ROME, Sept. 24.—(Via Paris, Sept. 25.)—The Italians, according to an official statement from army headquarters, have captured the strong position of Monte Coston, on the plateau northwest of Arsiero. It was first stormed and then isolated by an enveloping movement, which the enemy failed to stop by violent attacks lasting three days. The Italians captured five Austrian officers, 118 men, and great quantities of munitions, hand grenades and explosives.

UNDER HALF BILLION

Issue Will Not Be Open to Private Investors, Latest Report.

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.-Negotia tions over the proposed credit to Great Britain and France continued today without noteworthy development, but to the accompaniment of many reports relating to matters said to be under consideration. For the first time since the Anglo-

French financial commission reached New York a fortnight ago, there was talk today that the loan might not be so much as half a billion dollars. It seemd definitely established that it would not exceed this sum. Authoritatively it was said that this was the amount of which negotiations at Is It Miss McNab, Col. Gallo-today, as repaired amount of which negotiations at present were based, but there prevailed in some quarters the belief tha half a billion dollars represented the hopes, rather than the actual assurances of the commission and its American advisers.
Offered Below Par.

"The loan will not be more than half a billion dollars and will net the one banker who has seen the commission also daily. His assertion was interpreted as meaning that the five year notes to be issued by Great Britain and France would bear interest at 5 per cent. and would be offered to the public below par. So far, members of the commission, it was reported, have refused to entertain the proposal that the interest rate be greater than 5 per cent. Only by being purchased at less than par could the notes be made to yield more than

"This loan will not be a popular loan in the sense that it will be widely distributed among investors." another banker said, "but it will be held very largely by the banks of the country. I should think it would be possible to float a loan of half a billion dollars, do not think that a larger loan can be floated." 

CALLS BULGARIA'S ACTION ATTEMPTED BLACKMAIL

Rome Paper Speaks Plainly on Latest Move of Czar Ferdinand.

ROME, via Paris, Sept. 24.—"Even if Bulgaria has not definitely agreed to side with the central powers," says The Giornale D'Italia, "it undoubtedly has augmented the tension with the

quadruple entente.
"If Bulgarian mobilization does not mean an immediate invasion of Macedonia, or an attack upon Serbia in the rear in the case of an Austro-German rush thru the Balkans, the most optimistic explanation is that it is an attempt to blackmail the allies to press Serbia to make further territorial concessions as the Bulgarian idea is to obtain Macedonia and Thrace without going to war."

ARCHIBALD ESCAPES PROSECUTION BY U.S.





They would rather go over a bridge like that at Sunnyside of course, but Engineer Moyes may be present on Wednesday night to convince them that it is pleasanter to go thru a hole in a Mud Wall.

Other early promoters of the Mud Wall scheme ought to be present to tell about the cost of it, the land damages, the big bridges which it involves at the east end, and all the other complications in which it is wrapped. The board of trade members now know they made a mistake when they allowed themselves to be committed by a sub-committee to the Mud Wall, and if there was any graceful way of withdrawing from

the business they would adopt it. They do not really wish to make a laughing stock of the city. They know that New York would not permit it for a moment. They know that electric traction has revolutionized the situation. Perhaps the president will undertake to see that the city is not saddled with an extravagant blunder.

Assessment Reform

A special committee appointed by the mayor of Cambridge, Massachusetts, has made an interim report on the local real estate assessment situation The committee had the assistance of specialists from Harvard University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. This suggests to us the jeers that would arise in some quarters if a committee of Toronto City Cassistance from the University of Toronto, The aldermen can scarcely tolerate a graduate of Harvard among them.

The committee had frequent meet-

The Toronto World ings and conferred with the real estate exchange and others interested. It also consulted with the officials concerned in Baltimore, Philadelphia. Boston, New York; with Mr. A. C. Pleydell of New Jersey; with the vicepresident of the Manufacturers' Appraisal Company, and with the Wisconsin Tax Commission. They also visited and consulted with various neighboring municipalities.

