Imperial Economic Conference Discusses Mutual Trade Regulations.

Five Falkirk Miners, buried for Nine Days are Rescued—A Remarkable Operation without an Anaesthetic—Stresemann to form a New Cabinet—McTigue-Stribling Bout declared a Draw.

ALIVE AFTER BEING BURIED FOR NINE DAYS.

FALKIRK, Scotland, Oct. 4.—Buried alive for nine days, five of the forty miners entombed by an explosion in a coal pit, were rescued to-day. The men were brought to the surface in a fairly good condition, and their remarkable escape from death has raised the hopes of relatives of other prisoners.

ECONOMIC CONFERENCE MEETS.

LONDON, Oct. 4.—The Imperial Economic Conference sat to-day for a couple of hours. It was officially announced afterwards that the conference, with a view to development of mutual trade, had given preliminary consideration to the following matters:—1. Mutual co-operation in respect to commercial services; 2. Removal of existing obstacles in connection with admission of commercial travellers' samples and trade catalogues; 3. Statistics relating to Empire Trade; 4. Imperial cooperation in respect to patents, designs and trade marks; 5. Valuation of goods for customs duty purposes.

ANOTHER BOOZE CAPTURE.

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—Three police boats captured without a struggle a fifty thousand dollar yacht carrying a sixty thousand dollar cargo of liquor in East River yesterday. The yacht developed engine trouble and the speed was forced down to such an extent that the police boat had little trouble in capturing her.

A REMARKABLE OPERATION.

BUFFALO, Oct. 4.—Chatting from time to time with the man on the operating table, Dr. Hans Finsterer, of the University of Vienna, before a cleft of Buffalo surgeons yesterday, removed a patient's stomach, performed a minor operation on the organ and replaced it. The operation required nearly two hours and the patient was conscious throughout. Dr. Finsterer explained that a special treatment of the solar plexus deadening nerve centres rendered the use of an anaesthetic unnecessary. The physicians examining the patient said he suffered none of the after-effects of shock usual in minor operations.

The wind blew off a big door of the dock station during the arrival of the Majestic's passengers, one of whom was injured. A number of small vessels are reported sunk or gone aground during the storm.

REID, N.F.L.D. CO. CLOSE MONTREAL OFFICE.

MONTREAL, Oct. 4.—Archie Howard who for some years has been manager of the Montreal office of the Reid Nfld. Railway Co., will sail to-morrow for England. The Montreal office has been closed and Mr. Howard will in future be stationed in London.

REMAINING MEMBERS OF THE CREW OF THE FARE RESCUED.

HALIFAX, N.S., Oct. 5.—A telegram received here to-day from New York, by a son of Capt. Angus Richards, of LaHave, N.S., who was reported yesterday as having been washed overboard with a sailor from the waterlogged schr. Governor Parr, announced that the remaining members of the crew had been taken off by one of the Commonwealth Line steamers, seven hundred miles off New York.

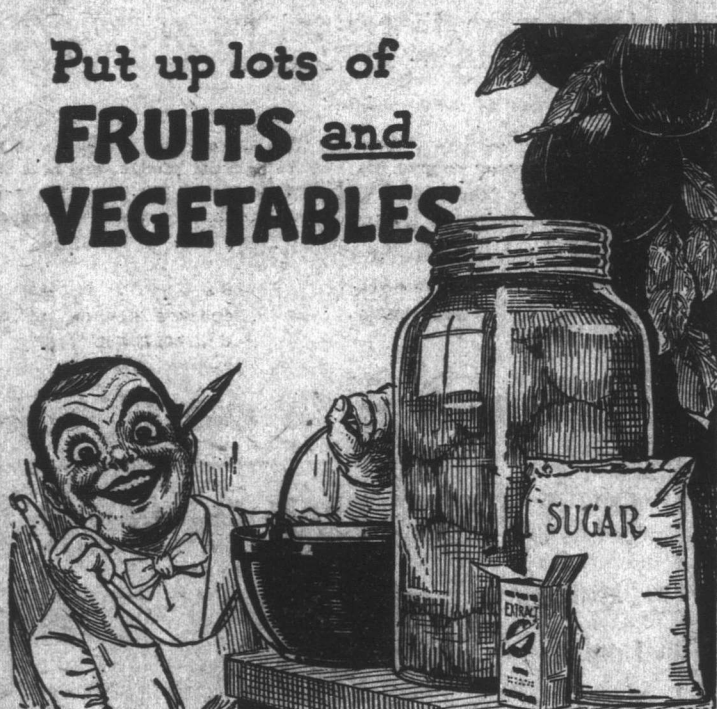

Possibly Seen as E.P. Is Developed and Enlarged—Downed in Bout—Prince Comes Right Back and Wins Friendly Tussle.

