THE COPYRIGHT LAW.

We are glad to find the press of Montreal and Toronto directing attention to the subject of literary copyright—a question which is again engaging the attention of authors and publishers in England, and in the neighbouring States. The subject has an important interest for Canadians, inasmuch as the anomalous state of our copyright law represses all native publishing enterprise, and retards the development of an industry which would have much to do with the educational and intellectual advancement of the country, were the trade relieved from the disabilities that now transmute it.

The Province is making rapid strides intellectually as well as materially; education and the press are quickening the minds of the people; and the extension of the book trade, especially in Ontario, is exerting a decided influence on the reading taste of the country. With these agencies in creating a demand for literature, and while the trade is bringing to the native manufacture of books great facilities, and an enterprise and intelligence

remarkable, when contrasted with the state of things but a few years back, is it not a farce and a reproach that, having this demand, and the facility for the supply, our own market should continue to be fed by an alien people, and that foreign enterprise, capital and labour should possess privileges which are denied to home industry?

Of course, were there an International Copyright treaty between the mother country and the States, or had American reprints never been permitted by the British Government to cross our frontier, the native trade would have no grievance: but while no reciprocal treaty exists, and while foreign reprints of British copyrights have, for thirty years, had the *entrée* of the country and a monopoly of its trade in competition with author's editions, which, in the main, pay no royalty to the owners of copyrights, why should we not legalise native editions, under a system of Government excise, and in the special interest of the authors concerned?

Unquestionably, the benefit to English authors in legalising Canadian reprints of their works, which would pay, through the Government, an author's percentage on the editions printed, would be direct and substantial; and in contrast to the wholesale admission of foreign piratical editions into our market, the proposal to reprint copyright books in Canada, even *without* an author's royalty being levied, would seem reasonable, as it would, at any rate, have the advantage of developing the trade of a kindred, rather than an alien, people.

Apart, however, from the aid to native industry and the publishing interest, this proposal is urged for the protection of the interests of British authors, and that they may reap the benefit of the sale of their works in Canada and also from sales in the American market, which our publishing houses would be competent to secure; and we cannot comprehend why our Government finds it impossible to get the British authorities to sanction the proposition. But, it has been argued, let the native trade negotiate directly with the authors for such permission, and then secure the market by an authorized edition, copyrighted at Ottawa. We reply to this:—Why take this round-about and troublesome course, and one which can only be effective if negotiations are made prior to the appearance of the original English work? Before overtures are made to the author of a published work, an American reprint, it may be, enters the country and supplies the demand. The author, besides, on that plan, has no advantage, as it will reasonably be presumed he would receive no more in the sum volunteered by the negotiating publisher than he would receive in the royalty, accruing to him from the duty levied by the proposed plan.

Hence, in view of all the points of the case, were prejudices removed, and the author made clearly to understand the position of the Trade here in regard to the question, and how honourably they wish to secure legalised reprints of English copyrights for their market, we cannot doubt that English authors would readily accede to their desire.

We have but room left us briefly to notice the action taken by an honourable and worthy publisher in Montreal, Mr. John Lovell, who has earnestly and warmly urged an improvement in native legislation on this subject, in the interest of authors.

He has recently had set up in his Printing House in Montreal an elegant combined edition of Macaulay's *Lays of Ancient Rome* and Aytoun's *Lays of the Scottish Cavaliers*, and after stereotyping the matter has sent the plates out of the country to a bordering town and had an edition printed and brought back to Montreal, and there paid at the Customs the 12½ per centum copyright duty, which will go to the respective owners of the copyrights. This, it is needless to say, has been done by Mr. Lovell to show the anomalies of our Copyright Law, and to give practical evidence of how absurdly the Act favours the foreign reprinter, and yet how easily its restrictions, which would subject the native publisher, regardless of the spirit of the law, to fines and imprisonment, can be evaded in the letter of the law.

Surely now common sense will prevail!

LITERARY GOSSIP.

