An Hero of Peace

Elsewhere in this issue will be found the story of a gallant deed of a young Newfoundland fisherman which cost him his life. He was but seventeen years of age and with his companions of the crew was on board the schooner John Harvey, which was driving through the surf to the shore, and all were in deadly peril. John J. Foote was the name of the young fellow who volunteered to try to take a line ashore. He tied a rope round his body, plunged into the raging waters, and swam ashore, and by the connection he had made, Capt. Kearney, his two sons and two seamen reached the shore. Unfortunately the exposure proved too much for the young man, as it did also to another of the crew, and both died from the hardship they went through.

Such bright deeds brighten the annals of any country, and his name should be handed down by his countrymen as one who gave his life to save others. Should not steps be taken to place his case before the trustees of the Carnegie Hero Fund, and if any persons are dependent on him, some assistance might be obtained for them, and at all events his name would be enrolled among the Carnegie List of the Heroes of Peace?

Royal Bank of Canada Had Record Year.

Net Profits Amounted to 18.58 per cent on Stock, While Liquid Assets Now Stand at 49 1/2 per cent of Total Liabilities to the Public.

Once more the Royal Bank of Canada is able to report in its Forty-second Annual Statement all previous records broken.

Deposits increased over \$16,000,000, which bring the total up to \$88,294,000. Liquid assets amount to \$47,738,000, being 49 1/2 per cent of the total liabilities to the public. Actual cash on hand, balances on deposit with other banks, and call loans in New York and London, England, exceed 22 per cent of the total liabilities to the public. Total assets increased during the year from \$92,510,000 to \$110,528,000. Net profits amounted to \$1,152,249, showing an increase of \$200,913 over the previous year—equal to 18.58 per cent on the capital stock of \$6,200,000. Commercial loans amount to \$59,646,000, being 67.55 per cent of the deposits.

As will be seen from these comparisons, the bank has experienced a wonderfully prosperous year.

The King and Queen answered, in a loud voice, "Yes." Thereupon the priestly blessing was bestowed.

The whole party then proceeded to the Court church, where a "Te Deum" was sung, amid rifle firing and salvoes of artillery.

The union was, however, destined to last but one more year, for twelve months all but a few days later King John died.

Shuster Down on Britain and Russia.

Special to Evening Telegram.
VIENNA, To-Day.
The net result of British and Russian action in Persia upsets policy which was making progress towards peace, order and the building up of finances for the establishment of constitutional government, and makes Persia a land of chaos and anarchy without prestige among its own people, and in addition has meant the sacrifice of hundreds of innocent lives. This statement was made to-day by Morgan Shuster, the American, who was dismissed from the office of Treasurer-General of Persia recently. He has just arrived here, Mohammedan people, continued Shuster, are further aroused against Christian nations. Britain and Russia, far from having a more solid basis of friendship, are now face to face on opposite sides of a disorganized territory. The Russian and the British legations are the governing forces in Persia. They are acting through a Directory of seven Persians in order to avoid international responsibility, but morally they became responsible for the destruction of Persian nationality when they gave the promise of establishing a stable constitutional government. The members of the Directory are without character and reputation. They do not command the slightest respect among their countrymen and the Directory would not exist a day without the protection of the British and the Russian legations. Russian forces and influences are steadily advancing southwards. Unless there is a break, the present trend of events points to the realization of the Russian dream of a warm water port. It is a matter of only a few years when Britain will be confronted with the Russo-Indian frontier problem.

Sidewalk Sketches.

