Smith claims Davidson did the most effective skating of any player in the N.H.A. last winter, and a host of the hockey fans of the capital agree with him.

This season Smith picks Eddie Gerard to fill Davidson's place in the Canadian hockey world. Gerard, at the first practice of the Ottawa team on Monday night, was checked heavily into the boards and received injuries to his shoulder that will keep him out of the game for nearly a week.

Philadelphia Record: Lady Suffolk was the first trotter to beat 2:00. That was in 1846. Flora Temple, 1:59 1/2, in 1859, was the first 2:30 trotter. Jay Eye was the first to beat 2:00, in 1854, when he was 2:10. Nancy Hanks, 2:04, in 1858, the first to beat 2:00. Lou Dillon, 2:00, in 1903, the first two-minute trotter, and Major DeFuria, 1:58 1/2, in 1908, was the first to trot in less than two minutes.

No trotter has won a heat in a race as fast as two minutes, but it is believed that Ulian, 1:58, against time, could have reached the mark had the opportunity and incentive presented itself.

Lady Suffolk trotted her 2:30 mile at Hoboken, N.J., Flora Temple trotted her mile in 2:19 1/2 at Kalamazoo, Mich., and it was 2 1/2 years later, in 1857, when Jay Eye won the Providence race in 2:10. Lou Dillon's two-minute mile in 1903, was made over the Reservoir, Mass., track.

Nancy Hanks, mile in 2:04, in 1858, at Terry Rantz, Ind., won the official list of 2:30 trotters. In 1859 this daughter of Happy Medium, 4:00, succeeded in trotting out over 2:00—2:04 1/2, at Indianapolis, Ind., and was retired to the breeding ranks. She now has a son, Admiral Dewey, 2:04 1/2, and a grandson, Lord Dewey, 2:03 1/2, in the 2:00 list. In 1894 Alix, 2:03 1/2, took her record, and the championship title at Hagerstown, Md., Sept. 19, trotting all told, five miles that season in better than 2:05—2:03 1/2, 2:04, 2:04 1/2, 2:04 1/2 and 2:04 1/2—in her various assaults against time.

It remained, however, for Crestous for Crestous to trot the regular class in 2:05, the son of Robert McGregg, 2:17 1/2, negotiating the second heat at Detroit in 2:05 1/2, in his match with Charles V. in 2:07 1/2. Later that year, at Brighton Beach, N.Y., Crestous, 2:05 1/2, decisively defeated The Abbott in 2:05 1/2, 2:05 1/2, 2:05 1/2, 2:05 1/2 and 2:05 1/2.
