyed the experience thoroughly. There are about 3,000 men now on the work and everything is going O.K. Catalina will be reached early in November.

# Municipal Matters.

## The Gossip At The Tank.

Dear Sir.—Those who have been patient enough to follow my argument concerning the quality of our water supply will hardly have failed to notice that from the very start I have been particular to contend only for the general purity of the water at its source in the pond, and that I have never asserted that the water is invariably, or even generally, pure when it reaches the consumer. I have for a long time believed that the water consumed by families resident in congested and dirty localities where the only supply comes from the street hydrant is very likely to be contaminated. A conversation which I have lately had with Dr. Tait has more than confirmed all the apprehensions I had on this subject. He has pointed out to me the existence of certain conditions attending our system of distributing water in these poorer districts of the town which, unless they are speedily and effectually remedied, will expose us to all the dangers of endemic disease. Our death rate is abnormal now; we allow scores and hundreds of lives to be sacrificed because we will not keep the town decently clean, but I fear that we must henceforth add another to the list of our deadly enemies, namely, the street hydrant neighbourhoods. Nothing can be more obvious than the futility of preserving the waters of Windsor Lake in crystal purity if we persist in contaminating those waters as they are distributed to the consumers. But, as the obvious is not always noticed or heeded, I shall endeavour to illustrate the position I take by considering an analogous case and drawing a moral from it. When certain diseases break out amongst us, almost the first enquiry the medical men of the city make relates to the supply of milk which reaches the houses infected, and it very generally happens that the outbreak of disease can be directly traced to some insanitary conditions existing on or near the farms where the cows whose milk is suspected are kept. It very seldom happens, I imagine, that the milk is contaminated when it leaves the udder of the cow. The contamination occurs when the milk is set to cool in some infected well, or when it is distributed in cans which have been washed in infected water, or even when the cans used have been allowed to accumulate dirt and breed their

own colonies of bacteria. But it matters very little to the unhappy patient that the milk he drank came from a wholesome cow; that it was at any stage in its history allowed to become infected is the sufficient reason why he suffers. Now this seems to me to be precisely the condition of affairs which exists in relation to our water supply. The water while it remains in the pond is, except under such special and abnormal conditions as I described in my last letter, perfectly pure and wholesome; but that is very small consolation to the unhappy sufferer who imbibed disease which was introduced into that water as it flowed from the tank whence he drew it. And this is just what happens in a multitude of cases occurring in this town of ours. Sometimes, no doubt, the water gains infection by reason of carelessness in the process of straining at the reservoir, and in this particular I hope the salutary warning of Dr. Meakins will be taken to heart by the Council. But the more usual occurrence of water-borne disease in the town is undoubtedly attributable to contamination of our drinking supply in the street, whither the people go with their buckets. If this source of contamination is not checked, we may not unreasonably expect that, given an unwholesome season, our present horrible death rate will increase by a process of multiplication rather than of addition. All the precautions in the world to preserve the purity of the water in Windsor Lake must fail if you still continue to contaminate the tanks whence the poor of the town draw their whole supply of fluid for drinking, cooking and cleansing purposes. Let me then describe, as well as I can, this process of contamination as it has been described to me by Dr. Tait. To begin with, all, or nearly all, these tanks are placed in a situation most dangerous to the public health, namely over an opening of a sewer. This sewer-mouth is covered with a grating of iron, and it is upon this grating that the worst filth of a dirty neighbourhood is usually cast. It is bad enough that the water as it flows from the tap should absorb the foul germs which are bred in the sewer and are continually being circulated around its mouth, but when you add to these the germs which are bred of the festering corruption of garbage lying on the grating and on the adjacent ground, you may imagine how liable to infection the water must be which is procured from such a locality. But there is still another danger which has not been yet taken into account. When the decent housewife goes to the tank for her necessary supply of water it is only to be expected that she will, if the opportunity occurs, spend a few minutes in cheerful gossip with any friend who happens to be there on the same errand. These few minutes are pregnant with danger to the good woman and her whole household. While the conversation proceeds, the bucket stands on the foul grating exposed to the assaults of the active and deadly germ which pour forth unceasingly from the sewer mouth. But if the bucket stood on a naked grating it would not be so bad. The fact usually is, however, that the grating is polluted with the foulest offal of the neighbourhood, and some of this offensive, putrid, and dangerous mat-