HIGH RIVER, Alta., Sept. 28.—(Star Special)—Lord Renfrew and party on special train arrived here from Banff, where he spent the week, late yesterday afternoon and proceeded direct by automobile to the E.P. ranch.

There was no demonstration on his arrival and very few people were there, none other than the average pedestrians of the day.

On his departure from High River on Saturday last not more than 25 persons were at the station and he leisurely walked about the station platform, talking with a few persons, as becomes a regular rancher, before entering his car for Banff.

On his trip to the train they passed through a regular Alberta snow storm which the Prince seemed to enjoy. He wore a fur cap and heavy overcoat which he threw off when reaching the station.

He seemed to be in buoyant spirits and feeling fit and strong, as it was noticed that after entering his car a discussion arose between himself and one of his party which ended in a friendly wrestling bout in which the Prince was first downed, but came back again immediately for the second round, in which he was more successful. All present enjoyed the tussle.

He returns to his ranch to undertake the managerial and other duties there and will give much attention to studying the future possibilities of the E.P. and changes necessary for extensions. These of course will be interspersed with recreations of different kinds.

More Stock.

It is understood that the E.P. ranch will be greatly increased and equipped as King George is actively participating in the activities there and is watching with interest the results of the undertaking.

It is understood that much more blooded stock from the King's farms are to be sent over as they can be handled and cared for, and that the ranch is to be put on a firm financial basis and provided with all the necessary appliances and methods which will make it a model institution within the next few years. It is proposed that the property will be considerably extended. Vast acreages of lands now lying to the west of the E.P., and extending all the way to forest reserves. It is hoped to add to the Prince's domain, giving the necessary grazing area for a proposition such as is proposed.

It is also stated on excellent authority that a large acreage of farming lands lying in close proximity to the ranch to the south and east, will be secured for general farming purposes and particularly for the carrying on of experimental farm work in the production of registered seed grains.

Experimental work will be carried on also for the general improvement of stock and to this end more pure bred and blooded animals from the King's farms in England will from time to time be imported and that the general district be benefited by these. It is the intention that these will be leased to the neighboring ranchers to improve their stocks.

Frequent Trips.

It is expected now, upon the Prince's return, that he will even more fully fraternize with his rancher neighbors and perhaps others who will appreciate meeting their fellow royal neighbor and become intimately acquainted with him, and discuss with him the various details of the life and work on a real ranch, all of which will be to his advantage in the furtherance of his ambitions in this western country.

Such outward expressions and actions will not only be of personal advantage to Lord Renfrew in fulfilling his ranching ambitions here but will also strengthen the sentiment now prevailing between Canada and Britain, this being the first trip to his ranch.

His observations and plans are objective and developments and improvements as above noted will receive his serious consideration.

It is the expectation of those closely connected with Lord Renfrew that visits to his ranch here will in future be frequent and that with its development it would not be too much to expect that the E. P. would house as his guests some day King George and Queen Mary.

DOROTHY DIX ON THE GOLDEN AGE OF LIFE.

Why do some of us hold middle age in such contempt? Why do we look upon attaining it with horror?

We glorify youth. We clothe it in romance, and all it with thrills and excitement and the tumult of adventure, and we cling to it with a desperate determination to hold on to the last shred of its radiance as long as possible.

We idealize old age. We think of it as the purple twilight in which one sits at peace and rest with folded hands, one's work done, and in one's heart the placid enjoyment of those who have worthily performed their task. We are proud of being old, but we are ashamed of being middle-aged.

Disappointments of Youth.

Now all this is utter foolishness. Middle age is really the golden age, if we only have the intelligence to realize it. It is the time of full maturity, of the full-blown rose, breathing its heart out in perfume, not the hard little bud that is only faintly fragrant.

