Voters Guide. The Elons'1849 Act of and the Elective Franchise Extension Act.

(a) Every male person, having been for six months previous to, and being at the time of his voting, the legal and bona fix freeholder of lands of the actual value of £50 or upwards, or of the yearly value of £5 or upwards, in any township or place

Or if the lands of the value aforesaid shall have come to him by descent or inher-itance, or by devise, marriage of contract of marriage, he may vote, though not a freeholder, for six morths.

(c) Or if the deed of conveyance or pai-ent from the Crown, under which he claims to hold his lands of the value aforesaid, shall have been registered three calendar month before the date of the writ of election, he may vote.

(d) Or if having been for six months pre-

vious to, and being, at the time of his voting the legal and bona fide tenant or occupant of tands of the value aforesaid, he may No person to vote as tenant, unless his

lease was originally for not less than one No person deemed the occupant of lands, unless he occupy with the consent of the owner, and with the intent of becoming the owner or proprietor, on the performance of certain conditions. No person to vote as owner, or tenant, or occupant of lands on which any instalment of purchase money, or any rent, or other sum of money is over or any tent, or other sum of money is over due to the crown and unpaid; for as owner tenant, or occupant of the property belong-ing to the Crown, without authority.