ter must, in the ordinary course of things, adhere to the bottom of the bucket and thus be transported, with all its vigorous colonies of fatal germs, into a wretched, ill-ventilated, and perhaps not too clean home. Here the closely related germs from the sewer and the offal of the grating find a congenial sphere of activity and the next thing we hear is that diphtheria, scarlet fever, or some other loathly disease has broken out in the family. The attendant miseries to the whole family I need not attempt to describe, any more than I need enlarge upon the difficulties of coping with putrid disease in a household where cleanliness, pure air, proper ventilation and ordinary sanitary appliances are denied by the circumstances under which the unhappy inmates necessarily live. And the ghastly feature of this case, where disease, poverty, enforced abstinence from work and from association with one's kind, and perhaps death itself are involved, is that all this trouble and sorrow was innocently brought into the family by the wife and mother who was seeking only for that supply of water upon which she confided for the comfort, refreshment and cleanliness of her home. Once more I have to insist that this is not a fanciful or inaccurate description of things as they exist too commonly amongst us. I appeal in support of what I have said not only to the facts as they are plain to be seen in any filthy quarter of the town where water is not, and cannot be, laid on in the houses; I rely not even solely upon the representations of Dr. Tait who drew this condition of affairs to my attention. I appeal to the testimony of Professor Starkey, the expert man of science, to whom samples of our street tap water were sent for analysis. He invariably found that the number of colonies of bacteria cultivated from samples taken from the street tap was largely in excess of those cultivated from samples of the water in the pond. But, at a time when he found the bacteria present in the pond water largely diminished in number from what they had previously been, and when Professor Winslow found no bacteria at all, the bacilli cultivated from the water taken from a certain hydrant in the town existed in colonies too numerous to count. I think I can identify the hydrant from which this sample of water was taken, and I shall have something more to say about it in a future letter.

What I have already said presents a very dismal picture of the state of our water supply within the town, it will be conceded, but I have not yet come to the most deplorable and dangerous feature of the case. That must wait until my next communication.

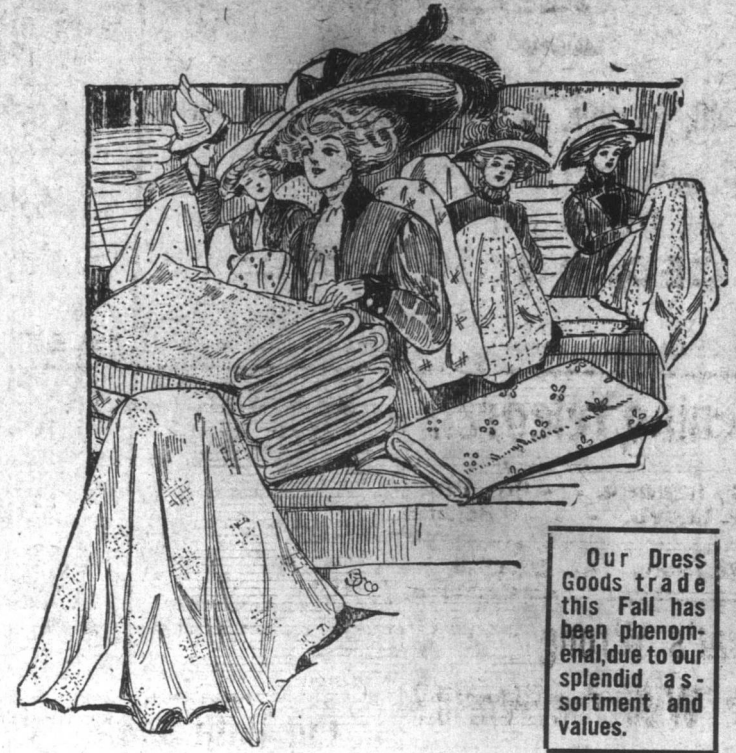

## Death of May Emberly.

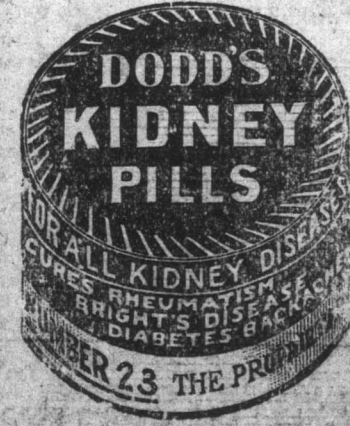
The announcement of the death of May Emberly was received by a large circle of friends and acquaintances in Placentia Bay, with the most profound sorrow.

The deceased was a student who entertained the most exalted views of life. No one knew at the commencement exercises held at the close of the scholastic year when she, little May, was conspicuous for her talents, her health and her joyful spirits that she was marked for a short stay in this world. She had taken final leave of her classmates, and the happy anticipation of meeting dear parents and enjoying the comforts of the holidays at home was at length realized.