Our glorifying of youth is a mere superstition. Youth, in reality, is not a time of happiness. It is a time of stress and tears, of bitter disappointments and baffled desires, when we suffer because we have not learned how to meet the trials and tribulations of life.

When you are young you can go through the agonies of being eternally disgraced by having to wear a dress or coat different from those worn by your companions. You can suffer utter desolation of soul and feel that there is nothing left in life worth having if it rains on the day you had planned to go on a picnic. You can know ever torment of the parish if you are a wall-flower at a party or too bashful to go with the crowd.

Middle age is far happier than youth, because by the time we reach fifty we have acquired a philosophy that makes us proof against the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune. We have learned to laugh at ourselves, and so vicarious has no power to hurt us. The keen edge of our desires has been blunted. Moreover, we have seen so many hopes blasted, so many disasters turn into victory, that we are content to wait the turn of fate.

To men, middle age is the time of achievement. It is then that they engage in the big game of business and match their skill and wit and luck against the world. No thrill like that. No adventure like that. No sport like that. Youth has no fun like that.

And even the men who never do big things have reached Easy Street by middle age. If they are ever to arrive in that pleasant thoroughfare. They have their homes, their comforts, and have settled down into a humdrum contentment that youth never knows.

Middle age is the heyday of domesticity. It takes twenty-five years for most husbands and wives to reach a working basis where they can enjoy each other's good qualities and avoid each other's peculiarities. Gone are the jealousies of the honeymoon; eliminated the friction of clashing wills.

On the middle-aged household roosts the dove of peace as it never does on that of the newlyweds. Capturing Criminals by Help of Radio.

LONDON, Sept. 24.—A man-hunt organized by a British broadcasting company recently with the object of testing the efficacy of wireless telephony, or radio, in the capture of criminals was entirely successful, it is claimed. Particulars were broadcast of a "robbery" and of the escape in three motor cars of the "culprits," together with descriptions of the "criminals," their cars and of the routes they were likely to follow.

Listeners in were asked to take up the chase and to send in details of identification. Within six minutes of the start of the hunt, which was timed for 7 p.m., two of the cars had been recognized, while the third was first identified at 8.59 p.m. No fewer than fifty correct identifications were sent in to the London broadcasting station. Three prizes of £5 each were offered for the best reports of identification. The prizes were presented to the winners were: G. Fleming Williams, who not only gave a detailed description of one of the cars and its occupants, but supplied a coloured drawing of the car; Master A. Trill, who received the details of the "crime" at his home in Croydon through a crystal set constructed by himself, and C. Cutten, who on a bicycle followed one of the "criminals" so closely that he was able to give the correct colors of a map which he observed the "criminal" was studying.

Municipal Council

WEEKLY MEETING.
The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided and Councillors Martin, Outerbridge, Vinicombe, Collier, Ryan and Dowden were present.

After the usual preliminaries were disposed of the following matters received attention:

The Newfoundland Atlantic Fisheries called attention to the very bad condition of the road opposite their premises, Job's Bridge. The Engineer was ordered to have same attended to.

The St. John's Light and Power Company, in reply to Council's request re cleaning down and painting of electric poles, stated same would be looked after as soon as Superintendent Morris returns to town.

Mr. C. O'Leary wrote to the Council in respect of having a storm sewer placed in Bonaventure Avenue, as the road is continually torn up after storms, and considerable damage is done to property, etc., owing to lack of proper drainage. It was decided that a storm sewer be placed in between Street and Bonaventure Avenue.

The chairman of the Dickinson Memorial Committee asked if the Council would undertake necessary arrangements for the placing of lights at the Memorial. The City Engineer was asked to obtain particulars and report.

A communication was read from Mr. E. G. Cozens with regard to the award made in recent Arbitration and was ordered to be handed the Solicitor.

The communication of the St. John's Mill Manufacturing Company, in relation to sanitary appliances at their factory, was referred to the City Engineer.

A lengthy report was read from the Medical Officer of Health in the matter of the unsanitary condition of buildings, Queen's Road. It was ordered that same be handed the Solicitor, and general inquiries made with regard to the property.

