The Berlin Telegraph says we are in error in stating that there was a breach of faith on the part of the Grand Trunk in not applying the money received for the Riviere du Loup section to the improvement of the road from Montreal westward through Ontario. Also, that the act of 1880, authorizing the purchase of that section, will show that we are wrong. We have further heard it con tended that the act expressly provides for the use of money towards the purchase or construction of a Grand Trunk line through to Chicago, our government being desirous of having this done for the purpose of bringing traffic through Canada. Now, this con tention may be partly true, but it is not the whole truth; it does not tell the whole story. The feet is that the Riviere du

Loup purchase had been pressed upon the government again and again during several years before it was authorized by parliament, and had been pretty fully scussed in the papers. While it cannot be said that the Grand Trunk's intention to extend to Chicago was kept a secret, it still remains true that the improvement of the line in Ontario was the main ground of all upon which the purchase was advocated, This was really the argument that brought parliament round to the sanctioning of the purchase; and so important was it deemed that all other arguments on the same side were looked upon as trifling in comparison. The promise that the track between Toronto and Montreal would be improved was, "by a large majority." the main argument of all to induce consent to a proposal, which during years before public opinion had strongly condemned, and which more than one government had feared to entertain.

The "congested state" of the line between Toronto and Montreal has been felt great evil for years; but of late it h been getting worse to an alarming degree. From all Ontario west of Toronto, on the rails of both the Grand Trupk and the Great Western, also by the railways connecting Toronto with the north, freight comes pouring into this spot. West and north of this is the expanding end of the funnel, and here begins the narrow spout which gets choked with traffic. Between here and Montreal the choking up of the narrow spout gets worse as we go east, at least in winter, because of the additional contributions thrown in by the railways tapping the back districts of midland and eastern Ontario. At Montrea! there is expansion again, created by various railways going south and east, and the large capacity of the ocean fleets which load there and at Quebec. But the 333 miles of single track between Toronto and Montreal constitute a section crowded with traffic far beyond its capacity. However, it is after all the pressure of American traffic, far more than of our own, that so overtasks this single line of rails. And, as if to make the matter worse, it is between the iwo chief cities of the dominion that this great evil of a choked-up and over-tasked single track exists. Nowhere else in Canada, over an equal distance, has there been for so long a time lack of transportation supply to meet the existing demand, as in this case. In other directions the Grand Trunk has found millions for gobbling up other roads or building new; but for this unfortunate section scarce a dollar beyond the barest necessities

It is to be feared that a principal reason for this is the one we mentioned lately, and that the difficulty is one not easily overcome. Were there easy grades and safe curves all through, the laying of another track merely need not appear a very formidable affair for a company standing in good credit and with a superabundance of freight offering for the section in question. But with steep grades to be reduced, sharp curves to be enlarged, and various danger spots to be made sate, the undertaking becomes a serious one indeed. And this is why it is to be feared that there will be no substantial relief until the Ontario and Quebec line is actually in operation. Last year the doubling of the track was talked of, but recently it has scarcely been mentioned. If the public saw, even now, that the track would certainly be doubled to Montreal ere another winter set in. there would be a general disposition to make every allowance in view of the prospect. Possibly this may have been already determined upon; if so it would be a good thing to let the public know it. Evidently both the Grand Trunk and the Canadian Pacific are determined to take all the American traffic they can get hold of. It may therefore be looked for that, even with the Quebec and Ontario line in operation, the doubling of the Grand Trunk track between here and Montreal would still be necessary. With regard to this important matter the authorities would do well to take the public into
