

The "Regulations" Suspended. Punch once gave a cartoon in which Lord John Russel conspicuously figured, who was attired as a lad, with pinafore ill-besmeared with huge black patches of ink, and underneath it were the words, "Drat that boy! He's always in a mess." Substitute Egerton Ryerson, as chief of the Council of Public Instruction, for the head of the House of Bedford, and the truth of the picture would be as readily recognized to-day as it was a quarter of a century ago in England.

Regulation after regulation flows from his pen as readily as despatches were wont to do from that of Lord John, and with pretty much the same result. Take as the latest effort in this direction, the recent endeavor to regulate our High Schools.
