The Kingsten Murder.

The Toronto Telegraph says the counsel of Saxie Allen, now lying in Kingston gaol, under sentence of death for the murder of Driscoll, are endeavoring to obtain arrest of judgment in his case. They claim that he was taken in an illegal manner from the United States. A few fresh facts with regard to Allen's carrename is John C. Allen. He is 30 years of age, and was born near Prescott on the Canada side of the St. Lawrence, where he lived until about twelve years of age when he left the parental roof. Soon after leaving home he brought up in Ogdensburg, where he committed numerous petty thieving depredations, and from there he travelled about the country, visiting many-of the principal cities, and becoming associated with a regular gang of thieves, burglars and robbers. He was bold, reckless, and thoroughly bad, and would avail himself of every opportunity to rob, be the amount ever so small. Between four and five years ago, Allen carried on a thieving business in Detroit, plundering hotels, private houses and stores, and finally stole a gold watch from a gentleman at the Russell House, in which he was detected, arrested, tried and convicted, principally through the information given by a woman with whom he associated. He was sent to Jackson Penitentiary, Michigan, for a term of years which expired during the summer, and he returned, revisited this old haunts and associates, and lounged about Detroit, after which he came to Kingston.

Suspected Fenian Outrage in Dublin,
Dublin, Nov. 2.

A fearful act was committed on the 2nd inst., in Dublin. It appears that police-constable Kenna, 168. A, was on duty on the quay, when he met a suspicious-looking fellow with a hundle ander his arm. The constable attempted to ascertain the contents of the bundle, upon which the ruffian pulled a regolver out of his pocket and deliberately fired at the policeman, the shot taking effect in the centre of the chest. At the instant leggt Kelly came up on hearing the report, and attempted to arrest the assassin. He, too, was fired at, and likewise dangerously wounded in the chest. The murderer then made off, and despite the efforts of the police, who made strict search in the houses in the locality, succeeded in making his escape. The wounded men were at once conveyed to Mercer's Hospital where they were attended by Mr. Bucher, senior surgeon of the institution, but the injuries were found to be such as almost to preclude the possibility of their recovery. Sergeant Kelly, who is a native of Navan, has been 17 years in the force, and was an efficient officer. Kenna was nearly three years in the service, and was a native of Monastervan. A Roman Catholic clergymen was hastily summoned, and administered to the unfortunte men the last rites of their church. The bullets have not been extracted from either of the wounded men, the medical attendants not deeming it judicious to do so, as, under present circumstances, no good could result therefrom.