MR. FORSTER'S "Life of Charles Dickens" has reached its ninth edition in England.—The first part of Dore's London, with descriptive letter press, by Blanchard Jerrold, has appeared and is well spoken of by the art critics.—The third and concluding volume of Lord Brougham's Autobiography is just issued.—The experiment has just been made to issue original novels in a cheap popular form when first published, instead of in the conventional three-volume guinea and a half shape. The credit of the innovation is due to Messrs. Tinsley.—Mr. Fields, the publisher, has collected his reminiscences of English and American writers, contributed to the *Atlantic Monthly*. They are issued under the title of "Yesterdays with Authors."—Mr. Baring-Gould's "Legends of Old Testament Characters, from the Talmud and other Sources," is just published.—A series of Essays upon the Acts of Statesmanship, under the title of "Thoughts upon Government," appears from the pen of Mr. Arthur Helps.—A new novel, by Mr. J. C. Jefferson, is announced, under the title of "A Woman in Spite of Herself."—The editor of *The Leisure Hour* publishes his impressions of America and its people, during a recent tour in the United States, under the title of "Across the Ferry."—A New York clergyman has published a rather startling work on the vices of the times, entitled, "The Abominations of Society."—Dr. Hayes' narrative of observation and adventure in Greenland, bearing the title of "The Land of Desolation," is now ready.

ITEMS.

NATIVE.

Messrs. Dawson Bros., of Montreal, have republished, by arrangement with the author, "Lord Bantam, a satire, by the author of 'Ginx's Baby.'"

Mr. Lovell, of Montreal, announces the publication of the "First Directory of Victoria, and British Columbia Guide," comprising a general directory of business men and householders in Victoria; with full lists of every important district in the Colony. The volume, we doubt not, will be useful to the merchants of Ontario; and many, we dare say, will be curious to know "Who's who," among our brothers on the Pacific side.

Messrs. James Campbell & Son have just added to their series of "The National Readers" a sixth book, or "Advanced Reader," and which may now be had of the trade. They are about to issue a Canadian copyright edition, by arrangement of the Rev. Henry Ward Beecher's "Life of Jesus, the Christ."

Messrs. Hunter, Rose & Co. have nearly ready a native authorized edition of a new work by George Macdonald, the author of "Alec Forbes," entitled, "Wilfred Cumbermede: an Autobiography."

Messrs. Irving and Flint are about to issue, in a separate form, the new story of social and domestic life "Hannah," by the author of "John Halifax, Gentleman."

Messrs. Copp, Clark & Co. have just published a new authorized text book for schools—a "Handbook of Christian Morals," by the Rev. Dr. Ryerson, Chief Superintendent of Education.

Mr. Russell Wilkinson, (late of the Canadian News Company) has just issued a complete edition in 8vo. of Jean Ingelow's Poems. It is issued in paper at 75c., and in cloth gilt at \$1 25.

Messrs. Adam, Stevenson & Co. will issue immediately No. 2 of "The Pulpit Harvest," embracing "Three Discourses on the 1st chapters of Genesis, and the Mosaic Account of Creation," by the Rev. Dr. Stuart Robinson, of Louisville, Kentucky. They will also shortly issue, "The Christian's Manual; a Book of Directions and Devotions to be used Daily, and especially in Preparing for Holy Communion," and Professor Murray's (of Kingston) Prize Essay on "The Influence of the Scottish Ballads and Songs on the Character of the Scottish People." The same house will publish, at an early date, conjointly with Messrs. Longman & Co., of London, "A Colonist's View of Colonial Questions," by Mr. J. Matthews, of Toronto; and, by arrangement with the English translator, Mr. W. F. Rae, author of "Westward by Rail," an edition of M. Taine's "Notes on England." These sprightly and interesting "Notes" were contributed by M. Taine to the Paris *Temps*, and English readers will have met many of them in the newspaper press, where they have been copied from the London *Daily News*, for which paper they were translated by Mr. Rae.

Messrs. Willing & Williamson, who have succeeded Messrs. Adam, Stevenson & Co. in their retail business, have just issued a new general Book Catalogue, embracing selections from current and standard publications in the various departments of literature. It will be found serviceable to book collectors and librarians of Institutes, &c., and evidences the importance of the stock held by Messrs. W. & W.

We have much pleasure in noticing that Mr. Rowsell, who has been in the book-business in this city for nearly forty years, and has most deservedly won for himself the esteem and regard of the community, has taken into partnership Mr. Henry Hutchison, who has for the last twenty years had the management of Mr. Rowsell's business. Mr. Hutchison is well and favourably known; and we doubt not the new firm will receive hearty support and encouragement. Their advertisement will be found in a following page.

ENGLISH.

Messrs. A. & C. Black have now completed their elegant centenary edition, in 25 volumes, crown 8vo, of the Waverley Novels. Their new "One Hundred Volume edition" of Scott's entire works, with illustrations, is also completed.

