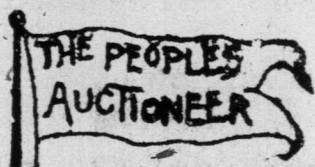

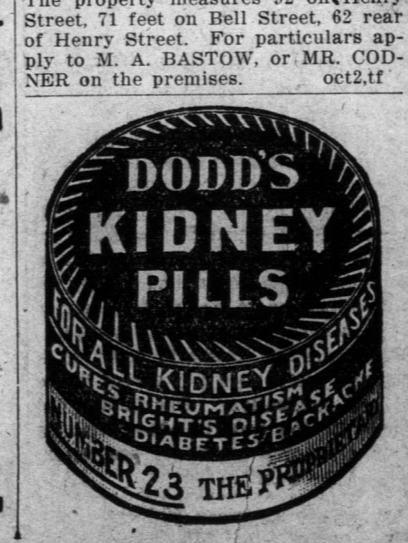

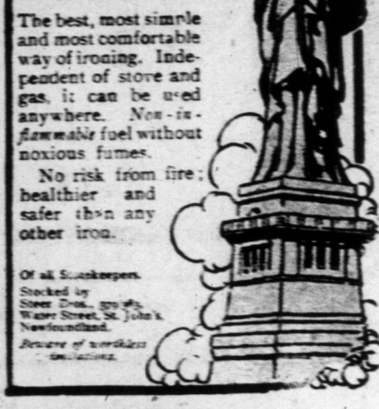
"Now," said Mr. Heatherbridge eagerly.

Seeing the coast clear, Muriel made her way, with Snip at her heels, to a green lane which ran down to the brook and was a favorite walk of hers.

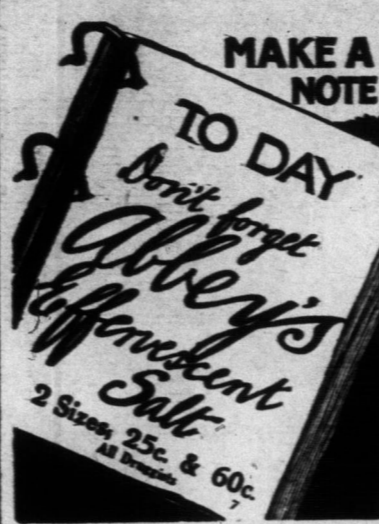
At the end of it, by standing on the stile, she could see both Rubywood and the Holme; one looking so prosperous and well-to-do, the other so deserted and dilapidated.

No More Kissing On These Trains

Munich, September 26.—The Bavarian railway has placed a ban on kissing on trains, platforms, or the premises of the companies. The decree issued by the railways is due to the innocent behaviour of a man and his wife who boarded a train after a cycling tour.

The woman, who was fatigued, laid her head on her husband's shoulder, and the husband placed his arm around her. The other passengers on the car did not like this, and summoned the conductor. They accused the couple of kissing, and asked the conductor to make them behave themselves.

The husband complained to the authorities of the action of the conductor in interfering with him. He denied the kissing charge, but the officials seem to have assumed that he was guilty, and issued the decree prohibiting kissing on trains or railway property in future.

Rev. R. B. St. Clair Is Found Guilty.

Refuses to Give Bond, and is Given One Week to Consider.

Toronto, September 26.—After hearing argument of counsel this morning, Judge Denton found the Rev. R. B. St. Clair, secretary of the Toronto Vigilance Committee, guilty of circulating obscene literature, and allowed him to go on suspended sentence on his agreeing to furnish a bond.

The Rev. Mr. St. Clair declared that if he was guilty of a crime he wished to pay the penalty by a term in prison, and refused to furnish a bond.

He was given a week to consider, and in the meantime is not in custody. The conviction is the result of a circular issued by the Rev. Mr. St. Clair, in his official capacity, purporting to give a report of a performance in a local burlesque house, and calling on the authorities to use their influence to have such performances banned.

The question fought in court whether the public good was served in the reports publication. The finding of Judge Denton was, in effect, that its publication was not in the best interests of the public.

