

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

November the eleventh is tice night, November the eleventh is also the date of the Bigade's Birthday in London, England, some twenty eight years ago and the 41st Battalion known as the Avalon Battalion was founded here one year later and has the honor of being the first Colonial Reigment. The late Colonel Gee the founder visited this branch of the Brigade on two different occasions. The record of the Brigade has been unique. It had only three Colonels in twenty seven years namely, Sir Joseph Outerbridge, Col. R. G. Rendell, C. B. E. and the present popular Lt. Col. A. F. Goodridge, Officer Commanding.