Mr. R. Thomas drew attention to the dangerous condition of retaining wall, Kichham Place. The Engineer was instructed to inquire into the matter.

Mr. Sandy White, Pearce Avenue, Mundy Pond Road, asked that some repairs be made to this road, as in the present condition it is impossible to bring coals, etc., to the several dwellings in the neighbourhood. The Engineer will visit the place and see what can be done to improve conditions.

The following permits were granted, subject to the approval of the City Engineer:—

Wyle-Soper Hardware Company, to repair building, Water Street; New Presbytery, St. Joseph's Holywastun; Garage, J. J. Murphy, Cathedral St. provided ventilator is installed.

A. Pike's application for permission to erect coach-house and stable, rear to 104 LeMarchant Road, was referred to the Department of Public Health.

The matter of placing a shelter at the East End Cabstand was brought up, also the closing of the stand, and the City Engineer was instructed to report on the matter and give estimate of cost, for next meeting.

During the past week, the work of connecting new water pipes at Millway's Hill was begun, and will likely be finished this evening. Permits were given for the extension of water main from Franklin Avenue to Pennywell Road.

The petition of the residents of Casey Street, as tabled at last regular meeting, was again considered, and it was decided to place two fountains in the locality, namely, one at junction of Gilbert and Springdale Streets and one at Gilbert and Casey Streets.

It was pointed out that the new fences erected last season at Harbour Park and the Parade Ground had to a great extent lessened the difficulties which have to be contended with on Harvey and Military roads during winter season, and it was unanimously decided to have similar fences erected on LeMarchant road this year.

The report of the Health Officer for week showed 29 new cases of Scarlatina and 4 Diphtheria.

Many routine matters were disposed of, resolutions, for several departments accepted, and accounts presented ordered paid.

The meeting then adjourned.

Ceuta Offered for Gibraltar

BRITAIN GAINERS.
Famous Mediterranean Now Useless From Military Point of View.
LONDON.—I am able to confirm from a high authority that the suggestion to swap Gibraltar for Ceuta is being seriously considered by the Spanish and British Governments. It would be unfair to say that there have been any negotiations or that the matter has gone further than a suggestion, but it has gone far enough to require serious consideration.

It is believed here that such a bargain would be welcomed by General Primo Rivera, the new Spanish dictator, as it would enable him to proclaim to the Spanish people that he has restored complete Spanish sovereignty on Spanish soil. It would also relieve him from the Spanish viewpoint on the Rifian problem, for it is presumed that the Rif country would go with Ceuta to England.

The British possession of Gibraltar always has been an irritant in the British relations with Spain and this irritant often has been reflected in the relations of Spanish and American countries. From a military point of view Gibraltar is useless under modern conditions. A few modern guns on the Spanish side could blow the British fortifications to atoms and while this is not feared from Spain, there is always the possibility of some competent power gaining an alliance with Spain.

Great Britain has spent a lot of money in Gibraltar making a port, but there is a good, natural port at Ceuta which could be cheaply fortified and under modern conditions it is a much more effective key to the Mediterranean than Gibraltar.

Of course there will be the usual outcry against surrendering the fortress whose history is closely identified with the growth of the British sea-power, but if the Spaniards agree it is quite likely that the swap will be made.

Its presence leads to explosions, breathing it is dangerous and its approach is so insidious that the damage may be done before it is discovered. Safety lamps have been in common use for many years to prevent fire damp explosions, the famous Davy lamp being the one best known. Now comes an improvement on the Davy lamp and also the invention of a Briton. This new lamp not only is a safety lamp from the explosive side of mining and a real illuminating lamp, but it is also a fire damp protector. Its peculiar frame resembles a bunch of tuning forks and they are made so sensitive that the presence of even so small an amount of fire damp in the air as two per cent will cause the lamp to sing, or vibrate a musical note. As the fire damp increases in the air the lamp sings more loudly and more shrilly, affording ample warning to the underground worker of the deadly menace.

The effect of Mind on the Digestion

Dr. James Arthur Hadfield, lecturing at the Nation's Food Exhibition at Olympia, London, on "The Psychology of Feeding," said a simpler title would be "The Mind and the Stomach." The influence of the mind on indigestion was very potent. A man might be paralysed by fear, blinded by rage, or fatigued by grief, and these emotions affected his digestion. In other words he was sick because his mind had taken in something horrible.