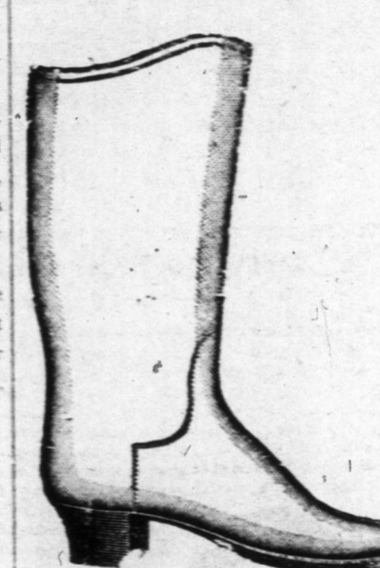

At that time she comes back to earth and breaks into the conversation with some inspiring bit of information such as "Did you say Grand Manan? I thought of going there last summer," or "Nantucket, why that's where my sister-in-law spent her vacation two years ago."

Of course, to this type of people other folks' anecdotes are never anything but an introduction of their own. Sometimes they pause long enough to say a word or two of applause before they tell you the infinitely more interesting story they heard. Sometimes they don't risk losing their opportunity by indulging in that courtesy.

Whenever I meet people like this and feel irritated by them I always pause a moment and remember Bishop Selwyn's definition of a bore, which I think I have previously quoted to you. "A bore is a person who insists upon talking about himself when you want to talk about yourself."

Of course, there is always a possibility that the person you are putting in the "that reminds me" class has just about the same opinion of you.

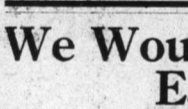
But there is one sure way to avoid this. And that is to exert yourself to take such a genuine interest in what other people are saying that no one will think of classing you with the "that reminds me" folks.

The application of the current also, it is claimed, eliminates pain from any part of the body.

Shot Four Persons In London.

London, Sept. 27.—Four people were shot and seriously wounded by a man with a revolver to-day who for a time caused a semi-panic in the West End of London.

The man, whose name is Titus and who claims citizenship of the United States, but speaks English poorly, had a dispute with a barmaid of the Tottenham Court Road. He drew his revolver and shot her, and a second barmaid, and then rushed to the street. On the way out he shot down two men who tried to stop him and also fired at a third man. He was finally overpowered by a passerby and arrested.

One of the barmaids, a Miss Tower died later of her wounds. Titus had been staying at the hotel for two months. He did not register his first name or his home address, and he is extremely uncommunicative.

BROKEN PROMISES.

The gravest complaint made by the people against the mis-named People's Party is the extravagant way in which public affairs have been administered.

As we have frequently pointed out there was neither wisdom nor economy shown in entering upon the Railway Extension Contract of 1910. Any reasonable business man entering upon a contract would take good care to have specified exactly the extent of the work to be done, and would figure out closely what the undertaking was going to cost him. Such a course, dictated by reason and common sense, was not the one adopted by the party which had undertaken to administer public affairs in the interest of the Fishermen, the Farmers, the Mechanics, the Laborers, the Clerks, and all who work for a living.

Now the chief hardship of workers is the increasing cost of living, and that increasing cost has been largely aggravated by the increased amount of money which has been exacted from the people in the form of customs duties. Four years ago Sir Edward Morris pledged his word solemnly to relieve the tension which existed even at that time. He undertook to make a Reduction of Taxation, and he declared that the "Reduction of Taxation so that it will bear equitably on the working classes, can be best accomplished by placing on the free list such items as tea, sugar, pork, and other prime necessities of our people on which very heavy taxes are now imposed." He declared this could be easily accomplished because he anticipated a continuance of large revenues. There can be no room for doubt that the opportunity was afforded the Government by the buoyancy of the revenue. Indeed the opportunities on this account were more favourable than ever before.

Increases in invoice prices on all goods dutiable on an ad valorem basis automatically increases the amount paid into the Customs revenue. This in itself is an additional hardship which is the more grievous as the old rates of 1908 were admitted by Sir Edward Morris to be "very heavy."

Such evils should in themselves have called for a remedy. But not only have the old burdens been continued, but the new additional exactions are exasperating the people. That exasperation is intensified by the thought that the Railway Contract was entered into rashly.

The Government did not even estimate any way accurately the mileage itself. The Government had the haziest idea of the cost of the completion of the branch railways. The Government undertook to pay the contract in cash instead of bonds apparently under the belief that it made no difference to the risks which the country was taking.

Sir Robert Bond pointed out the risks of the country being mortgaged heavily on that risk and his prediction has been verified. The Government led the country to believe that the 1870 Contract would be completely covered financially by the Railway Loan Act of that year. The Oppositor dutifully showed that the Government estimate was far too low, and the Loan Act of last year conclusively proved that the Government was wrong, and the flotation of that loan showed in addition that the country had been let in for a larger expenditure than had been anticipated by the Government on account of having to sell bonds to raise cash to pay the contractor. This is but one illustration of our opening statement that the Government has been reckless in its administration of public affairs and that its claim to be a government of the people, whose aim it is to make it easier for people to live, is unfounded in fact, and that the title of People's Party is an absolute misnomer which has brought that party into ridicule and contempt.

