





The fact that the old style lobste rap made of laths gives incessant trouble and is often utterly demolish ed after rough weather, last year impelled dealers here to try some othe material in the making of them. Wir netting strong and cheap and of a fair size mesh was selected and a few lobster catchers in St. Mary's Bay made the experiment with the new style pot. Most, however, laughed at the idea but when they saw after the summer their durability, the ease with which they are handled and their immunity from breaking, they felt differently about them, and this year they will be used around the whole bay and possibly in other places while their universal employment will only be a question of a short time. For less than 20 cents one can buy wire enough to make a pot. The sea may bend them but it cannot destroy them and if the trap is a little bit indented or bent up it can be straightened ou with the minimum of trouble and no expense. Nor is there any danger of osing lobsters from it once they are