Prior to the 10th of August she contracted a heavy cold, which later settled on her bronchial tubes. All that science and human ingenuity could do in her interest was done for her. Priest and doctor, nurse and attendants bent their energies and employed all manner of means to restore her to health, but Providence decreed otherwise. When the clock struck out the hour of nine on Saturday morning, September 12th, she blessed herself gracefully as was her custom whenever she could call of the hour. Fifteen minutes later,

in full possession of all her faculties, she lifted up her little eyes to heaven and surrendered her pure soul into the hands of her Creator. This was the fate of a dear girl whose future career foretold promises of magnificent possibilities. Born in Bruley, Placentia Bay, on February 10th, 1895, she was fifteen years old and the only child of William and Anastasia Emberly. May was the light and ornament of the Christian home. Her devout mother consecrated her daughter to a useful life and was careful to inculcate into her from a tender age the most ardent sentiments of piety and to inure her to assiduous practices of virtue, humility and obedience. During her attendance at school she won for herself the esteem and admiration of all. To know her was to love her. Her teacher, Miss Abbott, and her classmates loved her dearly; she never allowed her application at school to tend to distraction or to idle curiosity. This was quite manifest at the recent examinations conducted by the Council of Higher Education at Barron Island. Six pupils of this school passed successfully. Our little friend, May Emberly, was one of the six who passed in every subject she entered upon. She scored this triumph by her diligent preparation and close application to study. May had many consolations on her death-bed. Her devoted Priest called to see her many times. Her father and mother, for she had no brothers or sisters to wipe the cold sweat from her brow, were constantly at her bedside. Good neighbours, too, came

in to keep the night watch before she died. She was filled with the most sublime and heavenly thoughts in the last days of her illness and gave utterance to them in sweet songs and "dying chirps." She wore a cream color habit, and white low cut shoes. Attached to her neck a small silver cross, a gift of the Priest who attended her. She looked like an angel laid out in her casket. Her funeral was held from her residence in Bruley, thence the body was conveyed to the Church of the Sacred Heart of Jesus where a High Mass of Requiem was offered up for the repose of her soul. The Celebrant was the Rev. Francis A. Cacciola, of St. Mary's Church, Barron Island, he was assisted by his altar boys—fifteen in number. The singing during the exercises was very impressive. The hymn she loved so much and which she sang before she breathed her last—"Jesus Saviour of my soul"—was sung before the remains were taken from the church. A touching eulogy on the life and labors of the deceased was preached before the Absolution was given. The interment was in Holy Cross Cemetery, Bruley. The pall-bearers were: Masters Denis Shea, Albert Wadman, Gerald Mackay, John Whiffen, Willie Whiffen, Little David Shea and Peter Furrer, Jr. Theresa Shea and Miss Cullerton, assisted by other school-mates, carried flowers in the procession. Classmates acted as guards of honour during the exercises of Mass and in the procession.—Com.

DID NOT ABDICATE.

Special Evening Telegram. LISBON, Oct. 11.—Before leaving Portugal King Manuel sent the following autograph letter to the Portuguese Premier: "I am compelled, owing to stress of circumstances, to embark, but I wish to inform the people of Portugal that my conscience is clear. I have always acted as a faithful Portuguese. I have always done my duty. I shall remain at heart a true Portuguese, and shall hope that my country will do me the justice to try to understand my feelings. My departure must in no way be taken as an act of abdication."

MANUEL'S FUTURE HOME.

Special to Evening Telegram. MADRID, Oct. 11.—The Spanish Government has received confirmation of the report that Manuel will shortly proceed to England, where he will take up his permanent residence.

RELIGIOUS ORDERS EXPELLED.

Special to Evening Telegram. LISBON, Oct. 11.—Advices mailed from Lisbon to Spain, and then received at the Vatican to-day, confirmed the Press despatches that had told of the expulsion of the Jesuits and other religious orders from the Portuguese capital. Nothing direct from Monsignor Tomaz, the Papal Nuncio at Lisbon, has been received owing to the prohibition put upon cipher messages by the Provisional Government. The belief had been entertained at the Vatican that the new Government of Portugal would be considerate of the religious orders in view of the patriotic work they had accomplished in Portugal and its colonies.

ROYALIST FAMILIES EMIGRATE.

Special Evening Telegram. CORUNNA, Spain, Oct. 11.—Many fleeing Portuguese families arrived here yesterday. The greater number are royalists, who say that they preferred emigration to accepting a Republic.

ANARCHISTS GATHERING.