BANKER LEFT BEHIND.—The banker Donald G. Hollett left here yesterday for Grand Bank, and one of his crew, John Clarke, was left behind. The man was ashore and fortunately had enough money on him to pay his board here last night. He leaves for Grand Bank by the express this evening.

Another Waterfront Robbery.

Two Trunks Stolen From Yessel's Cabin at 10 Last Night—Smashed Open and \$120 Stolen.

The schr. Katie Bloomer, of Trepassy, is discharging fish at Baine Johnston & Co's. eastern pier. Last night most of the crew were ashore and the skipper, Thos. Curtis, Thos. Hartery and Rd. Power were forward in the forecastle smoking and chatting. The companionship leading to the cabin was left open, and shortly after 10 o'clock Hartery went aft to turn in. He was surprised to notice that two trunks which had been lying in the cabin had vanished, and he told the watchmen. They could not be found in the vessel, and Curtis the skipper, informed the police. A thorough search of the premises was made, and then the officers and men proceeded to the wharf of G. C. Fearn, adjoining Baine Johnston's and just east of it. Here they found the trunks in the archway. Both had been kicked open, the covers being made matchwood of, while the contents were strewn about the place. The thieves stole \$120 from Capt. T. Curtis's trunk, but took none of the clothing in it and left a silver watch behind. The other trunk belonged to the captain's nephew, T. Curtis, but he fortunately had all his money in his pocket. The trunks were heavy and more than one must be implicated in the theft. Neither the men on board nor the watchman on the premises heard any noise, and if the men were seen bringing the trunks along Water Street, this could not be considered an unusual occurrence. It is to be hoped the thieves will be captured.

GAME LAWS (NEW.)

BIRDS.
 (1) No person shall hunt, kill, sell, purchase, or have in possession any Ptarmigan or Willow Grouse commonly called Partridge, nor any Curlew, Plover, Snipe or other wild or migratory birds (except Wild Geese and Crows), or the eggs of any such birds within this Colony between the first day of January and the twentieth day of September in any year, under a penalty not exceeding One hundred dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding three months.

Provided it shall not be held unlawful to have in possession any of such birds when the party shall prove that the said birds were killed between the twentieth day of September and the first day of January following; and provided that any person who shall actually have in possession upon the first day of January any Ptarmigan or Willow Grouse shall be allowed to offer for sale such Ptarmigan or Willow Grouse until the 15th day of the same month of January.

(2) No trap or snare shall be set or used for the purpose of taking or killing Partridge.

RABBITS AND HARES.
 Foxes.—(1) No person shall export rabbit or hare within this Colony between the First day of January and the Twentieth day of September in any year.

(2) No person shall trap or snare any wild rabbit or hare between the First day of March and the Twentieth day of September in any year.

FUR-BEARING ANIMALS.
 Foxes.—(1) No person shall export from this Colony or its Dependencies any live foxes, except such as have been bred in fox-farms in this Colony.

(2) No person shall at any time take any foxes from burrows by smoking, digging, or any other means whatsoever.

(3) No person shall operate a fox farm without having first obtained a license therefor from the Game and Inland Fisheries Board.

(4) All fox farms licensed hereunder shall be subject to inspection at any time by officers of the Board, and the owners of such farms shall furnish such officers of the Board with information regarding the number of foxes obtained for breeding, the manner in which such were obtained, the number of foxes bred, and the number otherwise obtained and all such other information as may be required.

(5) All persons operating fox farms shall report to the Board quarterly, stating:
 a. Number of foxes held in farm;
 b. Sex and colour of foxes held;
 c. Number sold and number which died in captivity.

MUSKRATS.
 No person shall hunt, kill, take or pursue with intent to kill, any muskrat within this Colony, between the First day of May and the First day of October in any year.

TRAPPER'S LICENSE.
 No trapper not being resident within this Colony or its Dependencies shall hunt, trap, kill or pursue with intent to kill, any Bear, Fox, Lynx, Otter, Martin or other fur-bearing animal, without having previously taken out a license to be known as a Trapper's License. Such license shall be for one year only and shall be issued upon payment of a fee of Five hundred dollars and a further fee of One dollar to the person issuing same.

