Annual Meeting of Grammar School Masters' Association.

Annual Meeting of Grammar School
Masters' Association.

The above Association met in Toronto on Tuesday last. After the usus forms! opening of the meeting some communications on the subject of the recognition of girls in our Grammar Schools, and upon the present programme of Grammar School instruction, were received. The afternoon session was chiefly occupied by discussing the propriety of admitting girls to the Grammar Schools. All who spoke favored the co-education of the sexes. A committee was also appointed to draft a series of resolutions on the question. Aucher committee was appointed to examine the constitution and by-laws, and suggest such amendments as might be considered necessary. At the evening session, Howard Hunter, MA., Chairman of the committee on the U. C. College question, read an explanatory report, entering fully into the past history and present administration of U. C. College, and showing its relation to the Grammar Schools of Upper Canada. Fifteen hundred copies of the report are to be printed and distributed. The report of the Committee on text books approved of the authorized list with a few exceptions, and recommended that to that list a few not enumerated be added. Despatches to the Evening Mercury

(BY ATLANTIC CABLE.)

London, 7—The races at Lewes commenced to-day. The Dewarrenne handicap 10 sovereigns each, five forfeit, with 100 added, for all ages, about five furlongs, was won by the Duke of Hamilton's three year old ch f Leonie.

London 8.—Late telegrams received from Shanphai bring the following intelligence:—A French trading station near the frontier line of Cochin China was attacked on the 16th of June last by a band of Anam robels. The post contained 25 men, all told, who made a gallant resistance. After a desperate fight, however, they were overpowered, captured and massacred. A strong French force was subsequently sent against the band. On the 21st of June, after a short fight, the French succeeded in dispersing the rebels. To-day was the second and last of the Lewes August meeting. The great feature to-day was the Lewes grand handicap of 15 sovereigns each with 200 sovereigns added, the second horse to receive 25 sovereigns out of the stakes—distance two miles. The race was won by 'Birdseek.'

Paris, Aug. 8th—Lord Stanley and M. Moustier held a long conference here today, during which questions involving the present and prospective of Europe were fully discussed. It is understood that Lord Stanley, on behalf of British Government, expressed a desire for the maintenance of peaceful relations with all powers on the continuance of present friendly relations with France. M. Moustier responded in like manner, and held that while the Emperor Napoleon and Queen Victoria of England enjoyed amicable relations existing between the two countries, that fact was of itself a guaranty of future peace of Europe. The interview is understood to have been most satisfactory, and good results expected to spring from it.

Paris, Aug. 9—The Etendard says, at the interview between Lord Stanley and M. Moustier yesterday, the most satisfactory assurances of peace were exchanged, and confidence of both Ministers in future tranquility of Europe strongly confirmed by the opportunity they have had of renewing the good understanding which has so long existed between the two governments.

New York, Aug. 9th.—The steamship City of Baltimore arrived. The Moniteurs says the Franco-America Atlentic Cable will be finished by 15th Aug., 1869. La Liberte says Dr. Pusey has become a corvert to Catholicism. It is rumored that three distinguished Jurists, Sir W. Page Wood, Justice Selwyn and Sir Fitzroy Kelly are to be raised to the British Peerage. The Italian Parliament has passed a bill granting pensions to widows and orphans of Doctors who died in attending cholera patients. A strike by journeymen bakers of Berlin was threatened on the 30th. Violent demonstrations were made at Prague, in name of Bohemian nationality. Placards threatening Von Beust and insulting the Empeor were posted in several places. The garrison is about to be reinforced. Nine christian chreches of the primitive Byzantine style of architecture, have been discovered at Lallibalo the Holy City of Abyssinia, which have not been visited by Europeans for over three centuries. A Berlin letter says the rumors of reconciliation between Prussian and Austrian Cabinets do not meet encouraging reception, besides such negotiations would not be undertaken in the absence of Bismarck. # THE REPEAL MOVEMENT IN NOVA SCOTIA.

CONCILIATION A FAILURE!

The following is the despatch from the Globe's special correspondent on Saturday. The failure of the Conferce yesterday afternoon took no one surprise. Sir John A. Macdonald, Cartier, Mitchell and Kenny, were be fore the Repeal Committee, but made no progress, or at all events none sufently definite to be in writing, as they were asked to do. It is under stood that Ministers said they merely came to inquire as to the cause and extent of the dissatisfaction in Nova Scotia. The Conference lasted about an hour. In the evening the Convention met again, and continued sitting till a late hour. Mr Howe made a full verbal report as to the doings of the Committee. The business of the Convention was closed by the adoption of the following resolution:—"Whereas this Convention have fully considered the reply of the British Government to the address of the representatives of the people of Nova Scotia to Her Majesty the Queen, praying for a repeal of the Act uniting Canada, Nova Sco tia, and New Brunswick, and the course which it is expedient to pursue in the present crisis of the public atfairs of this Province, be it therefore resolved, it is the opinion of this convention that it is necessary to use every further lawful and constitutionmeans to extricate the people of Nova Scotia from a confederation that has been forced upon them without their consent and against their will.

A BANK MANAGER SENT FOR TRIAL.—On the 1st of the present month, Mr. W. Rhind manager of the Quebee Bank, in Montreal, charged, under affidavit, the Drummondville Bank Extract Manufacturing Company with secreting their property, with intent to defraud their creditors, of whom the Quebee Bank was one. On Wednesday, the manager of the company laid affidavit before Mr. Brehaut, showing that no secretion of property had taken place, and charging Mr Rhind with wilful and corrupt perjury for having made the statement. 