Appetite and hunger were two totally different things. Appetite depended upon mental sensation, and the mind had a great deal more to do with taste than some people imagined. It was easy to test this. If a person at breakfast complained that his egg was not fresh, the appetite of all those present for their eggs would be affected if it did not disappear altogether, and this in spite of the fact that all the eggs were good.

Taste and smell were often confounded. We fancied that we tasted many things which we really smell, and vice-versa. For example, we ap-

peared to smell chloroform, but we really tasted it only. If prevented from seeing and smelling the article no difference could be detected in biting an apple and an onion, and there was no difference between an apple and potato except in smell. We did not taste wine at all; it was the aroma that was important.

The flow of gastric juice was essential to good digestion, and emotions such as anger and fear prevented the flow. It was possible to prove this absolutely by the use of X-Rays, under which it could be seen that the digestive contractions of the stomach

ceased under these emotions. It followed, from the important effect of mind on stomach, that the less we thought about our digestions the better. It was an undoubted fact that an angry or an anxious man could not properly digest his food.

Education vs. Bolshevism

The only certain cure for what is commonly called Bolshevism, is the public school. Thought, of some kind or other, must always be going on in waking hours in the human mind. And the character of thinking is determined largely by two things—the stock of knowledge stored up in the individual mind, and the kind of mental training the individual has received. A comparatively empty, or a badly stored mind, coupled with crude reasoning processes, evolves perverted thought, and is likely to evolve perverted morality. This is what is meant by the old saying that ignorance and crime are close kindred. Bolshevism is a product of perverted ideas with regard to democratic development. The step from Bolshevism to crime is as easy as the step from any other form of ignorance to crime. Many may not agree that Canada's comparative immunity from crime and impregnability against Bolshevism are attributable less to religion than to education, though a strong case could be established in support of such a proposition. But at all events, an efficient educational system is the one agency the state can invoke against the spread of any propaganda of ignorance. — Sydney Post.

GREAT BRITAIN AND ITALY.

Daily Telegraph: The threat of Italy to withdraw from the League if the League intervenes has been read with sincere and extreme regret, but the League is nothing unless it be greater than even its greatest member. The time, however, to consider the situation which in that unhappy event would be created has not yet come. We have first to await the decision of the Council. It is absolutely unjust to suggest that all the countries, and Great Britain most of all, who are members of the League of Nations, show any hostility to Italy because they uphold the Covenant of the League. On the contrary, this country especially cherishes for Italy an old and enduring friendship.

"ANNO DOMINI"

The Times: That most common of all human afflictions called by Kipling "Anno Domini" remains a constant source of diminishing vigor. Wise men accept the fact and make the best of it. They enjoy their middle age as they enjoyed their youth and their childhood—in ways appropriate to the bodily strength vouchsafed them. The vanity which sets up impossible standards is avoided; the spirit of competition, which dictates excessive activity, is tempered by common sense. That, without doubt, is the young spirit in an older frame. For youth is sufficient to itself. Those older men who declare that they are as strong as they were twenty years ago betray indeed an unconscious sense of weakness.

INDIA'S NEED FOR PREPAREDNESS.

The Englishman (Calcutta): Indians should realize that hardly any country in the world has been so frequently invaded, principally from the Northwest, but also from the sea. On her Northwest frontier there are some hundreds of thousands of tribesmen, about a fourth of them armed with modern weapons, but happily not often capable of collective action, and inhabiting a country where nature is seen at her very harshest. Beyond No Man's Land "if the student of the fate of nations looks at the map, he will see that uncertainty rests with specially marked intensity on the tract which, roughly stretching northwest and westwards from the Hindu Kush and Sialkhan Range to the Caspian, fans out to the Eastern and Southern Mediterranean littorals. Ignoring for the moment the chaos in China and the east of Siberia the student can with justice believe that the events which are most likely to disturb the peace of the world in the next decade or more would take place within that tract."