The Somers system of realty valuation is endorsed by the committee to a large extent, but as its methods are free for any city to adopt, with the exception of the procedure in connection with corner lots, the value of which the committee doubts, preferring the Baltimore method, it is evident that the commission had a perfectly open mind on their problem. There is no secrecy about the Baltimore method and any city may use it It is agreed that the best results are obtained from the appointment not the election, of a commissioner of assessment. The next improvement the committee notes is the adoption of the block system of valuation. The present method conceals from comparison the valuations made in different localities, or even in the same block. Publicity is the very marrow of honest assessment. "It is now accepted as a commonplace that there can be no good assessment without the use of the block system." It may be remarked that the Cambridge men did not visit Toronto. They wanted assessment information.

The next thing they settled was the importance of equalization maps, as they are called, land value maps, which are used to establish the relative assessments placed upon land in difthe Mud Wall, on the Esplanade. ferent parts of the city. The committee recommends the preparation of such a map showing the entire city, setting forth the front foot value at the centre of each city block. Milwaukee has used such maps since 1891. New York publishes them so that the greatest publicity is given to assessments, and the widest criticism is invited and secured. If land is unequalcity, equalization maps will soon disclose the fact.

It has been a general practice to value land by an assumed unit of one foot frontage by 100 feet depth. Where lots are deeper or of less depth than 100 feet due allowance has to be made. In New England cities, as in Britain

Simple mathematical rules have been lots, and while these do not dispense cial circumstances where such exist. estate buyers and sellers are largely governed by these rules in their transactions.

There is nothing so fearfully complex or mysterious about these facts and the recommendations of the committee in accordance with them that the improvement and reform of any assessment system need be regarded with alarm. No city needs reform more wheat and flour export trade. than Toronto, and the application of these principles equalization, publicity, and standardization of values would do much to remove the chronic grouch indulged in by the taxpayer who knows he is not being treated or the same grounds as his neighbor.

We are indebted to the mayor and civic authorities of Cambridge for their useful work and their report from which we have quoted freely and literally. We can only hope that Toronto will take up the question in the same spirit of reform.



Already the rate has advanced from 10 shillings a quarter last week to 11 shillings this week, or, in other words, the price of transporting a bushel of Canadian wheat to Liverpool has advanced from 30 to 33 cents; so that, even with the improved condition of exchange, it now costs 42½ cents per bushel from Fort William to Liverpool.

The claim that there is plenty of tonnage if people are willing to pay the price does not receive very much credence from the exporting firms on the Winnipeg Exchange, but even if this were true, the Canadian west cannot afford to pay these rates if the crop is to be in any sense a profitable one.

PREMIER HEARD TEMPERANCE PLEA

Liquor Reform Deputation Welcomed by Hon. W. H. Hearst.

FULL CONSIDERATION

Ontario License Board is to Make Suggestions to Guide Government.

Further endeavors to suppress the retail sale of liquor during the war were made by a deputation representing the Dominion Alliance and prac-tically every society interested in ten perance reform which waited on Premier Hearst and the Hon I. B. Lucas, the attorney-general, at the parliament buildings yesterday morning. The deputation was headed by President Theron Gibson and Secretary Rev. Ben Spence of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance. The deputation, which included represent deputation, which included represen-tatives from the social reform boards of the different churches, numbered over 50.

The memorandum which, was presented by the Rev. Ben Spence, was a review of the events that had occurred since the alliance's last interview with the government, and dealt particularly with prohibition move-ments in the wetsern provinces, and the action already taken by the im-perial government in Great Britain.

The need of national efficiency at the present time was emphasized by James Hales in discussing the request embodied in the memorandum. In his opinion, however, this efficiency was below imposed executive by the was being impaired greatly by the liquor traffic. He referred to the events which had occurred since the last time the alliance waited upon the government and the advance in prohibition legislation in the Canadian west.

In a strong appeal Dr. A. G. Grant of the Presbyterian S.cial Service Board urged the premier to lead the government in the work of conquer-ing the liquor evil in the Province of