TAMMANY HALL.
Tammany Hall is a collection of patriotic and perspiring citizens whose lives are dedicated to the uplift and the cause of ballot reform. Tammany always places the man above the dollar when there is any counterfeit money in circulation. Its headquarters are in New York, but it is suspected of maintaining a branch office and distributing agency at Albany when the legislature is in session. Tammany's principal business is to disseminate tracts and other bankable paper just prior to a city election, and it employs a large force of uplifters who do not expect to be rewarded in this life. One of the most popular and improving pastimes in New York city is to shatter the power of Tammany, which is always done on the day before election. This task is usually assigned to a committee of earnest and respectable citizens in plug hats, who are divided between a desire to purge the city and serve on the board of aldermen. There are a great many people in New York who would like to see Tammany broken up into infinitesimal fragments if they were sure there would be no other offices to go around. Tammany is a secret organization and is harder to get into than a last year's union suit. Nobody speaks well of Tammany in New York except the newspaper which lands the city printer, and it doesn't make any pretense of an exhibit on the editorial page. Tammany never relies upon a spasm of public virtue to carry an election, preferring the more efficient method of casting the votes and then seeing that they are properly counted by the friends of reform. It has considerable real property in the form of assemblymen and congressmen and a working agreement with others in the form of a lease on shares. Tammany's modesty is shown in the fact that it cares not who makes the laws so long as it makes the general assembly.

A Timely Sermon

At St. Patrick's Church yesterday Rev. J. J. McDermott delivered a sermon which should tend to minimize a habit all too prevalent amongst young folks, viz. the reading of such novels as are silly and trashy and oftentimes positively immoral. He warned parents that they had much to answer for in the neglect to supervise properly the literature which their children peruse. Such reading is not alone a waste of time but is also damaging to the intellect.

Heavy Casualties in Winter Gales.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-day.
Heavy rains in South Midlands washed away snowdrifts. Railway traffic is nearly normal, with telegraphic and telephonic communication with Paris and Continent resumed last night. Reports of disasters continue to come in. Five bodies of the crew of steamship Wistof Hall came ashore at North Haven, Aberdeenshire coast, yesterday. It seems practically certain that a crew of 14 of steamship Frederick Snowden perished. The vessel capsized near Cruden Bay late Wednesday night. One man drowned was Henry Mitchell, coast guard, who was a hero in more than 100 rescues of persons from drowning. On one occasion he saved 6 persons in 15 minutes. Three trawlers were wrecked in the sands and Aberdeen crews saved. The trawler Kudoo, Aberdeen, brought into port the crew of Norwegian Bark, Zeus, abandoned at Bressay Shoal, Shetland Islands. The steamship Vera, Cunard line, arrived at Swansea from Liverpool with damaged bow, caused by collision of Bishop's with unidentified schooner, which sank immediately. Schooner's crew were drowned. It is feared that the Fleetwood trawler, Marion, wrecked off Maughold Head, Isle Man, is lost, a boat bearing her name was washed ashore. It is believed the crew of fourteen perished. At Haverden Park a beautiful fir tree, planted by King Edward when Prince of Wales was uprooted by weight of snow. Enormous damage is being caused by floods in various districts. Reports of disasters to trawlers and other small craft are coming hourly.

Churchill and Belfast.

LONDON, To-day.
Defiance is still the dominant note of both sides in Ulster. The news from Belfast is the growing excitement has been fanned by Churchill's determination to expound and defend Home Rule from the same platform which his father used to defend it in the eighties. On the other hand the leading Nationalist Organ, Freeman's Journal, says even if every street in Belfast has to be held by the armed forces of the Crown, Churchill must be secured while addressing a meeting in Ulster Hall. Any departure from his programme would be a craven policy, fraught with terrible consequences to peace and freedom in Ulster.

Coercion Act Talked Of.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-day.
The Radical newspaper, Star, which is a ministerial journal, calls for the ministry to take action on the edict of Lord Londonderry and his Ulster Associates for breach of the Tory Coercion Act, 1885, which is still unrepelled. Among many rumors about one is that Lord Perril, Canadian born, ardent Home Ruler, intends if meeting is prevented to transfer his immense shipbuilding business, firm of Harland & Wolff, to the Clyde. This firm employs 14,000 men and pays \$150,000 weekly wages.

Ready for Flight.