Special to Evening Telegram. BARCELONA, Spain, Oct. 11.—The police declare that the main fear at the Ferrer anniversary is an anarchist plot. An extraordinary large number of suspicious foreigners have arrived here lately, and are provided with some sort of papers, making their expedition difficult. It is estimated that the anarchists now under police supervision in this city number 19,000. Most of them are foreigners.

WANT MANUEL TO ABDICATE FORMALLY.

Special to Evening Telegram. LISBON, Oct. 11.—Neither the Foreign Office, the Duke of Orleans nor Marquis de Sadeff is yet aware that King Manuel and the Queen Mother Amelia are coming to reside in England. The Duke of Orleans, interviewed by a representative of the Daily Chronicle, said that the last information he had was a telegram from Queen Amelia yesterday afternoon, stating that neither the King nor herself had made any definite plans, but were awaiting events. He said that they were both in good health. To which the Duke replied that he placed himself completely at their service. The Queen asked him to remain at Wood Norton until something was decided upon. According to a Lisbon despatch to the Morning Post, overtures will be made to King Manuel with a view to inducing him to sign a renunciation of the Crown. The Times Madrid correspondent said the Republican party there contemplates organizing a public demonstration of sympathy for the Portuguese Republic. It is deemed, however, that it will not be permitted. Dr. Esquerdo, a well known Republican deputy, regards the success in Portugal as a great encouragement to Spanish Republicans, but admits that it cannot affect the present situation otherwise.

RUSSIAN MINERS RIOT.

Special to the Evening Telegram. REMSEHEID, Bhenish Russia, Oct. 11.—Miners who made a demonstration to-day against the new black flag, issued by the employees' agencies, attacked the police with stones, when the officers attempted to disperse them. The police charged the crowd repeatedly, used their sabres freely, volleys of stones from the windows of houses fell upon the officers who fired into the windows. Many persons were wounded, but the number of casualties is not known.

S. A. TOWN BOMBARDED.

Special to Evening Telegram. RIO JANEIRO, Oct. 11.—The Governor of the State of Amazon Colona, Ribarrio Bittencourt has been removed. Serious disturbances followed the Governor's removal, and the Federal flotilla bombarded the town of Minacok, which is the Capital of the State. President Peñalva has ordered the immediate resignation of Governor Bittencourt.

THE ENTOMBED MINERS.

Special to Evening Telegram. STARKVILLE, Colorado, Oct. 11.—A telephone message to-day from the Starkville Mine, where fifty or more men are entombed, stated that the rescue party had found eight dead bodies. The party is now working in room 31, clearing the after-damp, searching for bodies. Entry 47 has rooms numbering up to 38. It was in rooms belonging to this entry that the picked men were working on the night of the explosion.

Dogs Destroy Sheep.

When D. WILL ELECT PRESIDENT.

Special to Evening Telegram. LISBON, Oct. 11.—The Lisbon Telegram in a despatch dealing with the Sunday following the revolution, says that when the elections are held and a President chosen, Dr. Brito Comacho will become Minister of War, and Dr. Senoz, Minister of Marine. These two were primarily instrumental in engineering the revolution. The red flag will then be discarded and the old Portuguese flag, but without the crown, adopted as the emblem of the Republic. The Marquis de Sadeff, the Portuguese Minister at London, will be recalled. A late despatch from Lisbon says it is reported that the War Minister has ordered the entrenched military camp, which was to have been raised to-day, to be retained intact with all the artillery in readiness to repel any Royalist attack. It is said that the Government will confiscate the King's property, but will respect Queen Amelia's fortune, which was inherited from her father.

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FRENCH RAILWAY STRIKE.

Special Evening Telegram. PARIS, Oct. 11.—The Northern Railroad is seriously affected this morning by a strike of employees at several points. The strike threatens to become general. Many of the men who have ceased work and are holding Union meetings. It is said that those still employed await the word to go out when the complete system will be tied up.

GUARDING MANUEL.

(Daily News Message.) LISBON, Oct. 11.—A despatch from Gibraltar states that a number of Portuguese, of suspicious appearance, who have arrived direct from Lisbon, have been arrested at Gibraltar. Since the arrest, special precautions have been taken to guard King Manuel.

PETER WHITE KILLED.

(Daily News Message.) PORTLAND, Maine, Oct. 11.—Peter White, a native of St. John's, Newfoundland, has been killed in a railroad accident. He will be buried at Halifax.

New Solicitor Enrolled.

