 half after nine at Night, consequently Invisible.

It requires a great deal of sense to be able to make these condescending self-denials, and a vast stock of modesty not to desire to outshine others when we can, and make a show of our best talents.



## On the Credulity of the Populace.

**I**T is observable, that daring and undertaking fellows have ever been the darlings of the populace, who are so credulous as to take men's characters even from themselves, and believe pretenders in every art to be really what they profess: Bold ignorance passes upon the multitude for sense; confident knaves live upon credulous fools.



## On the different Effects of Knowledge.

**K**NOWLEDGE softened with complacency, and a yielding sweetness of temper, make a man equally beloved and admired by all the world that knows him: but joined with a severe, morose, and assuming behaviour make him not only shunned and feared, but mortally hated by every creature.



## The Precepts of a good and a bad Man contrasted.

**T**HÉ precepts and admonitions of a very good man have in them a great power of persuasion, and are apt to move strongly, and to inflame others to go and do likewise: but the good instructions of a bad man are languid and faint, and of very little force, because they give no heart or encouragement to follow that counsel which they see he that gives it, does not think fit to take himself.

## A MORAL and POLITICAL MAP of EUROPE.

RUSSIA. **T**HE motley creation of Peter, called the Great imitators of all Europe, but not Russians; a country taught to rear the produce of southern climates to vapid life, and to neglect its own vigorous offspring; history, mathematics, geography, a general balance of trade, inhuman interpidity, slavery, savage place of wealth.

SWEDEN. Private industry; public profligacy; a state abroad enslaved by bribes, and ruled at home by the smell of surfeits; the country of Linnæus and Artedi.

DENMARK. A nation of voluntary slaves to a race of goodnatured kings; Dutch plodding; some sense; no genius.

POLAND. The asylum of Socinus; the scymetar supreme judge of right and wrong; of liberty and slavery.

HUNGARY. The phantom of a people once free, vigorous, and acute; the clergy ruling; the press curtailed; the nobility crest fallen; a soil rich by nature, poor by policy.

BOHEMIA. Moral forests and deserts.

GERMANY. Its heroes, like Italian pictures, shew best at a distance; the rest parcelled out, to despots, petty tyrants, priests, pedigreed beggars, and peasants, and all her neighbours know Germany. Yet this is the mother of Armanius and Frederic; of Leibnitz and Wolfe; of Handel and Graun; of Mengs and Donner; of Winkleman and Reimarus.

SWITZERLAND. The land of liberty. — Trade, taste, knowledge, discovery amang the Protestants, vigour in all; despisers of death; slaves of money abroad. Abroad a contemptible swarm of valets, clerks, officers, artists, schemers; the leeches of fools.

HOLLAND. A country thro' all ages fertile of patriots, tho' now plethoric with wealth, and unstrung by public indolence. A nobility once full of republican metal, sneaking by degrees into courtiers. Here are scholars civilians, laborious triflers, trade. Here absence of misery is happiness; indifference contentment; profit honour. Here sentiment is nonsense; plain sense wit; jollity, pleasure; possession enjoyment; money the anchor of minds, the gale of passions, the port of life.

ENGLAND. The domain of liberty and property, the country of extremes. Virtue is here divinity, vice infernal. Here are liberty of conscience, political civil liberty, commercial liberty, liberty of thought, tongue and pen, to and beyond the limits of the most profligate license ; news-papers, magazines, pamphlets, registers ; heaven and earth a job ; turf, cockpits, clubs, Muccaronies, blackguards, stocks, lotteries, schemes, lame ducks, clever fellows, humour ana Numbers big with suicide ; post chaises, Italian music and pictures, but few ears or eyes ; the nest of foreigners ; the country of Shakespeare, Newton, Hogarth.

FRANCE. The country of citoyens and modes. Here things are estimated by the air ; a watch may be a masterpiece, without exactness ; and a woman rule the town without beauty if they have air. Here life is a dance, and awkwardness of step its great disgrace. Character here is dissolved into the public, and an original a name of mirth. " Cela se fait et cela ne se fait pas," are here the supreme umpires of conduct. Their religion is superstition, fashion, soppism : Tyranny may grind the face, but not the countenance of a Frenchman ; his feet are made to dance in wooden shoes. France was the country of Le Sueur & Racine, & of Voltaire.

SPAIN. The dregs of a nation two centuries past, the arbiters of Europe, and leaders of discovery. Still sense, sagacity, and cool courage, are tamely submitted here to the iron yoke of inquisition ; and each note of humanity drowned in the yell of Dominics victims. The prerogatives of society moulder here in provincial archives ; these are the execrable lords of one hemisphere, and the humble factors of Europe. To see a scepter in the gripe of women confessors and favourites make no characteristic of Spain ; nor is the country of Calderon and Cervantes, more than its neighbours, the land of ignorance, vanity, indolence, poverty, envy.

PORTUGAL. Something of literature and history, glare, gallantry, superstition, earthquakes, daggers, inquisition, the bloody dawns of an uncertain day, the country of Cancus.

ITALY. An unweeded garden, its inhabitants flies bred on a dead horse.—Slavery, and license. Each moral principle the pimp of pamper'd organs : the country of arts, tricks, castration, and banditti ; of Raphael, Goldoni, Farinelli, Archangeli.

## A Remarkable ANECDOTE.

IT was the custom, in Henry the VIIIth's Reign, for the Bishops, upon the coming in of the New Year, to make presents to the King: And many of them presented very liberally; proportioning their gifts to their expectations.— Among the rest, Bishop Latimer, being then in town, waited upon the King with his New-Year's offerings: but instead of a purse of gold which was the common oblation, he presented a New-Testament, with a leaf folded down, in a very conspicuous manner, pointing to this passage, "Whoremongers and Adulterers G O D will judge."

## Of Requisites in an agreeable Companion.

THE reason why we find so very few men of sense, & agreeable conversation, is, that almost every body's mind is more intent upon what he himself has a mind to say, than upon making pertinent replies, to what the rest of the company say to him. The more ingenious and complaisant sort go no farther than pretending to hearken attentively, when, at the same time a man may plainly see that both their eyes, and their mind, are roving from what is said to them, and posting back again to what they long to be at themselves; not considering, that to seek one's own pleasure so very passionately, can never be the way either to please or persuade others; and that diligent attention, and proper rapartees, are the two perfections that accomplish a man for company.

## On the Imprudence of TATLING.

THE indiscretion of talking too freely of one another, is the source of those so many differences which embroil mankind. Such as, having heard disobliging discourses repeat them again to the person concerned, are much mistaken if they think to oblige him by these indiscreet confidences; it grates us to the heart, to hear a man who is so imprudent to tell us to our faces vexatious things, though he only repeat what others have said of us.