Special Evening Telegram.
PARIS, To-day.
A special train has been held in readiness since Friday to take Yuan Shi Kai to Tien Tsin. Evidently it is the Premier's plan to transfer the provisional capital to that city where danger from the Manchus is slight. Apparently it is intended to escape from Pekin as soon as the edict of abdication is signed but the reactionary Princes have gained the upper hand temporarily and prevented the issuance of the edict. Meantime the Republican ultimatum has arrived and resulted in considerable change of programme. This ultimatum demanded the abdication of the throne and surrender of sovereign powers. The refusal of the Republicans to permit Yuan to participate in the provisional Government until Republic be recognized by foreign powers and country be restored to peace is a feature.

Destitution in China.

Special Evening Telegram.
SHANGHAI, To-day.
Exciting news of war and diplomacy has caused the world to forget the terrible destruction which now prevails in China. It is a side issue but one which may have vital effect in the settlement of the revolution. In July and August last the Yang Tze rose to unprecedented height, resulting in destruction and caused famine areas, now accurately defined. The estimate is that 100,000 are facing absolute starvation. At the lowest estimate the destitute number 3,750,000.

The Archbishop Preaches

AT R. C. CATHEDRAL.
His Grace Archbishop Howley preached at the R. C. Cathedral at Vespers last evening, taking for his text the 12th chap. of St. Paul to the Romans, read at Mass: "I beseech you brethren, therefore, by the mercies of God that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice holy and acceptable, your reasonable service." His Grace expatiated on the beauty of this chapter of the Epistle to the Romans, which different from the eleven that preceded it, dealt with the moral obligation of the early Christians and were equally applicable to-day. In order to present our bodies a living sacrifice we should be in a state of grace and free from the guilt of mortal sin. "Reasonable service," referred to by St. Paul, was the fulfilling of our ordinary Christian duties and carrying out the rules of the Church in an ordinary and reasonable manner and free from all acts of frenzy that were indulged in by certain sects in the East whose devotions often culminated in epilepsy and insanity. Reasonable service, called for nothing extraordinary nor beyond what is inculcated in the Commandments, Precepts of the Church and this Epistle of St. Paul such as: "Love without emulation." "Abhor that which is evil and cleave to that which is good." "Love one another rejoicing in hope and patient in tribulation," and "live peaceably with all men, etc." Yesterday being the Feast of St. Agnes who suffered martyrdom at Rome at the age of 13, in the beginning of the 4th century, His Grace concluded his beautiful and instructive discourse by giving a short history of her life and heroic death for the faith.

The Gaspe Meets Mishap.

SQUALLS STRIP HER OF HEAD.
The brig, Gaspe, Capt. Enon, after several days' delay owing to adverse weather, sailed for Pernambuco at noon Saturday, fish laden by James Baird, Ltd. It was a surprise to many yesterday to see the vessel again anchored in the harbor, but a reason for it was plainly evident, the head and the masts and headgear had been carried away, and this occurred in the stormy weather which prevailed Saturday afternoon. Although a lumpy sea ran after leaving here, the vessel had a fine time up the shore, but it blew in heavy gusts as the afternoon wore on. At about 4.30 p.m., when the vessel was about 15 miles off Cape Broyle, and when the wind blew fresh from the W.N.W., while a heavy head sea ran, she was struck by a tremendous squall which took the jibboom out of her, the head and the masts and other stays. Capt. Enon ordered the wreckage to be cut away, fearing that in the sea running the boom while thrashing about and held by parts of the stays would smash a hole in the hull. The crew worked at this with might and main and a hard and wearisome task it was, which kept them engaged the better part of the night. The sea increased in violence as the night wore on, the wind blew a gale and the weather was intensely cold, so that the crew suffered very much and were often wet through with the sprays which swept on board. There was nothing for it but to return to port to get repairs effected. To work the vessel so that she could steer properly, a quantity of the cargo of drums of fish had to be jettisoned. The Gaspe was carefully worked down the shore and her repairs will occupy several days. Mr. Jno. Reardon, the cook, had his hands frost-bitten.

