

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

Spraying Fruit Trees.

Editor World: I beg to call your attention to the following extract from the evidence of Mr. James Fletcher, Dominion Entomologist, as given before the Committee of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario investigating the question of spraying fruit trees, and request that you give the recomment notice. Toronto, April 13. CANADIAN APPLES.

"With regard to spraying, it may not be amiss to draw attention to the false statements of the English press that our apples are poisoned from absorbing arsenic. The statement is absurd. The spraying impossible. The same thing used to be said of potatoes, though before the fruit of the potato could be injured the poison had to go through the leaves. This was long since proven to be absurd. It is the same with the pistil of an apple. It cannot absorb arsenic or any other poison. It is very important for us to be always on our guard in this matter. The same charges were made some time ago and refuted. They ceased for a time, but have now been recommenced: The object of the cry is simply to get a little cheap advertisment out of the cry of "Poison in American apples," because we are spraying with Paris green. If we could only get our farmers to spray more we would have better fruit crops."



Henry Allen to John J. Dixon & Co.: All the good effect, of the reduction of the Bank of England rate has been lost upon the stock market because London has been on holiday all this week. There has been none of the fereign buying which under ordinary circumstances would be natural. Instead the market has been virtually abandoned by all the interests chat have foreign relations, and such interests are of a good deal more consequence than the average observer is likely to imagine. In our market, too, the week's business practically ends to-morrow, for, the Good Friday holiday intervening, the session of Saturday will amount to nothing. Under such circumstances there can be no temptation to the trade except by those who care only to scalp. With the beginning of next week, however, there ought to be opportunities ample enough to induce free trading. Issues between the bull and bear sides will be clearly defined. The bear contention is that there is no public in the market, no support, no basis for a rise, that many stocks are selling far above their intrinsic values, above quotations approaches their intrinsic values, above quotations by prospects. The bull claim is that stocks are in under their real worth, that they have been unduly depressed by scares and raids, that the big earnings of the past month have been ignored, that money is almost unprecedentedly cheap, and that a cumbersome short interest is in the market.