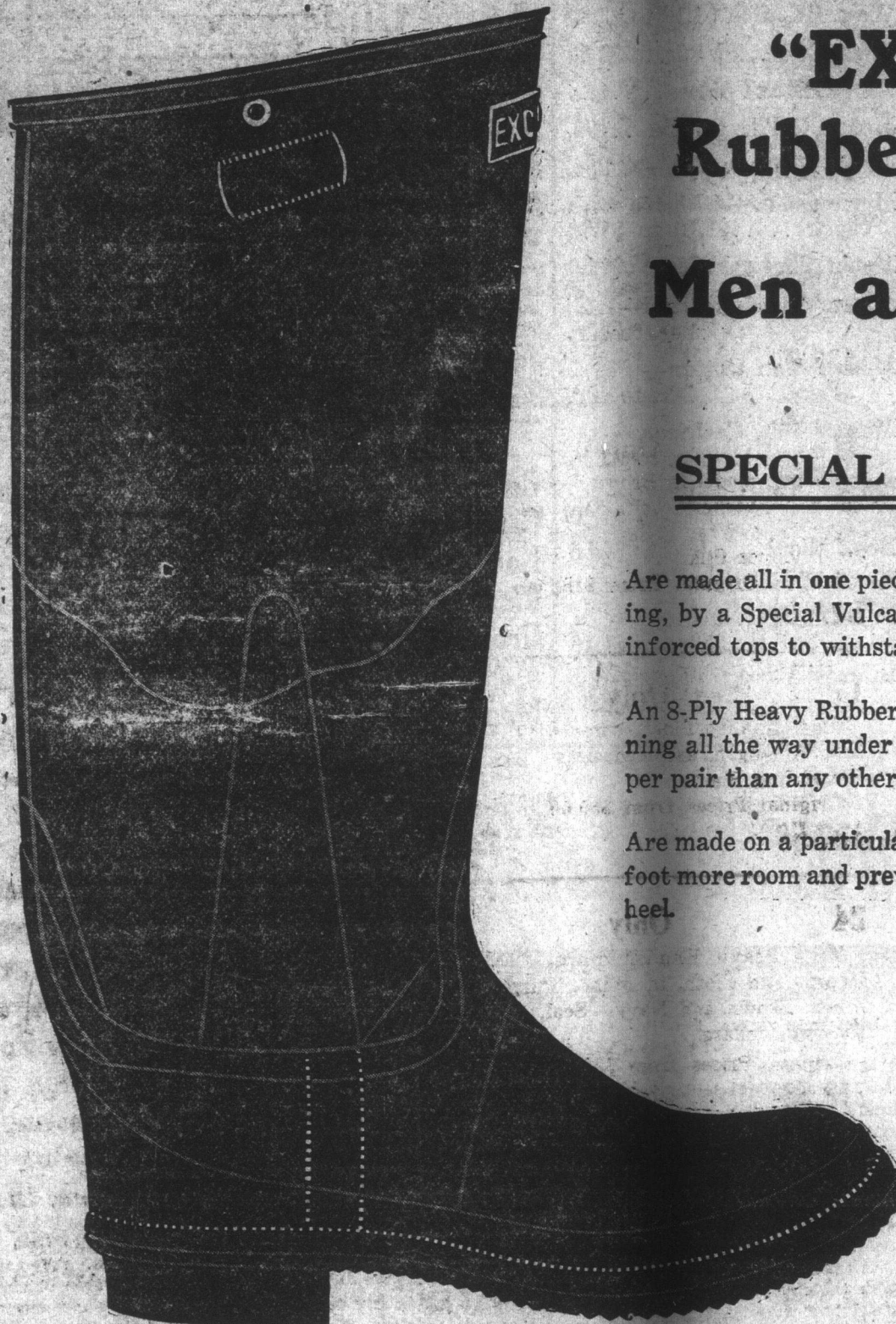

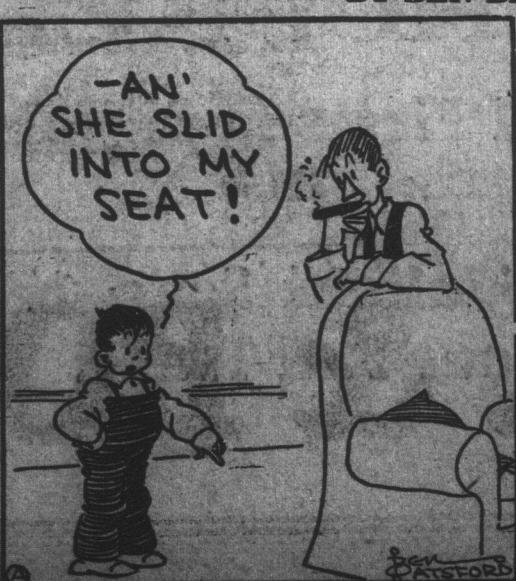

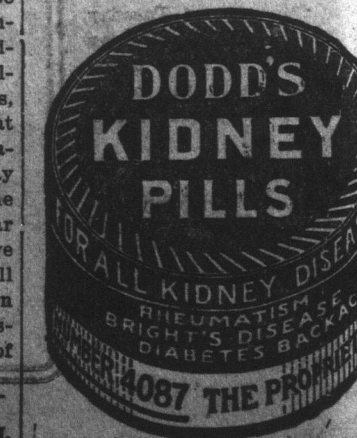

Money for Nothing

Confidence tricksters, who have been so busy in London recently, are gentlemen who are certain of getting something for nothing from other gentlemen who merely expect to get something for nothing, says the Daily Mail.

A man who parts with a few thousand pounds to an absolute stranger whom he has never met, for only a few minutes of companionship or charity, but because he really thinks in his own mind that he is on "a good thing" and that the other man is the "mug."

The old, old story has been cleverly told to him and he is fascinated by the lure of gold—and the apparent simplicity of the other man.

A rich uncle had died leaving millions for "distribution" among really deserving people. The victim is asked to assist in the distribution of this money. He willingly consents, and just to show that he has implicit confidence in his new-found friend he hands him over hundreds of banknotes—and friend and money disappear.

How are the victims picked up? How is it known who has money and who has not? There are various ways of settling these points.

No visitor to London fails to go to the Tower of London, the British Museum, or the National Gallery, and it is here that the confidence tricksters, who are, of course, well dressed and well spoken, lie in wait for their victims.

They see at a glance who are the most likely "mugs," and by following them back to their hotels very quickly get to know all about them.

A trap is laid. A confederate strikes up an acquaintance and the new-made friends go for a walk together. Suddenly a man walking in front of them drops a wallet, which they pick up and restore to the owner, who is so grateful (for the wallet contains hundreds of thousands of pounds and a will) that he invites his friends to have a cup of tea and tells them all about his rich uncle.

I have never heard of a woman being swindled in this way.