Mr. Winter, the son of Sir James Winter, K.C., with whom he was articled, was enrolled as a Solicitor of the Supreme Court to-day. The Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Emerson were on the Bench and the petition was presented by Mr. Greene, K.C. The Court assented and Mr. Winter was sworn in and signed the roll. He received the congratulations and good wishes of the Judges. The Evening Telegram joins in good wishes for the professional success of Mr. Winter.

Seventieth Birthday.

We congratulate His Lordship the Bishop of Newfoundland on attaining his seventieth birthday yesterday. Dr. Jones was consecrated as Bishop of Newfoundland on May 24th, 1878, by the Archbishop of Canterbury. He arrived in St. John's on the R.M.S. Caspian on June 5 of that year, and was enthroned on June 9th, so that he has spent over 32 years as Bishop of the Diocese. At the first ordination, held on Trinity Sunday, Canon Duffield, Rev. Mr. Jeffrey and the late Rev. Mr. Waghorne were advanced to the priesthood, and Messrs. Baker, Payne and Smith took Deacon's orders.

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS.—The Knights of Columbus to the number of 100 attended 7.30 o'clock Mass at the Cathedral this morning and received Holy Communion. It was a most edifying sight.

## The Portia Arrives.

The s.s. Portia, Capt. T. Fitzpatrick, arrived from the westward at 7 p.m. yesterday. After leaving here on the 30th September she had fine weather during the following Saturday and Sunday, but Monday had a heavy N.E. gale, the same as experienced here. She arrived at Bonne Bay Wednesday last after being delayed at Bay of Islands 6 hours, owing to landing 12 tons of cable there. Thursday morning she started for home and called at Bay of Islands, Bay St. George and at the Gravels this trip, as there was a large freight to land there for Codroy, entraining several hours' delay. After turning Cape Ray she met a S. E. wind and dense fog, which lasted until midnight, after which the wind blew a hurricane. She left Rose Blanche at 2 a.m. Saturday and had fine weather until she left Placentia at 11 Sunday night, when it became very stormy, and by 1 a.m. Monday the wind was blowing a hurricane from the S.E. with heavy rain. The ship did not reach Salmonier until 9 o'clock Monday morning. Arriving at St. Mary's at noon that day the steersman continued unabated and the ship had to remain there until 4 a.m. yesterday. She had a good run to port after with a fresh westerly wind and rain showers all yesterday. The ship brought a half cargo of fish, oil, etc., and the following passengers: Messrs. Duder, McKnight, Coady, Penny and Father Walsh; Mesdames Devereaux (2), Misses Porter, Hogan, Woods, Sutton, Shanahan, Morry, Kinsella (2), Murray, Costello and El steerage.

## How They Were Stranded.

By the Portia we learn that the schooners Ella Francis and Sea Nymph, already alluded to in the Telegram, went ashore before daylight Saturday morning last at Fortune in a gale of N. E. wind with heavy rain and sea. The former was from Bonne Bay to Balena, with part cargo of fertilizer, and the latter from Sydney with coal. Both dragged their anchors, and in the case of the Sea Nymph her crew tried their best to keep her off the rocks, but like those in the Francis, it was impossible to avert the inevitable, and the men on each schooner barely escaped with their lives. The men took to their boats, and after great exertion got ashore. The Ella Francis was broken in pieces Saturday, but the Sea Nymph is not badly damaged and hopes are entertained that she will come off when her cargo is taken out. The crews saved all their effects.

Jackson, Vice-President of the League, also made a nice speech, congratulating the winning teams. The C. C. C. band played some fine selections during the evening.

**SMALL CATCHES OF FISH.**—The local fishermen secured small catches of fish on the grounds outside the Heads yesterday.

From Miramshien to Odein good work was done, but at mostly all the other places it was of an indifferent nature. Since the 20th of August no big feres have been taken in the bay. The voyage is certainly not near so large as last year.

In some cases Inspector Bambrick found whole streets unnumbered where new houses had gone up within the past eighteen months. These were mostly on the higher levels.

**A SECOND CROP.**—Several farmers of the suburbs cut a second crop of hay this year. It has been one of the best seasons for hay on record.

## Schooner's Hard Time

The schr. Jubilee had her canvas carried away, her foremast sprung and main boom and foreboom broken in the storm of last Sunday while on the voyage from P. E. Island to Botwood with a load of hay, oats, etc., for the A. N. D. Co. The Jubilee met the full force of the N. E. gale. Her decks were washed again and again, by heavy seas while trying to get hold of the Newfoundland coast. The wind abated a little next day and the captain succeeded in getting into St. Lawrence, where repairs are now being effected under the direction of Mr. T. Farrell, a business man of St. Lawrence.