She was on her way from Gloucester, Mass., to St. Pierre-Miquelon, loaded with general cargo.
The crew, under orders, cut away the masts in order to lighten her, so that a hieght be driven higher up on the shore.
A Heroic Act.
A young chap about 17 years of age named John J. Foote, tied a rope around his body, leaped into the boiling surf, swam to the shore, making a rope connection by which four of the crew were saved. After landing the crew, 6 in all, who took refuge in a fisherman's hut, the brave young Foote and a sailor named John Keeping, died shortly after as the result of exposure. Capt. Kearley, two sons and one seaman, survive. When they recovered, they walked to Gull Cove, and told the story of their awful experience.

A chum of one of the crew came down on the wharf and wanted to get the latter on shore. In climbing aboard on the line to speak to his friend he was given a cold bath. Capt. Courtenay slacked the line and suddenly the man went under water and was wet all over. The captain then made the line taut again and told him that he was given a chance to go ashore. He availed of it.

A Terrible Story.

From Inspector General Sullivan learn that Magistrate Squarrey, of Channel, recently held an enquiry into the death of a man named Peyton, who disappeared near Cape Ray a couple of weeks ago, and who, it is thought, fell over a cliff and was killed. It seems that Peyton with a friend visited the keeper of the Marconi station near the Cape—a Mr. Burke, who was present with a man named Rennie—and he and his friend drank four glasses of strong rum while in the building. Peyton became tipsy, but was not so badly overcome as his friend. Both left the station about 3.30 p.m. on New Year's Eve. Burke and Rennie accompanied the men about 100 yards on their way home and then left them. The last they saw of the two men was when they were on their way back to the station, and in the distance they discerned Peyton's friend overcome and lying in a bank of snow and Peyton standing over him, while later he was seen trying to get him along. Instead of going back to render assistance, Burke and Rennie continued on their journey to their bunk house at the station. Late that night Peyton's friend returned to the station in a terrible condition, with his hands cut and frostbitten from struggling along on the road and he was also in a state of utter prostration. He could give no intelligible account of what happened to Peyton, but the man has not since been heard of. The belief is that while under the influence of the drink he walked over a cliff into the sea and that his dead body was washed away. There were evidences to prove that this is how he disappeared.



Thus far the only foundation for it is an article in the Pall Mall Gazette on contemplated Royal visits to continental countries, in which the writer suggested that the King might, after going to France and Germany, determine to extend his travels to the Dominions across the Atlantic, in which case he would possibly visit the States.

BERLIN, Jan. 21.
Seventy-eight re-ballots in the Reichstag election were held on Saturday. The returns indicated that the Socialists are not gaining as expected. The Socialists participated in 46 re-ballots, in which they carried only 8. At this rate they can hardly reach 90 seats. They were ousted from five constituencies on Saturday. The Radicals elected 17 members, winning 8 districts, chiefly from the Conservative groups. They elected 21 on re-ballots, the Clericals 7, National Liberals 21, Socialists 8, Radicals 17 and Irregulars 4. The Conservative net loss is 3, Clericals net loss 3, National Liberals net gain 5, Radicals 7, Socialists 3. The result of Saturday's polling renders it impossible for the Opposition parties to have a majority. The Government now has a total of 160 seats, including National Liberals, Radicals and Socialists numbering 114. Minors and Irregulars 11. It is hardly possible that the Opposition can overcome the Government's majority in the remaining 112 contests. The next balloting will be to-morrow.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.
The cause of peace is strengthened by the signing at Washington to-day of a General Arbitration Treaty between the Argentine Republic and the United States of Colombia, a treaty which is almost like those negotiated by the United States with Great Britain and France. The Treaty was signed by the representatives of Colombia and the Argentine at Washington.

There is still a large quantity of freight at North Sydney. It is piling on every day from Canada and the States.

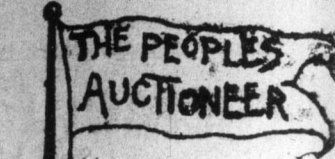
WEATHER FORECAST.