English as She is "Intrigued"

If words could speak, there would surely come a wall of protest from that overworked and abused dyslexic, "intrigue." This word, as a noun, means "plot" or "conspiracy." As a verb, it has a corresponding significance. About two years ago, some uninformed persons with idle minds set the fashion of using the word in the sense of "interest," with the consequence that the schoolgirl now employs the adjective form, "intriguing," to describe every object which takes her fancy, from a bouquet to a bull-pup. The tale is told that a young person with bobbed hair who saw Niagara Falls for the first time this summer, clasped her hands and exclaimed, "I'm simply intrigued!"

This fashion of abusing a word which "has a certain use of its own, no doubt," is by no means confined to flappers. Those who should be remote from such slovenly ignorance resort to "intrigue," whenever they wish for a synonym for "interest."

Reviewers of books, critics of plays and the writers of "trashy" fashion notes are alike sinners in this matter of dragging in "intrigue"—which has become a daily bore. Even when used correctly, such words as "strenuous," "uplift," "inspirational" can become a weariness to the discriminating reader. When a word is constantly used in error, its persistence in print is an irritation. The limit of absurdity is reached in the caption for an illustration in a New York paper, which described King Tutankhamen's tomb as "intriguing."

The pyramids may be "cute," the Sphinx may be "smart," but we refuse to believe that the tomb of the ancient ruler deserves nothing more dignified than "intriguing" to describe its prehistoric calm. This debasement of the tomb would have interested a more modern Egyptian monarch, Cleopatra, who gave every letter of the word, "intrigue," either in its amorous or political significance. Let us just the dictionary, discover the right use of "intrigue" and give the over-worked word a vacation.
