DRIVING THE STING HOME. THE SCHNAEBELES AFFAIR.

It is an Ordinary Arrest and Too Mu Has Been Made of 16. Ins Been Bade of 18.

London, April 23.—But little new has come to light regarding the extraordinary affair on the France-German frontier. The official notification in the Berlin press that the arrest of M. Schnaebeles is final seems to indicate that the German Government will not reputiate the act of its police. The most probable explanation at hand is that suspecting M. Schnaebeles to be conspiring against German interests, the German police issued a warrant for his arrest, and placed it in the hands of the frontier patrol. The latter, like all police, desired to distinguish themselves by on intimediate capture, and resorted to unscruptions measures to accomplish it. The matter may become a prolonged question, of evidence, attended with much irritation, and possibly the worst will ensue. 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

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