FUR BUYERS AND SHIPPERS.
 (1) Any person who engages in the business of buying or shipping the skins of fur-bearing animals in the Colony of Newfoundland shall obtain a license from the Game and Inland Fisheries Board as a fur buyer or shipper; such license shall be valid only until the thirty-first day of December in the year of its issue. A fee of fifty cents for each fur buyer or shipper's license shall be paid by the licensee to the person issuing same.

(2) All buyers of fur shall report to the nearest Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, Sub-Collector, or Game and Inland Fisheries Board, St. John's, on a form provided for the purpose, the quantity and kind of all fur bought. Residents shall report on or before December 31st, in every year, and non-residents shall report before leaving the colony on or before December 1st in every year.

SNARES.
 It shall be the duty of every person using snares for the purpose of taking any fur-bearing animals, except Wild Hare or Rabbit, to take up and remove such snares on or before the 15th day of December in each year.

N.B.—Penalty for violation of any of the above Regulations, not exceeding One hundred Dollars and costs, and in default of payment, to imprisonment for a term not exceeding two months.

 Crown Prince Constantine has taken oath as a General of the Greek army.

Editor Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-Day.
 With the exception of Roumania, all the Balkan countries are placing their armies on a war footing. As yet no step has been taken indicating the outbreak of hostilities.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-Day.
 Last night it was announced that the Foreign Minister was still without any communication from Bulgaria or Serbia. No definite move in the way of combined action on the part of the great Powers has been made. Short of actual hostilities, however, the situation could hardly be worse. The report that Turkey has decided to seize all Greek vessels in Turkish waters has an especially warlike appearance, while it is further reported that Greece is about to proclaim the annexation of Crete, an act which Turkey has repeatedly declared would be considered as a casus belli.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-Day.
 The Cabinet after a prolonged meeting has decided to order the partial mobilization of the Turkish army. The exact orders for the present are secret. The Cabinet has also rejected the Serbian demand respecting transport on Turkish lines. The consignment of ammunition from Germany or Turkey is now stopped. Bulgaria has suspended the freight traffic between Turkey and Bulgaria and commandeered all cars for military service.

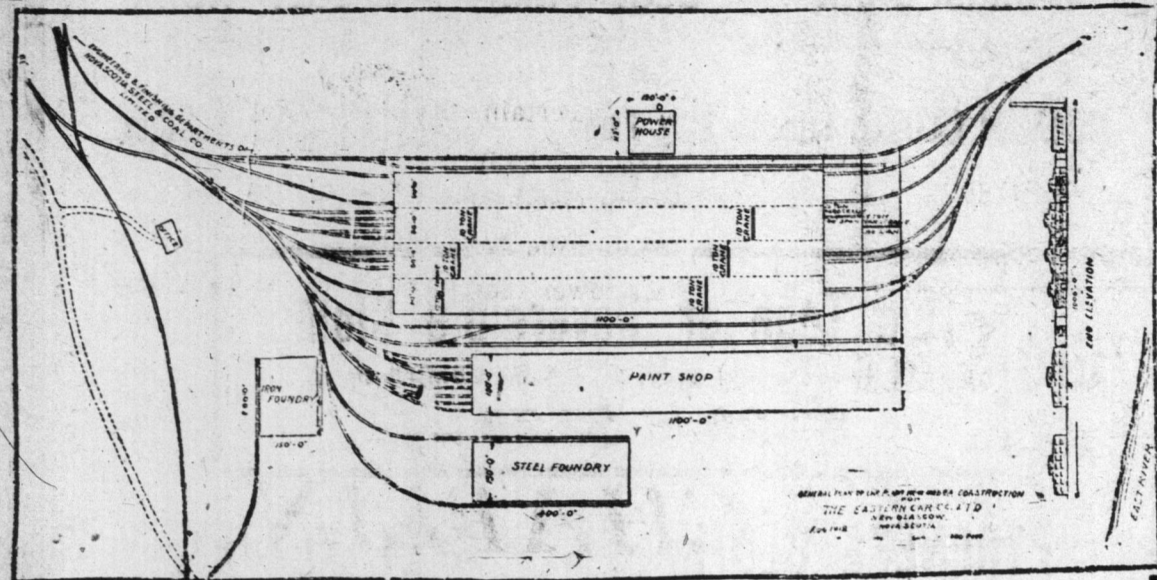

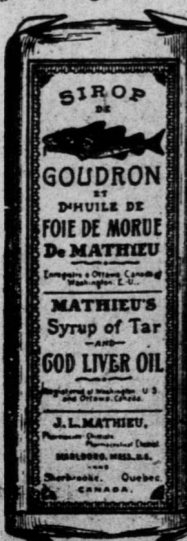
