WASHINGTON, July 22 .- In the Senate to day in open executive session Mr. Teller (Rep.) continued the discussion of the Fisheries Treaty. He said that if the treaty had come from a Republican administration he did not believe there was a Republican he did not believe there was a Republican Senator who would have supported it and there was not a Democratic Senator who would have supported it if it had not come from a Democratic administration. He hnew that there was not any considerable number of Democratic Senators who would have supported it but for the fact that the power of the administration had been brought to bear upon them to compel their support. If any Senators desired proof that the administration was the active prop-agandist of the treaty he would furnish it. Proceeding to discuss the treaty on its Proceeding to discuss the treaty on its merits he declared that the American rights to the fisheries were inherent and were no

to the fisheries were inherent and were no more conferred by treaties than were the boundaries of the Republic itself. The American people were not to be intimidated by threats of war or by the suggestion of the difficulty which might occur, in the maintenance of that which rightfully be-longed to them. 

He inew that there was not any considerable number of Democratic Senators who would have supported it but for the fact that the power of the administration had been brought to bear upon them to compel their support. If any Seaators desired proof that the administration was the active prop-agandist of the treaty he would furnish it. Proceeding to discuss the treaty on its merits he declared that the American rights to the fisheries were inherent and were no more conferred by treaties than were the boundaries of the Republic itself. The American people were not to be intimidated by threats of war or by the suggestion of the difficulty which mighs focur in the maintenance of that which rightfully be-longed to them.