Messrs. Cassell, Petter and Galpin issue volume 2 of "Little Folks," a charming illustrated annual for the young; Volume 1 of their "Illustrated History of the Franco-German War;" and they announce, to be published at intervals, a cheap edition, with all the original illustrations, and a revised text, of Figuier's Works on Popular Science.

Messrs. T. & T. Clark issue two new volumes in their important series of the Foreign Theological Library:

viz. Delitzsch's Commentary on the Psalms, vol 3, and Hengstenberg on the Old Covenant.

Messrs. Rivington & Co. have now completed, and issue at a cheaper rate, the Bishop of Lincoln's (Dr. Wordsworth) Commentary on the Bible, in 6 vols., 8vo. Of their late publications are Dr. Dollinger's Fables respecting the Popes of the Middle-Ages; Shipley's Glossary of Ecclesiastical Terms; and

Messrs. Strahan and Co. have ready a humorous poem, "Saint Abe and his Seven Wives, a tale of Salt Lake City;" "The Secret History of the International;" "Peeps at Foreign Countries," by the Editors and Contributors of *Good Words*; and "Sundays Abroad," by the Rev. Thomas Guthrie, D.D.

Messrs. Hodder & Stoughton's new publications embrace the first volume of "The Preacher's Lantern," edited by the Rev. E. Paxton Hood; a second series of "Secular Annotations on Scripture Texts;" "Crumbs Swept Up," by the Rev. De Witt Talmage, of Brooklyn; and "Across the Ferry, Impressions of America and its People," by the Editor of *The Leisure Hour*.

Mr. Elliot Stock issues a number of annual volumes in the interest of Sunday School work, viz.—Vol. 4 of "The Hive;" Vol. 2 of "The Biblical Museum;" "The Temperance Budget;" also the following religious works: "Within the Gates, or Glimpses of the Heavenly City;" "Silver Spray" and other Sketches from Modern Church Life.

We would direct the attention of those who have occasion to use mourning stationery, to the advertisement of Messrs. Perry, Stoneham & Co., of London, who have recently introduced a novelty in the designs of black-bordered note paper and envelopes. This consists in a series of elegant lace pattern borders, which are quite unique and artistic. The "Oxford" bordered stationery manufactured by this Firm, has been received with great favour; and large importations of paper and envelopes with the Oxford border, in black and in colours, have been made into Canada and have been in great demand. The new style of the *Dentelle* papers, we presume, will meet with a ready sale, and the trade should supply themselves with stock at once.

AMERICAN.

Messrs. Harper & Brothers have ready Dr. Samuel Smiles' new work "Character," a companion volume to "Self Help;" "A Boy's Voyage Round the World," edited by the same; Vol. 1 of the Rev. Mr. Tyerman's "Life and Times of John Wesley;" "Woman's Worth and Worthlessness," by Gail Hamilton; and in the department of Fiction, "Fair to See," by L. W. M. Lockhart; "Blade-o'-Grass," by B. L. Farjeon; and "The American Baron," by Prof. James De Mille.

Messrs. Charles Scribner & Co. issue a new volume of Lange's Commentaries, on "Joshua, Judges, and Ruth;" Max Muller's "Lectures on the Science of Religion;" Dr. Hodge's "System of Theology," Vol. 2, "On Anthropology and Soteriology;" and a popular edition of the second series of Froude's "Short Stories on Great Subjects."

Messrs. D. Appleton & Co. issue "More Criticisms on Darwin and Administrative Nihilism," by Professor Huxley; and announce "A Manual of the Anatomy of Vertebrated Animals," by the same writer. They purpose also to issue an important series of handbooks on technical subjects, by the most eminent scientific writers of England and the continent. The title of the text-books will be "The International Scientific Series," and they will embrace treatises on the various branches of physical, biological, psychological and social science, and be thoroughly abreast with the most recent inquiry on these subjects. Among the names of the contributors to the series will be found the following writers and savans—Professors Huxley, Bain, Jevons, Carpenter, Tyndall, Herbert Spencer, Sir John Lubbock, Mr. J. N. Lockyer, Dr. Henry Maudsley, besides prominent continental authors. Professor Youmans will be the American editor, and the series will be copyrighted in America, England, France, and Germany.

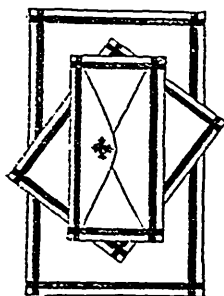
